Summer School Classes Planned By Ozona High

Ozona School Board in its last meeting approved a summer school program for High School students. L. B. T. Sikes, superintendent, announced this week.

This will be a pilot program to determine whether or not such a program will be beneficial and accepted by the community. Subjects to be taught this summer will be Algebra I and English I.

"Actually there will be no rigid restrictions on pupil participation in this program," Mr. Sikes said, "although we expect the majority of those interested will be those who have not yet received credit for Algebra I and English I or those who wish to strengthen their understanding of the subjects. There might even be some future college students who would like a refresher course before going off to college."

To meet state requirements of 140 full hours of instruction for full credit, the summer school classes will last 7 to 8 weeks, 5 days a week, for 3 to 4 hours a day. Mr. Sikes said classes will be conducted mornings, starting at 8 a. m. Starting and closing dates for the classes will be announced later. Classes will be in the classrooms of the new air-conditioned library.

The charge for each course will be \$30 for the entire course, which is two dollars cheaper than a full credit by correspondence. Mr. Sikes said a minimum of 20 students will be required for the program to break even, he said.

Brooks Dozier will be instructor for the Algebra I course and Joe Marlett will teach the English I course. Persons interested may enroll by contacting J. A. Pelto, high school principal, Mr. Sikes or Mr. Dozier.

College Station — Atomic energy and its uses will be demonstrated at Ozona High School April 27.

Ozona Tracksters Seek Regional Title In Lubbock This Week-End

New Cage Coach Charles Spieker Was Star At ASC

School Supt. L. B. T. Sikes announced this week that Angelo State College Little All-American basketball star, Charles Spieker has accepted the post as head basketball coach for Ozona High School. Mr. Sikes said that he had been authorized by the school board at its last meeting to draw up a contract with Spieker.

"We feel very fortunate in having acquired the services of one of the top young coaches in Texas," Sikes said. "He comes highly recommended by ASC and certainly has an outstanding college record."

Mr. Sikes said that Mr. Spieker's exact teaching assignment had not yet been determined.

The Ram athlete was All-District in NAIA this season, plus being selected on both the NAIA and AP Little All-American squads. During his four seasons as a Ram Cager Spieker scored 1,456 points to rank second among all-time scorers.

Spieker helped the Ram freshmen to a Western Junior Conference crown and then sparked San Angelo Junior College to a 12th place national rating as a sophomore.

He has been a four year starter for coach Phil George and team captain for the past three seasons. Spieker holds all the records for free throws at ASC and is one of three cagers to score 30 points in a single game.

During the spring Spieker doubles as a pitcher and heavy hitting outfielder for coach Buddy Horn's baseball nine. Saturday, Spieker hurled 11 innings and struck out 14 to bring his NAIA district record to 3-0.

Heavy Rainfall Soaks Southern Part Of County

Some parts of Crockett County were literally soaked while others got little or no moisture Monday afternoon from heavy clouds moving in from the west.

In Ozona 61 of an inch of rain fell, with no appreciable amount recorded in the northern part of the county. However, rainfall around Sheffield and ranchlands west of town reported an inch to two inches of rain.

South of town where up to five inches was reported on the Marshall Montgomery ranch, several head of livestock were drowned. Rufus Ward, 20 miles south of town, reported over 2 inches of rain with heavy hail. Farther south near Juno, only 2 of an inch was reported.

Southwest of Ozona on the Johnnie Henderson ranch up to 5 inches of rain was reported and southeast in the Taylor Box Draw area up to three inches of rain fell.

Monday's rain followed the same general pattern as last week's rainfall except for heavier amounts reported in most sections.

Crockett Co. 4-H Clubs Compete In Dist. Contests

Crockett county 4-H club members have been busy in district 4-H events the past two weeks. Four 4-H members represented the county at the district 4-H food show in McCamey. The two junior 4-H members, Laurie Longoria and Melecio Martinez, both placed in the top division and received blue ribbon awards. In the senior division, Janie Edgerton placed in the second division, receiving a red ribbon and Nora Perez placed in the third division and received a white ribbon.

