## Football Squad Leaves Monday For Encampment

### Ozona and Fort Stockton Boys To Train at Chandler's

Coach Dan Patterson, former S. M. U. star and new athletic coach at Ozona High school for the coming school year, was here the first of the week to complete preliminary arrangements for the summer camp for prospective members of the local football squad for the 1940 season.

The week's outing, during which the boys will be put through physical conditioning exercises, engage in touch football practice and other activities, is scheduled to start Monday and continue through Friday of next week.

The camp is to be held on the Chandler ranch on Independence creek in Terrell county. Joining the Ozona squad will be the football prospects from Fort Stockton High school under Coach Clyde Park, the two squads to combine their programs for the week to get the maximum benefit from the outing. Activities will include track work, touch football, swimming and other physical conditioning activities.

## Oil Discoveries In County Result In New Litigation

Nine new lawsuits, litigation that has grown out of discovery of oil production on the western edge of Crockett county, starting with the Huggs gas and oil producer on the Noelke ranch and the new Strawn lime producing field on the Todd ranch about 15 miles northwest of Ozona, will face the 112th district court when the tribunal is convened September 16 for the regular fall term.

In addition to the land suits, involving title to lands and leases in areas most sought after as a result of the new discoveries, there will be five new divorce actions for attention of the court, one injunction suit and one suit for partition and title.

Judge W. C. Jackson will convene the fall court term September 16. Prospective petit and grand jurors are now being summoned by the sheriff's department.

## It's Your Privilege VOTE SATURDAY

AN EDITORIAL

With the Democratic system of government in the greatest peril in the history of the world, with millions of peoples in the old world ground under the ruthless heel of the dictator, their personal liberties abrogated, regimented and enslaved, the privilege of the ballot should appeal more strongly to Americans this year than ever before.

Although the fellow who wins may not always be to our liking, the system by which he gets elected to office in this country is the thing our forefathers fought and died for and the sacred heritage which Americans—real Americans—are now dedicated to preserve.

The Democratic process is most forcefully demonstrated when a commanding majority of voters go to the polls on election day and register a choice for candidates. In this way only does a majority rule and that's the essence of democracy.

Next Saturday Texans go to the polls to choose men to administer several important offices in this state. This election, the run-off primary in this one-party state, is as important, perhaps more important, than the first primary. It is the final heat, the final choice for these public officers. There are not as many choices to make, of course, but each one is important, and it is not only the duty but also the privilege of every qualified voter to register a choice for these offices.

Less than half the voters of Crockett county went to the polls in the first primary. This, no doubt, was due to a lack of an absorbing interest in any local races. But there is one important district race and the state races to be decided in the run-off. In a democracy, every voter should cast his vote, and it is to be hoped that voters in this county will realize their responsibility and go to the polls in numbers next Saturday.

## School Athletes To Be Protected With Insurance

### Policy To Pay Treatments For Injury In Contests

Ozona high school's athletes will be insured against injuries beginning with the opening of school with a blanket policy which was examined and recommended by Interscholastic League officials at Austin, according to announcement this week by C. S. Denham, superintendent.

The insurance policy, carried on 28 boys of the school's prospective athletic squads, provides payment for all types of injuries, including fractures, with varying amount paid depending on the bone fractured and seriousness of the break, dislocations, eye, abdominal, dental or head injuries, sprains, lacerations, cuts, etc.

Benefits under the policy are payable only for injuries suffered while the student is engaged in a scheduled game or track meet or while engaged in a practice session or intramural activity under the supervision of a regularly employed coach or director. Names of other students may be substituted in the event an insured student does not continue participation in some form of athletics.

In addition to the accident benefits provided in the regular policy, the local schools provide a life insurance policy of \$500 payable in event of accidental death resulting from athletic activities. This provision as a rider was provided at an additional cost of 20 cents per student, the regular policy, covering all sports, being obtained at a premium cost of \$2.75 per athlete.

With the season's end in sight next week, Ozona's softball league second half championship is still decidedly undecided, with two teams battling on more or less even terms for the second half crown.

Bryan McDonald's Water Works gladiators are two games in the lead of Arthur Kyle's Laundry squad, winners of the first half championship, but the Laundrymen have a bare chance of coming out ahead of the water boys with a lot of "ifs." If they can win both of the remaining two games they are scheduled to play, and if the Water Works team should lose three of its four remaining games, then the laundry men could sweep the series for the season championship.

