David Sikes Is Ozona's Lone Entry In State's Track Finals This Week

The final round of the Texas Interscholastic League track program will be held in Austin this week with David Sikes, senior pole vaulter being the only member of the Ozona track team eligible to go.

Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere are to take Sikes to Austin Friday with the finals scheduled to be run off Saturday.

The meet in Austin will end Ozona's most successful track season in history in terms of meets won and points scored. As far as is known this was the first district title the Lions have ever won.

While the season as a whole has been highly successful the lone entry in the state's final event will not have much chance of matching last year's three entries, all of whom placed in the Austin meet.

Last spring Jerry Jacobs won third in the high hurdles, Bobby Vargas won second in the broad jump and Jake Young placed third in the shot.

The loss of Jacobs both in track and as an effective player in basketball as well as over half the football season was a staggering blow to Ozona athletics this year.

The trip for Sikes will be his first to the state meet as a competitor. This year Sikes has won or tied for first in every meet the Lions have taken part in.

From a field of 34 nominations, made by the faculty, names of ten students have been selected for the final balloting from which selection of the Ozona High School's best citizen of 1959 will be made. The student so selected to receive the annual award made possible by the Ozona Woman's Forum.

Ozona FFA & 4-H in 2nd and 3rd Places In Meet Here

The Sutton County 4-H Range Judging Team won the Annual Crockett County Invitational Range Judging Contest last Thursday, held on the Dick Henderson ranch, and was presented the Ozona National Bank trophy by Lowell Littleton, executive vice president of the bank. The Crockett county 4-H judging teams won a first and third and the Ozona FFA teams two second place awards. Eighty-four 4-H and FFA members representing fourteen teams in this West Texas area competed in the contest.

High individual honors in each respective age group were won by David Jacoby, member of the Crockett County 4-H Junior team, in the 12 year age group and under; Jack Baker of the Sutton County 4-H team won the 13-15 age group high individual honors, and Kenneth Deland, of the Ozona FFA Senior team, won the older group individual honors. P. L. Childress, Crockett County 4-H member, actually scored the highest over-all score but was ineligible because of winning the same award in last year's contest.

Local contestants winning individual awards were as follows: 12 years and under: 1st David Jacoby, 3rd Larry Mills, 4th, Larry Williams, and 5th, Milton Colquitt, all members of the winning Crockett County 4-H Junior range team. In the 13-15 age group, Herbie Noelke, of the Ozona FFA took 5th place honors. 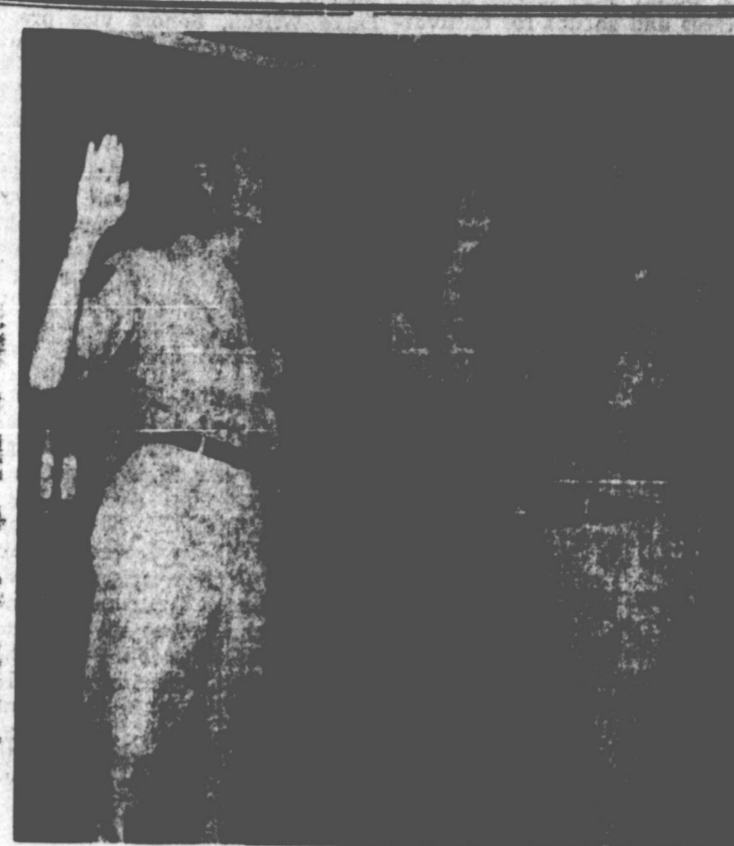
Twelve Class A bands took part in the contest with Ozona and Mason being the only two bands to make first division in both sight reading and concert playing.

