Bloat is caused by a buildup of gas during feed digestion in the large storage reservoir in a network of four stomachs in cattle. Chronic bloating stunts growth and is a major cause of death losses in both beef and dairy cattle.

Patterson also reports that bloat occurs most often when animals are on high-quality feeds such as good alfalfa hay supplemented with barley. Test animals received a pelleted ration of two parts halfinch cut alfalfa hay to one part grain mix.

Since the tendency to bloat was increased in the tests through selective breeding. Patterson believes that it may be possible to pinpoint chronic bloating families and thus help cattle breeders select against this abnormality.





The council's board of directors all sheep owners representing every part of the country, authorized the accelerated program in its recent semi annual meeting in Denver. Purpose of the increase in promotion and advertising effort will be to boost returns to sheep producers on both lamb and

The directors authorized the organization of a wool division in the ASPC headquarters to promote and advertise domestic wool and American made wool products.

Don Clyde, of Heber City, Utah, president of the ASPC, said the council will cooperate and coordinate its activities in wool advertising and promotion with other wool agencies.

The council's current budget for wool is \$974.000, and this figure may be increased slightly for the

fiscal year beginning July 1. For the lamb phase of the program, the directors called for an allied committee with representatives of all segments of the livestock and meat industry participating to discuss all problems of lamb production and marketing in an effort to bolster live market price for lamb. President Clyde said there is no doubt that the ASPC has done a good job of increasing consumer demand for lamb in all of the 21 premotion cities in which it operates, but that there are basic problems which need to be solved before greater success can be atttained. He pointed out that the retail price of lamb has held high and steady, but this favorable margin has not been reflected to live prices.