But McDonald's men have but to win two more games, one of them against the Laundry when the two meet in the next to final game on August 28, or win the other three and lose to the Laundry, presuming the latter should win its game against Texacoers August 27.

It's a see-saw affair in the bottom half of the league standing, with the Williams team, hard-luck champs of the current contests, working their way from the bottom rung this week to change places with the Texaco team, reorganized from the West Texas Utilities team at the opening of the second half.

The league-leading Water boys won a rained-out game with the Williams team in an off-schedule game Friday night and took another Monday night from the Laundry crew. The Laundrymen took the Texacoers Thursday night and the Williams team last night. The only other game of the week was that Tuesday night when the Williams squad trounced the tobogganing Texacoers.

## Two Todd Wells Nearing Strawn Producing Level

Two more deep wells, seeking production in the Strawn lime of the three producing wells in the field, according to reports of drilling depths from the wells this week.

Yesterday's reports showed Amerada's No. 1 Todd, a half mile west of the Continental 2-B Todd, discovery well, had drilled to 5,430 feet in blue shale. Continental and others No. 5-B Todd, east offset to No. 4-B Todd, largest of the three producers in the field, was drilling at the same levels in shale.

## District Judge Race Spotlight Of Voting Here

### Run-Off Primary Saturday To Decide Important Offices

Although considerable interest will attach to the state offices at stake, particularly in the race for the Railroad Commission seat, the race between Judge W. C. Jackson of Fort Stockton and Judge J. B. Randolph of Junction for the office of judge of the 112th judicial district court will highlight local interest in the Democratic run-off primary next Saturday, August 24.

Judge Jackson, who is serving on the bench at present under appointment of the governor to fill out the unexpired term of Judge Joe G. Montague, fell short by 193 votes of obtaining a majority in the first primary over his two opponents, Judge Randolph and W. A. Hadden of Fort Stockton. Both have been campaigning in doubtful areas and a spirited race is expected in Saturday's voting.

Of perhaps as much interest as the district race for local voters will be the vigorously fought battle for Railroad Commissioner between Pierce Brooks and Olin Culbertson. These two emerged with the largest vote in the first primary of a field of eighteen candidates for the office.

The other two races left for decision of the voters at the run-off are both for judicial posts, for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and for Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, 8th district. James P. Alexander of Waco and H. S. Lattimore of Fort Worth are the candidates for the Supreme Court post and C. R. Sutton of Presidio county and A. T. Folsom of Winkler county are candidates for the El Paso Appeals Court bench.

## Movie Projection Machine Purchased For Ozona Schools

Visual education aids will be available for pupils of the elementary grades of Ozona schools during the coming session with delivery of a sound-on-film projection machine ordered by school authorities recently. Supt. C. S. Denham has announced.

The projection machine, a Bell and Howell 16 mm. projector, is portable and can be used in both the grade and high school, but will be used principally in the grade school, where a studio is to be outfitted in one of the basement rooms. A portable screen of size recommended for the machine was purchased with the projector.

Visual aid films are available from a number of libraries over the country, the University of Texas, Texas Tech and other Texas schools providing such films as well as sources outside the state. These films will be rented by the school as occasion demands.

The projector will be available for use of women's clubs and other organizations of the city, the superintendent said.

No-Third-Term Democrats

Thomas Jefferson, Madison, Jackson, Cleveland, Wilson and all of the great Democrats of the past adhered strictly to the tradition that two terms is sufficient for any man of any party.

Those great stalwarts of the faith believed just as many of us today believe that in a Democracy there is no indispensable man and in our nation there can be no perpetuity in office.

With these declarations as their tenets, a group of Texas Democrats, headed by Mike Hogg of Houston, will lay the groundwork for what might be another major revolt in traditionally Democratic Texas next November when they meet for a mass meeting in Dallas August 28 to form an organization of Texas Democrats opposed to a third term.

No names are called; the heads of the movement are issuing the call for the mass meeting in support of a democratic principle that has been accepted by all our great leaders since the birth of America, a tradition that has come



to be looked upon as one of the strongest safeguards for our democratic form of government. It is unfortunate that this safeguard has been left merely a matter of tradition, rather than being written into the constitution as an unbreakable law.