1 to 4 Inches of Rainfall General Over Ranch Area

Spring Growth Spurts After Much Needed Moisture Visits

Range grasses and weeds, which have struggled to green up with the coming of warm Spring weather but have been hampered by a lack of moisture, got a big boost the past week-end with general rains over Crockett and most of the adjoining country.

General rains Friday night ranged from one inch to more than four inches in this county, the heavier rains being reported from area south of Ozona. Follow-up scattered showers, the following two days, were ideal for driving the moisture in and adding to the much needed total.

In the heavy rainfall belt, on the Joe Davidson ranch south of Ozona, a draw crossing Highway 163 flooded the highway for a time and a Midlander, Charlie Lung, drove his car into the raging torrent at its height. The car was washed off the highway and lodged against a right-of-way fence. Mr. Lung escaped without injury by wading out from his flooded car. The car was later retrieved and suffered only slight damage.

Cool temperatures followed the rainfall, a cool front reaching Ozona Tuesday night pushing temperatures down to a low of 47 degrees. Partly clouded skies and cool temperatures remained in the area Wednesday.

Confessed Killer Abandoned Car Of Victim Near Here

Negro Who Killed Taylor Farmer, Hitch- ed Ride From Ozona

George Williams, 28-year-old Negro who was arrested Saturday in Roswell, N. M., and is alleged to have confessed the robbery slaying of a retired Williamson county farmer near Taylor, Texas, Friday morning, abandoned his victim's car five miles east of Ozona and hitched a ride west out of Ozona.

Sheriff Billy Mills found the abandoned car near the Air Force station east of Ozona and personnel at the base reported to the sheriff seeing a negro man leave the car about mid-afternoon Friday. The man later hitched a ride through Ozona to the west and was arrested in Roswell the following day.

Taylor officers were notified and fingerprint men lifted prints from the car here yesterday before towing it back to Taylor.

Charles Heise, 69, a retired Williamson county farmer living at Taylor was murdered Friday morning while fishing near Taylor. The negro, who confessed the slaying to arresting officers, shot Heise to death and took his car. The alleged slayer was taken back to Taylor by Williamson county deputy sheriffs.

Conoco Elkhorn Test Shows Ellenburger Oil

Continental Oil Co. No. 36-A Shannon, in 21-UV-GC&SF, Cambrian wildcat in the Elkhorn (Ellenburger) field of Crockett county, 14 miles northwest of Ozona, recovered 100 feet of mud and 840 feet of oil on a drillstem test in the Ellenburger.

Little League To Launch New Season Play Here Tonight

Four-Team League to Play Thru Summer; H. S. Teams Play

The Ozona Little League will begin its eighth year of operation tonight with all four teams in action under the lights.

The Ozona Public Schools, the county, and the Ozona Lions Club co-sponsor the project with the actual program being carried out by the Lions.

Directing the league for the second year will be Corbett Smith who has announced the following managers for the four team league B and B Grocery, Ted Lewis; Ozona Oil Co., Roy Williams; Mason Motors, Ralph Eversole; and Moore Oil Co., Rosie Seahorn.

Plans will once again call for play to run through May and June with play-offs scheduled for July.

A new addition to the baseball program in Ozona will be a high school team which will play for about a month and a half in a league sponsored by school districts in Ozona, Rankin, Big Lake and Iraan and which will be carried out under school regulations and under high school coaches.

Brooks Dosier, Ozona High School basketball coach, will have direction of the baseball program which will be open to all high school students who would have been eligible had the program been carried out entirely during the school year. In other words, this springs seniors will be eligible.

Practice for the beginning of the high school program is scheduled to begin May 13th.

Capt. Harlan One Of 24 Commissioned In 17 State Reserve Area

Captain Vernon Harlan, instructor for the 9830th Air Reserve Squadron, Detachment F, was recently promoted from master sergeant to the rank of captain under the Air Force Reserve program which selects certain qualified enlisted men each year for commissioning.

The Ozona unit is under the command of Major J. A. Pelto who swore in Captain Harlan at one of the reserve's regular April meetings.

Captain Harlan has been instructor for the local unit for the past three years and will probably retain that position with the Ozona Detachment.

The Tenth Air Force, to which the Ozona Unit belongs, was given a quota of 24 commissions to award in the 1959 fiscal year. The area covered by the Tenth Air Force embraces 17 states, thus making Captain Harlan's appointment no small honor.

Men from Ozona and surrounding area who would be interested in joining the Ozona unit and who can meet the qualifications are invited to make inquiry either to Major Pelto or to Captain Harlan.

Major Pelto served in World War II as a fighter pilot in Europe while Captain Harlan was an instructor in the Navy during the same war.

