Insurance Men Back Flexible Rate Law On Automobile Insurance

Austin — Arguments for the adoption of a flexible insurance rate system in Texas will be heard April 7 by the State Senate Insurance Committee.

Texas is the only state without a flexible system. Proponents of the measure claim that Texas motorists are paying more than \$34,000,000 a year more than necessary for car insurance because everyone must pay the same price for insurance, regardless of whether he is a careful driver.

It has been estimated by the National Association of Independent Insurers, which endorses this legislation, that the insurance bill of the average driver in Texas would be lowered from \$15 to \$50 a year under a flexible rate system that permits competition.

The author of the bill in the Senate is Senator Jarrard Secret of Bell County. He said many insurance companies were willing and financially able to lower car insurance rates in Texas, but are unable to do so under the single, uniform rate system that prevents competition for business.

He said it was unfair to the careful driver to have to pay the same price for insurance as the careless driver.

A similar bill is pending in the House. A hearing was held recently by the House Insurance Committee and the bill is now in a five-member sub-committee.

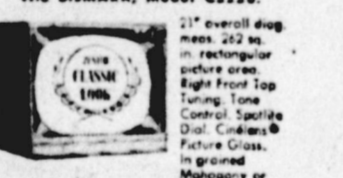

Tax Front — Meanwhile, the House Taxation Committee, beset by the prodding of the governor on one hand and the objections of various citizens on the other, toils on in its search for new money. Recent actions include: Showing temporary disapproval, 12-6, of the governor's plan for the state to take over abandoned property and dormant bank accounts. Hearing the pros and cons of a raft of "broad-based" taxes. These include: 1. A nine-part omnibus tax measure by Reps. Bob Strickland of San Antonio and Wesley Roberts of Lamesa which would include a gross receipts levy on retail establishments. It would raise an estimated \$200,000,000 to \$300,000,000. 2. 2 1/2 per cent gross receipts tax on all business activity (with certain exemptions for farm supplies, charitable institutions, professional services, etc.) by Rep. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock. It would bring in about \$300,000,000 to

\$400,000,000. 3. A tax on "the first sale or use of any finished product" by Rep. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches. 4. A tax on "net and receipts" by Rep. Alonzo W. Jamison Pr. of Denton. 5. A "cure all" tax on manufactured goods by Rep. Jerry Sadler of Percilla, to bring in about a half - billion dollars per biennium. It all led one House member to complain of a "million-dollar headache."

Plan to Tax Boats — Boat owners may be in for a shock if the "Water Safety Act" becomes law. Representatives have tacked on a few taxes. Although designed to promote safety, the measure as it now stands calls for the purchase of a \$2 Certificate of Number every two years, plus payments of a fee of from \$5 to \$12.50 per boat per biennium. About the only boats exempted are canoes and "seaplanes."

The measure passed the House but still needs Senate approval. Economy Bill Making Headway — There's at least one fellow who believes that his type of job is useless, outmoded and unnecessary. He is George Corse Jr. of Graham, Texas. Corse feels that school money is being wasted by keeping the job of County School Superintendent alive. He wants to dispense with the office and contends that it will save the State a minimum of \$400,000 annually.

To prove they were economy-minded too, the House passed his bill (HB No. 101 by Rep. George Wilson of Newcastle) and sent it to the Senate with their blessings. HB No. 101 would permit the people of a county, by petition of 10 per cent of the eligible voters, to vote on discontinuance of the office of County Superintendent of Schools.

Corse is county superintendent of Young County. Too Cited? — Texans may have a chance to vote in the next general election on a constitutional amendment to decide, in effect, whether the legislature shall "go urban."

House passed a resolution by Rep Will Ehrle of Childress to limit representation from the big city counties. As amended, it would

provide one representative for each 100,000 population up to 900,000 and one for each 400,000 thereafter. Primary target was Harris County, whose sprawling industrialism might entitle it to as many as 13 representatives after the 1960 census, under present rules. Rural legislators fear the city delegations will develop a virtual veto over rural interests. Also, conservatives are skittish about the strong liberal forces that come from Harris County.

But Houstonites, and other city solons, argue that tax-paying citizens are entitled to equal representation, no matter where they live.

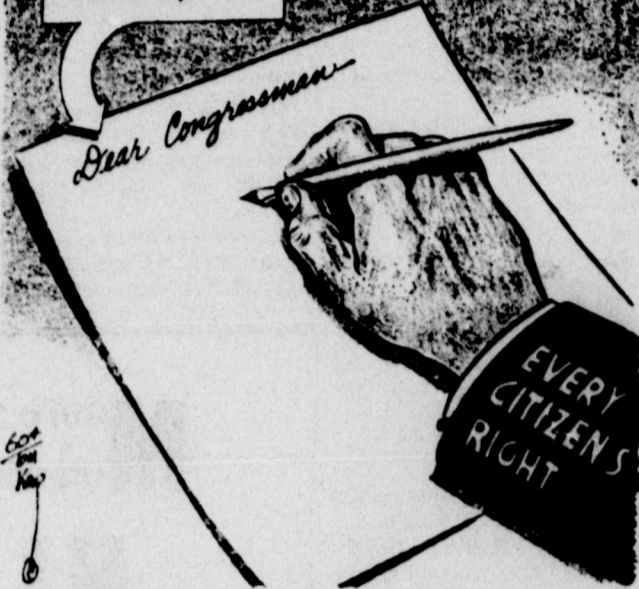

Most Cattle Sell Steady To Strong, Feeders Higher

Fort Worth, March 30 — Stocker and feeder cattle and calves at Fort Worth were active and steady to strong with some fleshy feeder cattle 50 cents higher. Slaughter cattle and calves were generally steady, except some slaughter cows were slow and weak.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$26 to \$30.25, the top figure for some strictly choice heifers scaling 697 pounds. Some over 1,100 - pound steers scored \$29. Medium and lower grade yearlings and steers cashed at \$18 to \$25.50.

Fat cows sold from \$18.50 to \$20.50 and canners and cutters cashed at \$13 to \$18.50. Bulls scored \$18 to \$23.50. Good and choice slaughter calves ranged from \$26.50 to \$31 and medium and lower grades scaled from \$18 to \$26. Medium to good stocker steer calves cashed at \$27 to \$34, and heifer calves drew \$31 downward. Some mixed bull and heifer calves sold at \$30. Medium and good stocker and feeder steer yearlings sold from \$24 to \$30, three loads of 840-pound feeders at \$26.50. A part load of 750-pound feeders sold at \$27.

Spring Lambs 50c To \$1.50 Higher, Old Crops Up

Spring lambs at Fort Worth sold from 50 cents to \$1.50 higher here Monday as good and choice milk fat lambs cashed at \$21 to \$22.50.

Old crop shorn slaughter lambs were also strong to 25 to 50 cents higher in spots. Stocker and feeder lambs were about steady, except lightweight stocker Spring lambs were very dull and weak. Sheep were scarce and steady.

Good and choice milk fat lambs drew \$21 to \$22.50, one load of 241 pound strictly choice and prime lambs at the top of \$22.50. Cull to medium Spring lambs sold from \$14 to \$20. Stocker and feeder Spring lambs sold from \$15 to \$18.

Good and choice old crop shorn fat lambs drew \$17 to \$19 and

one strictly choice load of lambs drew \$19.50. Cull to medium old crop lambs cashed at \$13 to \$16.50. Stocker and feeder shorn lambs drew \$16 to \$18, some feeders with No. 3 pelts at \$17.50. Two-year-old wethers sold around \$15 to \$16. A few slaughter ewes sold around \$7 to \$8.
