In his recent State of the Union Message, Mr. Eisenhower sought to bring public pressure upon Congress to reject unnecessary appropriations



There are many people who may not be aware of the existence of FDIC, nor familiar with its functions. I confess that my attention to the agency is brought about by service on the House Banking and Currency Committee, which has jurisdiction over it. Yet, if you have a bank account, chances are your money is insured by FD IC.

The greatest tribute that may be paid to the organization is that this month it reached its 25th birthday without fanfare. It may be that FDIC has moved so firmly into history as one of the greatset financial reforms of the 20th Century that no one feels the need to recall its basic beginnings. 