Miss Aleatha Brown To Receive Degree At McMurry College

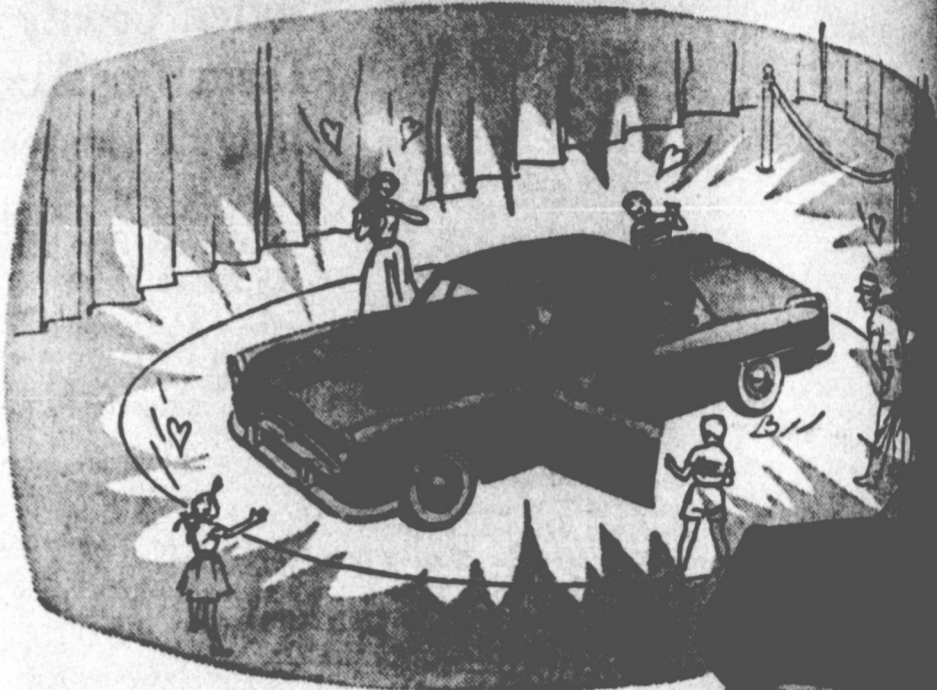

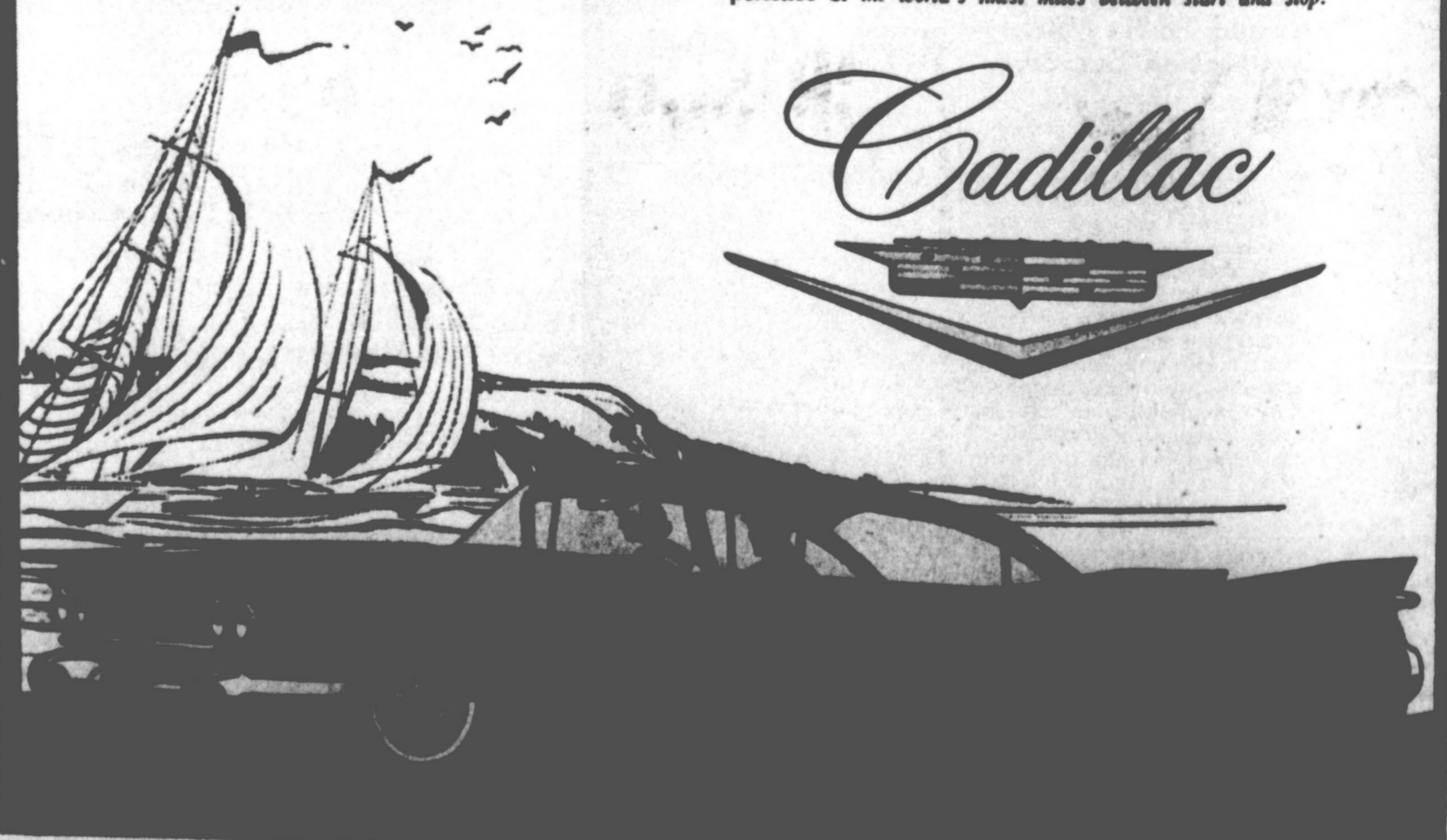

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

Now is the time to start spraying your pecan trees for control of the pecan nut casebearer. For a period of about 10-12 days after the small nuts turn brown on the end, is the period that spraying is recommended to control the casebearer. A second spraying at two to three weeks intervals is often effective for good control. A power sprayer that will put out 20 to 35 gallons per minute at a pressure of 200 to 600 pounds should be used. Thorough wetting of each limb from top to bottom is necessary for a thorough job of spraying.

Dr. J. E. Redden, veterinarian, of Comfort, Texas, is now in the process of moving his veterinary practice to Ozona. He should be moved in and ready for business within the next few days. His office will be in the Ivy Mayfield house, directly behind the Dairy King, and across the street from the Church of Christ. Dr. Redden received his veterinary degree from Texas A&M College in 1957. He has been practicing in Comfort and San Antonio the past two years. Everyone who has not had their dogs vaccinated for rabies the past year, should do so as soon as possible. A number of wild ani-

mals have been reported over the county recently showing symptoms of having rabies.

A number of 4-H club members have been busy each afternoon after school studying grass identification in preparation for the district grass and range judging contests this coming Saturday at the Sonora Experiment Station. Senior teams who place first and second in the district contests qualify to compete in the state contests at Texas A&M College on June 10th.

Control of mesquite has dropped off the last five to six years, according to G. O. Hoffman and B. J. Ragsdale, extension range specialists. Drought has been the major factor for the decline. Mesquite is fast becoming a problem in all parts of Texas where the tree is found. The best time to spray is in the late spring, usually 50 to 60 days after leaves first appear. Good control of mesquite has been reported with airplane spraying under favorable conditions. The specialists recommend using from 1/3 to 1/2 pound of 2,4,5-T, 1/2 gallon of diesel oil and enough water to make 3 gallons of spray solution per acre. The specialists recommend deferred grazing and moderate stocking rates on sprayed areas to prolong retreatment.

