## Rain Record Since 1940 Made During Year 1958

### 25.57 Inches Moisture Exceeded Even Flood Year Of 1954

West Texas ranchmen will view with some regret the passing of 1958 because it was a good year for the livestock producer both from the standpoint of rainfall and market prices for his product. The year always comes with promise, but the best the ranchman can hope for from the new year is that it will be as good as the old one was.

For one thing, the year 1958 was the best rainfall year in Crockett county since 1949. The Ozona rainfall record gauged a whopping 25.57 inches of rainfall in the year, the best since 1949's 29.90 inches. Last year's rainfall in Ozona proper even exceeded the flood year of 1954. However, there were parts of Crockett county in that year, 1954, which received nearly as much in a three-day period as the two years together produced in town. The Ozona record for 1954 was 24.70 inches, whereas an all-time world record rainfall of 40 inches in 36 hours fell in an area south and southwest of Ozona in the June, 1954, flood.

Last year's rainfall record in Ozona was a fairly even distribution of moisture throughout the year, starting off with generous late winter and early spring rains, tapering off in June and July and picking up again for heavy falls in August, September and October and dropping off again in November to a completely dry December, except for the very meager moisture furnished by Tuesday's light snowfall, which is not included in the year's calculations.

Wayne handed the gun to Tommy and in the exchange the gun was discharged, neither boy being able to account for the accident. The discharged cartridge was the only one in the gun.

The bullet entered the boy's thigh just below the groin and ranged downward toward the knee. It lodged just under the skin on the opposite side and was removed by physicians. The lad was discharged from the hospital Sunday and is well on the way to recovery.

Larry and Billy Troy Williams have entered three fat steers and one registered Hereford heifer. The steers will be judged on Thursday, January 8th, at 8:00 a. m. and the registered cattle classes are scheduled for Friday morning at 8:00 a. m.

Sale of fat steers and fat lambs will be held at 9:30 a. m. Saturday, January 10th.

All livestock must arrive at the show by noon, Sunday, January 4th, and will be released Saturday, January 10th, following the auction sale of prize fat animals.

## Blizzard Sweeps Over With Light Snow, Bitter Cold

### Winter's First Snow Accompanies Arctic Cold Front Here

An arctic blizzard which swept down over the Texas Panhandle early Monday, dumping a heavy snowfall over a wide area of southern Oklahoma, eastern New Mexico and north Texas, swept into Ozona Monday night to drop the season's first snow here.

The fall covered the ground lightly during the night, a combination of sleet and snow and big flakes fell throughout the morning to egg the ground to an inch or more in protected places but melted rapidly on the warm ground. The fall ceased about noon and the sun erased the white blanket in a few hours.

The cold wave, accompanied by blustery and biting winds Monday night, sent the temperature tumbling to an early morning low of 22 degrees followed by a 20 degree reading Wednesday morning.

Lower temperature marks had been reached earlier in the month when a dry cold wave struck, sending the mercury to a low of 11 degrees before Christmas. The holiday week-end was mild and delightful, however, as the weather man gave celebrators a break.

## 12th Night Tree Blaze Next Tuesday Night At Powell Field Grounds

A huge bonfire of "used" Christmas trees, the singing of Christmas carols and music by the Ozona High School band will mark the end of the Christmas season next Tuesday night, Jan. 6, in the Powell Field park in south Ozona.

The event, the Twelfth Night observance sponsored by the Ozona Music Club, will begin at 7:30 p. m. and the entire community is invited to participate. The program will be in pageant form and may be viewed by spectators from the covered grandstand or from cars.

Ozonans are urged to contribute their Christmas trees to the bonfire program. Those who can not deliver trees to the Powell Field entrance by noon Tuesday, Jan. 6, are urged to call a member of the Music Club and someone will call for the tree.

This is the second annual observance of Twelfth Night by the Ozona Music Club. The reputed date of the visit of the Three Kings to the Manger, January 6, is an important church feast day, and has several names, including "Epiphany," "Little Christmas," "Old Christmas," "Day of the Three Kings," and "Twelfth Night."

In recent years cities and towns all over the United States have revived the ancient Twelfth Night custom of burning Christmas trees and other greenery. After dark, a gigantic pile of trees is set afire and flames light the sky. Everyone, old and young, joins in singing Christmas carols to bring the festive holidays to a fitting close. Besides affording entertainment for the community, the custom eliminates a fire hazard caused by dry Christmas trees.

## E. A. Brodhead, Sonora School Superintendent, Dies of Heart Attack

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the First Methodist Church in Sonora for E. A. Brodhead, superintendent of schools at Sonora for the past eight years, who died in Hudspeth Memorial Hospital in Sonora Sunday morning as the result of a heart attack.

