Injured In Day Accident Unconscious

Patricia Witherspoon, B. B. Ingham III In Collision

Patricia Witherspoon, 18, of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Witherspoon of Ozona, had not regained consciousness yesterday and was in serious condition at Crockett County Hospital following injuries suffered in a two-car collision on an Ozona street yesterday morning.
(Buddy) Ingham, III, was taken from the hospital after suffering severe facial cuts and bruises suffered in the same accident.
Ingham collided with Witherspoon on Avenue J about 9:30 Saturday morning. Miss Witherspoon was driving south on the street when Ingham was driving north. Witherspoon attempted to turn left in front of the Ingham car and the latter struck her car broadside, driving off the street and throwing Witherspoon to the pavement. The front wheel of the car struck off and the car's fender was bent over the girl's legs when she was carried to the hospital. Witherspoon suffered a skull fracture and bruises. A brain specialist in San Antonio was summoned to examine her early in the morning and she was contemplated for surgery in that city.
Another accident in Ozona yesterday afternoon, Jimmy Semmler, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Semmler, suffered a leg when the motor scooter he was riding in collision with a car on Highway 290 at the Gulf of Mexico corner. The lad is under treatment at the Crockett County Hospital.

Close Watch Planned To Apprehend Thieves In Raids At Cemetery

A rash of pilfering at the Cedar Hills Cemetery has prompted local officers and Cemetery Association officials to take action to apprehend those guilty of the petty thievery.

Reports of a number of potted plants and fresh flowers placed on graves of loved ones recently being lifted were followed by reports of losses of garden hoses and other pieces of equipment used in maintaining family burial plots.

Cemetery caretakers are on hand all during the daylight hours and the cemetery entrance is closed by locked chain at night to prevent entrance of cars into the area. Officers surmise that the looting is being done by persons on foot and a close watch is to be kept on the cemetery in an effort to apprehend the thieves.

Four Men Hurt In Car Accident South Of Ozona

Quartet Hospitalized Here Following One-Car Crash Tues.

Four men were injured, two of them seriously, Tuesday night in a one-car accident about 35 miles south of Ozona. All four men are hospitalized in the Crockett County Hospital here.

Injured were Dennis C. Humphrey, driver of the car, and S. C. Franks, both of Levelland, Texas, Gilbert Eaker of San Antonio and Herman Gonzales of Robstown.

Eaker was the most seriously injured of the quartet. He suffered severe internal injuries, a crushed shoulder and broken leg. Both Franks and Gonzales also suffered broken legs while Humphrey suffered painful but less serious injuries.

Humphrey and Franks were returning to Levelland from Del Rio and the other two men had hitched rides in their car. Humphrey said that a blowout in a front tire caused him to lose control of the car, which overturned. Crockett county sheriff Billy Mills investigated the accident.

The injured men were brought to the hospital Tuesday night and were reported in satisfactory condition yesterday.

Buddy Gibbs, Former Ozona Student, Killed In San Angelo Crash

Harold C. (Buddy) Gibbs, 22, a former Ozonan and 1954 graduate of Ozona High School, was killed early Sunday morning when his car was involved in a head-on collision with another car in east San Angelo on the Ballinger highway.

Gibbs, employed with a San Angelo accounting firm and student of the University of Texas dental college, died in a San Angelo hospital three hours after the accident. Two passengers in Gibbs' car, a convertible, Robert Dorris, 20, son of FBI Agent Ed Dorris and Mrs. Dorris, and Ferrell Bryant, 25, a teacher in Central High School at San Angelo, were injured in the crash. Melvin Thomas Rose, 29, of San Angelo, driver of the other car involved in the accident, was not seriously injured.

Young Gibbs, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold C. Gibbs, who came to Ozona from San Angelo, spent his senior year in Ozona High School. After graduation he attended Baylor University and served six months in the Army.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday from the First Baptist Church of San Angelo with the Rev. James B. Leavell officiating. Burial was in Belvedere Cemetery.

Surviving are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold C. Gibbs of Austin; a sister, Miss Dela Jean Gibbs of Austin; and a paternal grandmother, Mrs. Delia Gibbs of San Angelo. John Lee Henderson of Ozona was one of the pallbearers at the funeral.

Site Inspection For Saline Plant Scheduled Apr. 24

Dept. Of Interior Engineer Tours Proposed S'west Sites

Ozona and Crockett county's application for consideration as a location for one of the pilot plants to be built by the United States government to test the feasibility of converting saline and brackish waters to fresh water will receive the attention of the U. S. Department of the Interior on April 24 when an engineer from the department will be here to investigate the proposed site as a part of a tour of this area looking over other sites for which applications were filed.

W. W. Rinne, of the Department of Interior staff of engineers, is on a swing through the Southwest, where one of the plants is to be located under the law which provides for construction of five such plants in the U. S. at a cost of approximately two million dollars each. He is scheduled to confer with local backers of the project and look over proposed sites and gather pertinent information on a visit here April 24. A local committee from the Ozona Rotary Club, composed of W. D. Cooper and Al Fields, prepared the information for the application and will guide the engineer on his local tour.

Other proposed sites at San Angelo, Pecos, Fort Stockton, Carlsbad, N. M. and several other towns in the southwest are being inspected by Mr. Rinne on his tour.

First Good Rain Of Spring Rides In On Cold Front

Inch Of Moisture Recorded Here As Temperature Drops

First rain of consequence for the present Spring rode in on a cold front the past week-end to bring a total of approximately an inch of moisture to the Ozona area.

The cold front which triggered the rainfall dropped temperatures below the freezing point early Monday morning but the low temperature did little damage to any but the most tender plants. Trees, shrubs and other plants which are well along toward full leaf apparently suffered no damage. A low of 26 degrees was reported here in the early morning hours.

The rain was the slow falling type and covered most of West Texas, renewing hopes of ranchmen that a dry January and February may soon be forgotten in general spring and summer rains.

Announcing to the estimated 7,000 labor union "delegates" through Washington's remote National Guard Armory that their ill-starred railroad journey to the capital was "the start of a campaign."

"Industrial production has recovered more than 95 percent of its recession loss," said Mr. Meaney, while "industrial employment has regained only 40 percent of its loss.

When he got the floor, Senator Johnson announced his sponsorship of a resolution which he intimated would put the four-and-a-half million idle (Labor's estimate) back to work through lavish Government spending on housing, public works, aids to depressed areas and airports.
