### **Burglars Cart Off** Hi-Way Cafe Safe **In Cool Comfort**

Intruders Turned On Air Conditioners: Near \$3000 Loss

A pair or more of burglars with penchant for solid comfort while they worked and possibly a flair for the spectacular in avoiding detection entered the Hi-Way Cafe in downtown Ozona sometime Sunday night and carted off the cafe safe containing an estimated \$3,000

in cash and checks. Gaining entry by pushing aside an air conditioner mounted on the building roof and sliding through the opening into the kitchen, the intruders jimmied off two locks on the back door, rolled the big safe from the front of the building, probably on a dolly or hand trucks, and loaded into some kind of ve-
