Albert P. Bailey, 78, Brother of Ozonan, Is Buried In Eldorado

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the First Christian Church in Eldorado for Albert P. Bailey, 78, brother of John R. Bailey of Ozona, who died Friday afternoon in a San Angelo hospital.

Mr. Bailey, who had operated a ranch in Schleicher county since 1914, was a widely known ranchman in the San Angelo area. He was born on the family ranch near Eirdville, now Fort Worth, in Tarrant county, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bailey.

Mr. Bailey and his brother, John of Ozona, came to this area in 1894 when the two youths of 16 and 14 years, drove 127 head of horses and mules from Birdville to Schleicher county, taking some 60 days of travel and arriving at their destination without losing a single animal. Among the hazards they successfully encountered was swimming their herd across the flood swollen Brazos river without losing a one.

Mrs. Nora Gee of San Angelo is a surviving sister. She owns a ranch in Coke county and she and the two brothers and other relatives joined in building what is known as the Bailey Building on the TCU campus in Fort Worth in honor of their parents who were early contributors to the Christian church and to the university.

Survivors other than the sister and brother are one son, A. Preston Bailey of Santa Anna, two grandchildren, six great grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Prefix Letters In Phone Numbers To Be Eliminated

New 7-Digit Numbers In Effect When New Directory Out

Telephone customers in Ozona will be assigned a new type of telephone number when the new directory becomes effective May 21, 1961.

Known as the All Number Calling (ANC) plan, each telephone number will be composed of seven digits. Byron Rensdell, district manager, explained that the new system eventually will replace the more familiar two letter-five number (2L5N) system inaugurated when the telephone industry first launched the long range program to permit operators and/or customers to dial direct from one city to another.

Ozona numbers which now begin with prefix EX 2 will be changed to the ANC prefix of 392. All new numbers will appear in the new directory.

He stated that the 2L5N number system is being replaced as rapidly as possible in order that all number combinations appearing on the telephone dial can be utilized. The old 2L5N system required a prefix such as Cherry or Twilight; however, because no words in the English language begin with the letter combination WX or WY or JK or JL then no telephone numbers beginning with (Continued on Page Three)

Ozona also placed four of its members on the all-tourney team with Judy Black winning the outstanding player award. Beverly Alford, Glenda Friend and Sandra Whitaker all won berths on the all-tourney team.

In addition to the Ozona players Martha Winston of Iraan, Ann Chamberlain of Big Lake and Ann Puckett of Big Lake were named to the honor team.

Miss Knox's first team had very little trouble in sweeping through to the title for the second straight year as they belted Iraan 49 to 5 Friday night and then pasted London 52 to 11 Saturday morning before downing Big Lake 25 to 9 in the tourney finals.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

Texas feeders on March 1 were fattening 194,000 lambs for slaughter markets, according to a survey made by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Included in this number are animals being fed in dry lots and those on small grain pasture and dry grass and concentrate.

Two months earlier — on January 1 — Texas feeders reported 191,000 lambs on feed. During January and February an estimated 110,000 fed lambs were marketed and 113,000 lambs placed on feed or pastures for fattening.

Of the 194,000 lambs on feed March 1, 27 percent weighed from 60 to 79 pounds while 68 percent averaged from 80 to 99 pounds per head. Only 5 percent of the total averaged over 100 pounds.

Indications point to an early lamb crop of 892,000 head this year, compared with 852,000 in 1960. This is an increase of 5 percent. Ewes on Texas farms and ranches January 1 numbered 5 percent above a year earlier.

Percent of ewes lambing prior to March 1 was about the same as last year according to the report.

Sheep and lambs on feed for market in 7 major feeding States totaled 1,538,000 head on March 1, 1961 — 35 percent below the number on feed in these States January 1, 1961. Texas showed an increase of 2 percent from January 1, 1961. Decreases were from 61 percent in Kansas to 23 percent in Iowa. The number on feed in Texas does not reflect the total number of yearlings that will be marketed during the next few months as some yearlings were not "on feed" on March 1.

Garden Reminders

From Garden Club Reporter

Sunny March days, when a crisp wind blows, beckon the gardener outdoors. There a stroll through her garden will suggest a myriad of tasks that are best done now if a pretty garden is desired this summer.

