Contract depth is 9.800 feet, sufficient to test the Ellenburger. Location is 990 feet from the north and west line of 2-0-TCRR. It is also three miles northwest of the Baggett (Strawn gas) field.

The Refoil field has two 3,200foot sand oil producers and three Strawn gas wells.
