Iraan FA Chapter livestock judging team took top honors in the invitational judging contests held here following the ninth annual Ozona Commercial FFA livestock show Saturday.





They must have the exemption 30 days before any election they wish to vote in. Deadline for paying your poll tax is January 31. 1964.