S. J. R. NO. 4

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature authority to provide for appeal direct to the Supreme Court in cases involving injunctions granted or denied on grounds of constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute on validity or invalidity of administrative orders; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this state; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expenses of publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 3-b, which shall read as follows: "Section 3-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law, for an appeal direct to the Supreme Court of this State from an order of any trial court granting or denying an interlocutory or permanent injunction on the grounds of the constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute of this State, or on the validity or invalidity of any administrative order issued by any state agency under any statute of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election. 18-4tc

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 9-A; providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, shall have the authority to levy a tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of the County by the issuance of bonds under the provisions of the General Laws regulating the refunding of outstanding debts of the County; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another Section to be known as Section 9-A, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9-A. Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning rendered taxable property therein so authorizing, the Commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas, may levy an annual tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding all the outstanding warrant in-

debtedness of the General Fund of such County and issue bonds under the provisions of the General Law regulating the issuance of bonds to refund said indebtedness.

"At such election, the Commissioners Court shall submit for adoption the proposition of whether such outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County shall be refunded into bonds, the amount of special tax to be levied, and the number of years said tax is to be levied. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters.

"The provisions of this Section 9-A shall apply only to Red River County; and the provisions hereof shall be self-enacting without the necessity of an enabling act of the Legislature of the State of Texas, but shall become effective immediately after the official canvass of the result has been made and it is determined that this amendment has been adopted by a majority of the voters of the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon a vote of the qualified electors therein, levy a tax and issue bonds to refund the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County"; those voters opposing such Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon a vote of the qualified electors therein, levy a tax and issue bonds to refund the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation and to have necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election, which shall be refunded to the State of Texas by Red River County out of its General Fund or any other available fund. Provided that no election shall be held until Red River County shall first deposit with the State Treasurer the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) with which to pay such expense of said election. 18-4tc

H. J. R. NO. 8

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 30b of Article 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years, shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows:

"Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of Statute or charter provisions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing appointment to and removal from such offices, the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service law or charter provisions applicable thereto."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots these words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published, as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. 18-4tc.

S. J. R. NO. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Section 26 of Article IV so as to provide that Notaries Public be appointed by the Secretary of State of the State of Texas; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 26 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 26. (a) The Secretary of State shall appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for each county who shall perform such duties as now are or may be prescribed by law. The qualifications of Notaries Public shall be prescribed by law.

(b) Nothing herein shall affect the terms of office of Notaries Public who have qualified for the present term prior to the taking effect of this amendment.

(c) Should the Legislature enact an enabling law hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election. 18-4tc.

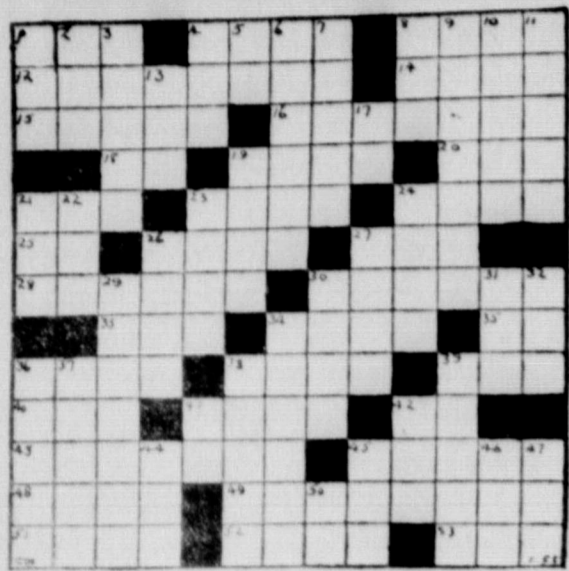

Behind The Scenes In American Business  
By John Craddock

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—In view of the general recognition that the pace of national defense goods production is the chief governing factor in the state of business, news that the "log-jam" which has held up aircraft procurement apparently has been broken up is of prime importance. An agreement has now been reached between the government and the aircraft industry that will allow for awarding of contracts and immediate undertaking of production—without waiting for enactment of the new tax bill covering excess profits. . . . Within a few hours after the agreement was reached it had borne fruit, in the form of an \$11,000,000-contract with one firm for 700 planes, and other contracts were expected to be signed within a few days. These would involve about a dozen other aircraft, accessory and engine manufacturers, for production of approximately 4,000 ships for the air corps—at a complete cost of around \$400,000,000. This development will almost surely open the way for similar arrangements with respect to production of many other kinds of munitions.