Now is the time to: Prune shrubs and trees. Dip the roots first in rootone.

Spade up a small fertilized plot for herbs; they like poor soil. Sow seeds of sweet basil, sage, dill thyme after damage from frost is past.

Plant seeds of annual phlox and candytuft.

Plant more gladiol corms to keep these stately flowers blooming continuously in the summer and fall garden.

If daisies and asters were not separated last fall, divide and replant them now.

Fertilize trees with a plant food with a high nitrogen content. Water them well.

Prune rose bushes. Stir the soil about them only slightly to avoid injury to roots.

Water growing spring bulbs. Work a level teaspoonful of commercial fertilizer into the soil surrounding each one.

Root sowbugs from their hiding places around trees by closing away all dead foliage and other debris.

Combat snails with poison bait. If rhizomes have sunk lower than one inch beneath the soil lift them by slipping a spading

fork beneath them. Slip soil under them and firm the plant down. Remove dead leaves and litter from all flower beds.

Keep adding loose earth to the trench in which sweet peas were planted, filling it up as the plants grow upward. This will support the stems and protect young plants from killing frosts.

The clinic, which will be held in the afternoon, will be primarily for wool and mohair producers and processors. Through selection of a lamb and goat will be served at 5:30 p. m. by the TS&GRA President, Mr. J. P. Smith.

Members of the Association are expected to attend the clinic in addition to the members of the As-

sociation from West and Central Texas. The clinic should prove to be of special interest to mohair producers in the Mineral Wells area which has seen a recent marked increase in goat population.

Subcommittees of the three major TS&GRA committees, Wool and Mohair, General Affairs, and Livestock will convene Saturday at 10:00 a. m. in the Baker Hotel. Discussions will include wool and mohair marketing information, sheep and goat improvement programs, ranch labor problems, livestock theft and predatory animal control, animal health matters, and lamb marketing. 99 or 55 could be assigned, thereby limiting number assignments.

As the number of customers being assigned 215N telephone numbers increased, the necessity for using all possible number combinations on the dial increased. In other words, in some areas we are running out of possible letter prefixes, the district manager said.

As a result of this realization, a study was undertaken in Wichita Falls, Texas, to determine whether assigning seven digit telephone numbers proved satisfactory to customers and operators. Conclusion of the extensive study was that the ANC plan not only was satisfactory, but even eliminated some previous dialing errors resulting from confusion between the numeral 1 and the letter I and numeral zero and the letter O.

All Ozona business customers are urged to plan for their new numbers on stationery, letterheads, etc.

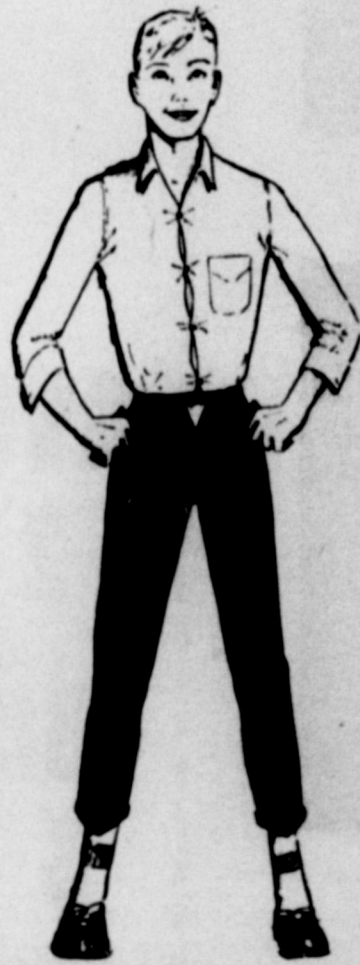

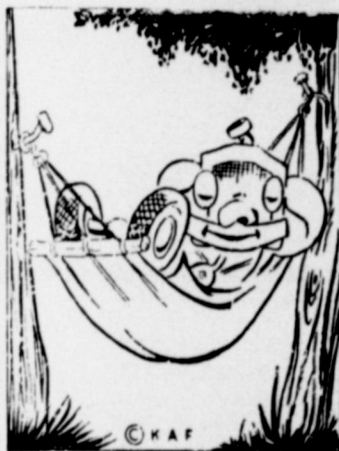