He came to Sonora from Overton. He had served as chairman of District 11-B Superintendents Assn. and on the program committee of the American Assn. of School Administrators. He is survived by his widow and one son, his father and step-mother who live in Houston, and two sisters.

**NEW TARGETS**

During the month of January, the annual March of Dimes campaign will be conducted again. And the 1959 observance will be the most important in its long history — and the most deserving of universal support.

The March of Dimes was originally directed at polio, and out of it came the great Salk vaccine. The polio fight is not over — as the Detroit epidemic of this year demonstrated. It will be continued until final victory is won.

But now the March of Dimes is to do much more. It is sponsored by The National Foundation, hitherto known as the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. That change in name is mightily significant. For the March of Dimes is moving against new targets. The first of these are two of the greatest crippling of all — arthritis and birth defects. At least 11 million Americans suffer the pain of arthritis and rheumatism, and some 250,000 infants are born each year with some sort of defect. The National Foundation will now bring its great resources to bear in seeking victories over these cripples — even as it continues its work in the field of polio.

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**Business Boom In 60's, Inflation, Higher Wages Predicted by Kiplinger**

Washington, D. C. — Business will boom in the 60's, according to a year-end report from the Kiplinger organization on changes and growth during the next decade.

The business boom will flow from population growth, plus rising productivity which will increase the output per man-hour, plus higher incomes, plus the pull of people who want more and better things for themselves, plus the nimble shifting of business patterns, Kiplinger says.

Companies will expand, despite painful and expensive growth. They must add capacity, products, diversity and new outlets as a hedge against the rapid changes that would drive them down and possibly out.

More chains, larger stores and many stores taking on additional

lines is the revolutionary picture for merchandising in the 60's. The food store will become a general store, with other things than groceries. The end of the trend is not yet for the super-super-market.

Pre-packaged and frozen foods, requiring more complex equipment, fancier fixtures will all bring on new kinds of warehousing needs.

Also there's automation . . . this tide is rising fast. It means more

mechanical equipment and system to replace muscle power. It's a must for domestic business, and it's a must for our foreign trade. Automation downgrades muscle, but it upgrades brains. Increasingly, college graduates will be lapped up and trained for top executive jobs, technical and engineering jobs. And, surprisingly, the lower-echelon jobs such as foreman and supervisor will be filled by college grads.

As business gets to be in bigger units, it will need more trained brains. As it gets more far flung, more responsibility will rest on the individual. Business processes themselves are being upgraded and the men who run them. Automation adds to the need for the trained and the educated in key spots.

Wages and salaries are bound to rise, following the patterns now. Despite higher prices of everything — probably 20 per cent higher by the late 60's — most people will be able to afford more things.

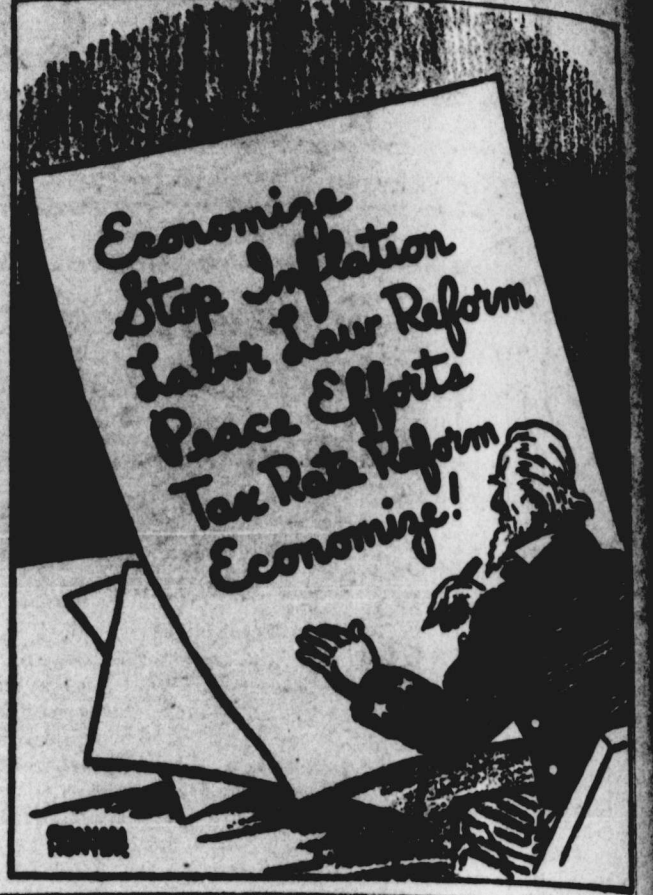
This means a continuation of inflation at about the same rate as in past decade. Savings, pensions, etc., will shrink in terms of what they will buy.