WASHINGTON.—Just what does all this national defense plant-building and equipment-installing amount up to? Government economists have just surveyed the whole scene, and come up with the estimate that plant expansion and new equipment purchases of industry, for 1941, will be right around \$3,000,000,000—as the result of the defense program. Such figures, of course, are always merely relative. It makes them more meaningful when it is explained that this is about one-third more than was spent, on the average, in the years of the last decade—and about three times as much as for the low years of 1932 and 1933, when capital outlays for new plant and equipment dropped below a billion. And if it finally becomes necessary to create brand new industries to supply Uncle Sam with rubber and other strategic materials now mostly imported, the expenditure may go well beyond that \$3,000,000,000 mark.

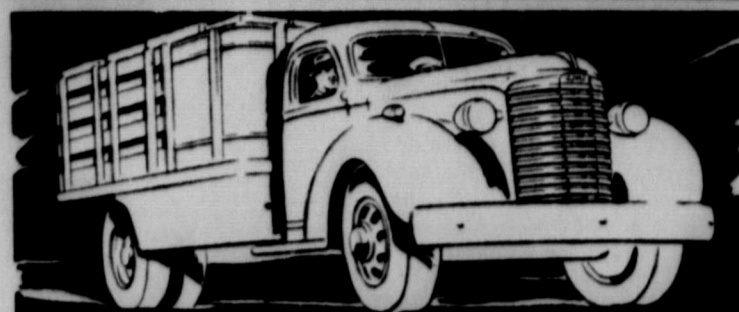

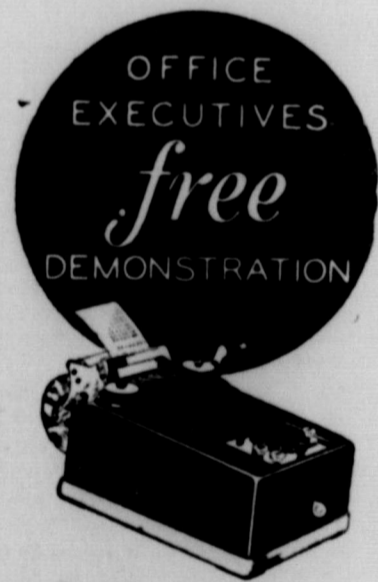

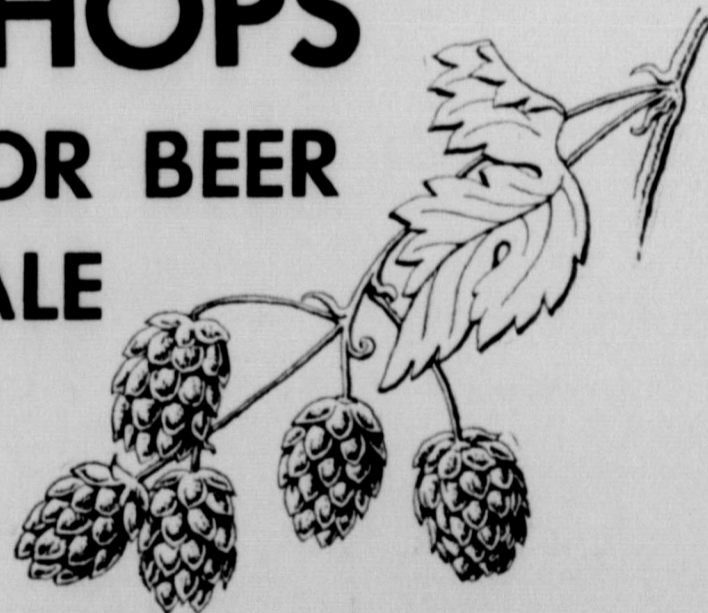

develop oil and gas on the several lease premises, and to carry the express and implied obligations to develop the same, to make exploration for oil and gas on said leases, and all of them have been abandoned.