Wool prices are on the up and buyers usually pay a premium for well prepared wool. Good wool preparation practices such as rolling and tying long wool properly,

keeping wool clean in preparation and in hauling, removing all tags, black, and off-brand fleeces from main wool, should pay off this year.

Shallow Wildcat Set In Crockett County; Gas Strike Assured

Crockett county gained locations for a wildcat and a confirmation and a gas strike was continuing to test.

The Blue Danube Oil Co. of Fort Worth will drill the No. 1 Shannon, a 2,800-foot wildcat, 20 miles north of Ozona and 13 1/2 miles northwest of production in the Shannon (San Andres) field.

Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 10-Q- (Abst. 2712). Fred Turner, Jr., of Midland filed application to drill the No. 6-B Shannon one location southeast of his recently completed No. 4-BB Shannon, prolific second producer and location south extension to the Noelke, Southeast (lower Queen) field, six miles southeast of Iraan.

Location, on a 640-acre lease, is 1,141.8 feet from the north line, 1,320 feet from the west line of 23-4-Archer csl. Scheduled depth is 2,400 feet.

The No. 4BB Shannon was finished April 28 for a calculated daily flowing potential of 10,929.6

barrels of 31.5 gravity oil through a 3-inch choke and open hole between 1,708-1,718 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1-L University, in 10-29 University, assured Devonian gas discovery located 25 miles west of Ozona, flowed 11 hours making 60 barrels

of acid water and gas at the rate of 1,220,000 cubic feet per day.

Testing continued through perforations between 7,045-070 feet.

The re-entry project was originally drilled by Hunt Oil Co. as the No. 1-L Hassie Hunt and abandoned May 5, 1949 at 8,626

feet in the Ellenburger.

The strike is three miles north and slightly east of the two-well Ingham (Devonian) gas field and 3/4-mile northwest of the depleted shallow Lancaster Hill field.