Unions will be affected by the growth of white-collar workers, specialists or experts in various fields. Unions will find it harder to unionize effectively. Union leaders are already foreseeing the trend.

More women will join the ranks of workers in the 60's. They've got to work, for the growing economy requires that they do work.

Now 60 per cent of women working outside the home are married

and run households. The proportion will rise, especially women in the 45-to-54 age group who have raised their children. 45 per cent of the women of middle age will be working by the late 60's.

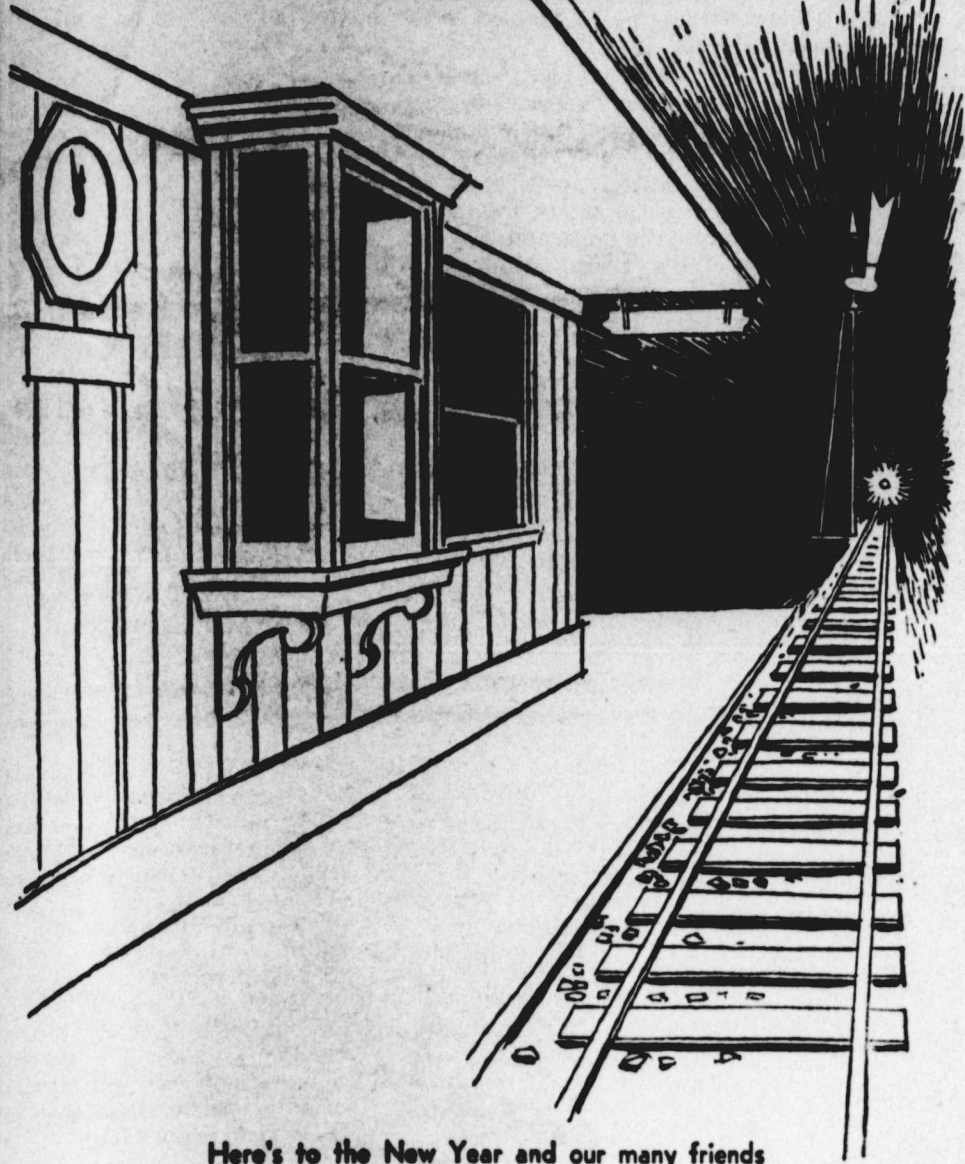

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — As a news-making year, 1958 lacked the lid-blowing scandals and sensational headlines that erupted from the Capitol in '56 and '57.

But it was a momentous year in many ways. Elections. Recession. State treasury bankrupt. Much talk of new taxes.

Many research reports were made — by the State Tax Study Commission, The Texas Research League, the Hale-Aikin Committee. Required reports came from the Board of Water Engineers, Higher Education Commission and Legislative Council.

All in all, 1958 was a year of surveys, a time of critical self-examination. All the research reports made lengthy stories, little headlines. Few are complete stories. Most will be continued into the turbulent Legislative year of 1959.

