The resolution urged that Congress prescribe proper limitations of the court's jurisdiction, and that enact "corrective or conforming legislation in those fields where the Supreme Court has invaded the legislative area.'

While the Farm Bureau resolution does not refer specifically to any decision or ruling of the court. the delegates are obviously in agreement with former Indiana Congressman Samuel B. Pettingill, who takes issue with the oft-repeated statement that the court's ukase in the school segregation issue) is 'the law of the land.

But more important than integration or segregation," writes Mr. Pettengill in "Human Events," "is the preservation of the Constitution against the brainwashing of the American people now going on to support the curious notion that a decision of the US Supreme Court - any decision -

. There is not a word in the Constitution which says that a Supreme Court judgement is 'the law of the land': there is not a word which says that public officials or private citizens are legally bound by a decision of the Supreme Court (except the parties to the particular case itself).

"There is not a word in the Constitution which gives the Supreme Court the power or right to enact a law, or to amend the Constitution by giving it a meaning which the proposing Congress or ratifying state legislatures, or the people, did not intend it to have.