A month by month review of 1958, including top news events, both good and bad, depending on your viewpoint, follows:

**January** — Gov. Price Daniel refused to be gloomy about state finances. He said he wasn't convinced the State Treasury would be in the red by 1959, as some said, nor of the need for new taxes.

New State Water Planning Board set up shop with the aim of doubling Texas' water storage capacity. Land Commissioner Earl Rudder resigned to become A&M Vice President. Bill Allcorn of Brownwood succeeded Rudder. Rival groups of optometrists squared off in a court battle to decide legality of price advertising.

Early-day satellites swirled overhead and a lot of people were worrying whether our schools were as good as Russia's. Hale-Aikin Committee asked for grass-roots suggestions for school improvement.

**February** — Gov. Daniel proposed that precinct convention be abolished and that delegates to the county convention be named by direct primary vote. It was a surprise counter-move to the "code of ethics" campaign being conducted by the DOT as part of its drive to wrest party control from the governor.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert predicted a \$12,000,000 state revenue deficit and need for \$100,000,000 in new taxes by 1959. Economists announced bluntly that there was a recession.

**March** — Texas oil allowable dwindled to nine producing days. Oil Imports Study Commission blamed excess stocks on over-production during Suez crisis, competition since from foreign oil.

Unemployment payments hit a figure double that of a year ago. And many Texas farmers reported it was "too wet to plow."

**April** — Oil allowable tumbled to an all-time low, eight producing days. But TEC, for the first time in 1953, announced a significant drop in joblessness.

Former Sen. Bill Blakley, Dallas financier, announced he'd run for senate post held by Ralph Yarborough. It was starting gun for summer politicking.

**May** — Eight-day oil production pattern continued. Governor Daniel kicked off a campaign to save 254 lives in '58 by reducing the 1957 highway death toll 10%.

Bureau of Business Research reported the recession "is still very much with us."

**June** — Election campaigns got into high gear. But as much, if not more, attention focussed on the "after-hours" election, the precinct conventions. Prize in the struggle would be control of the state convention in September and selection of party officials for the next two years. Leading the rival factions were Governor Daniel for the moderate-conservatives and National Committeewoman Mrs. R. D. Randolph for the liberal DOT.

**July** — Primaries returned almost all incumbents to major offices, including Ralph Yarborough to the U. S. Senate and Price Daniel to another term as governor.

Oil was up to nine producing days. Economic analysts pointed to lessening unemployment, hefty bank deposits, said it might be "a good year after all."

**August** — Legislative Budget Board wrestled with money requests from state agencies far in excess of expected revenue for 1959-61. Second primary settled who would sit in 56th Legislature, but not who would preside over the House. Both Joe Burkett of Kerrville and Waggoner Carr

of Lubbock claimed enough pledges to be elected speaker.

Leaders of all types of Democrats called for "harmony" at September convention. Oil allowable rose to 11 days.

**September** — Hale-Aikin Committee made its first report on proposals to update, enrich public schools. Fiscal leaders in Legislature upped their gloomy predictions on new revenue needs to \$140,000,000.

Texas Democrats turned their eyes toward 1960 after a convention controlled by the Governor despite DOT outrage over the exclusion of its members from the Executive Committee.

**October** — Texas General Revenue Fund ran dry and began going in the hole. Hale-Aikin Committee reconsidered and reversed its previous stand against federal aid for school lunch programs and vocational training.

Commission on Higher Education proposed a more unified study program for state colleges and universities, concentrating graduate work at UT and A&M. Texans debated merits of nine proposed amendments to the state Constitution.

**November** — State fiscal officials upped their estimates of needed new revenue to nearly \$200,000,000. Industry leaders called the oil industry "sick". Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson called for mandatory import controls.

Many public officials were disappointed over amendment voting. Salary raises for legislators and pension plans for county officials got thumbs down.

**December** — Waning weeks of '58 saw a flood of legislative proposals flow into Austin. Hale-Aikin Committee, joined by Texas

State Teachers Association, asked more pay for teachers, more courses, longer school year. Others wanted safety legislation, fiscal help for cities, flexible auto insurance rates, small loan company regulation, etc.

State Tax Study Commission made no recommendation beyond its reporting of the fiscal facts of life in Texas. Governor Daniel estimated the state would need \$65,000,000 a year more for future spending plus \$55,000,000 to wipe out the deficit. He said he thought it could be done without general sales or income taxes.

And the safety crusade moved toward an unknown outcome as officials, joined by newsmen and hundreds of billboards, sought to cut the usual holiday highway death toll.

Whatever happens to the piles of data and recommendations in '59, their accumulation made '58 a significant year. It was a year in which many thoughtful people sought to take a grasp on the problems and promise of Texas' future.