The senior 4-H rifle team placed fourth in district competition at Crane last Saturday. Team members were Duwain Vinson, Jr., Jesse Deaton, Steve Hubbard and Janie Edgerton. The team was coached by Kent Johnston, 4-H rifle club adult leader.

Louise Perner, local 4-H club girl, participated in the Sutton county 4-H horse show, open to all the West Texas area, and came home with a first, second and fifth place awards with her entries.

foot injury to sprinter Fleet Coates may hurt the Lion chances in both the relays where Lion coaches had counted on 1st or 2nd place finishes, with each first worth 20 points and seconds worth 16 points.

The Lions entered 7 boys and both relay teams in the qualifiers meet in Winters last Saturday and would have the championship trophy if one had been awarded because Lion tracksters captured 6 firsts and a second to easily outdistance the B, A, and AA field.

Pacing the Lions was Geo. Cox who sped to a 9.7 100 yard dash record and 22.2 in the 220. Cox also ran the anchor leg on the sprint relay team. Entering the 199 for only the second time this year, Cox found the weather, warm and still, and sped to the 9.7 clocking, perhaps an OHS school record at least for the past 13 years. Cox will enter the 220 yard dash and both relays at regional.

Big Gary Sutton won his usual two first place medals with a 54'10 1/2" toss in the shot, nearly 3 feet off his best of 57'5" and 170" in the discus. The 170 footer exceeds Sutton's previous best by 2 inches. Sutton could hit 60 feet in the shot and 180 feet in discus and appears to be the favorite for both titles at the state meet.

Ozona's outstanding freshman pole vaulter, Tony Cullins won the event with a 11'6" shoo-in. Cullins set the District 8A record of 12'7 1/2" on April 7th, and with three years of eligibility remaining he could easily develop into Texas' top schoolboy vaulter.

Sophomore Rodney Pagan, who surprised with a win in the high jump in district, repeated his performance and won the Winters high jumping crown with a jump of 5'10". Pagan has been high jumping less than a month in shooting for 6' at the regional meet.

Maggie Galindo, Lion junior miler, has been slowed by illness but came on strong to win the district crown in 4:54.7. Galindo could pick up some important points in Lubbock.

Track co-captain Derold Maney is set for the 440 yard dash, and is capable of running a 51 or better. Maney has been improving quickly and has developed into a strong runner, running a leg on the mile relay and the third leg on the sprint relay.

Senior Thomas DeHoyos will run the first leg of the sprint relay along with Cox, Maney, and Coates. Coates, providing his injured foot allows him to run, will run on both relay teams.

Tippett Field Gains New Pay And Confirmer

The Tippett field of Crockett County gained a new pay and a confirmation and the Tippett, West field a confirmation with triple completion of Southwestern Natural Gas, Inc., No. 2 Tippett, 10 mile southeast of McCamey.

As a Hueco opener in the Tippett field, it was finaled for 240 barrels of 39 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of load water, with gas-oil ratio of 206-1.

Production was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,880-4,930 feet, which had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and fractured with 30,000 gallons and 45,000 pounds of sand.

Top of pay picked at 4,880 feet on derrick floor elevation of 2,306 feet.

As a third 4,950-foot Wolf-camp producer and a 1 1/2-mile northwest extension to that pay in the Tippett field, it was finaled for 168 barrels of 38 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,800-1.

Production was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 4,971-4,982 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons. Top of pay was picked at 4,971 feet.

As a second 5,000-foot detrital producer and a 1/2-mile east extension to that pay in the Tippett, West multi-pay field, it was finaled for 192 barrels of 37.6 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,900-1.

Production was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,017-030 feet, which had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and acidized with 2,000 gallons. Top of pay was picked at 5,023 feet.

Slated as a 7,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat, it was drilled to 6,736 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at that depth.

While being drilled it also indicated Connell sand production with the recovery of 3,800 feet of gas and 300 feet of mud-cut oil on a test at 6,548-585 feet, and lower Leonard, with the flowing of gas at the rate of 577,000 cubic feet daily and the reversing out of 1/2 barrel of oil and 450 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud.

Location is 660 feet from the southeast and 4,620 feet from the northeast lines of 37-31-H&TC

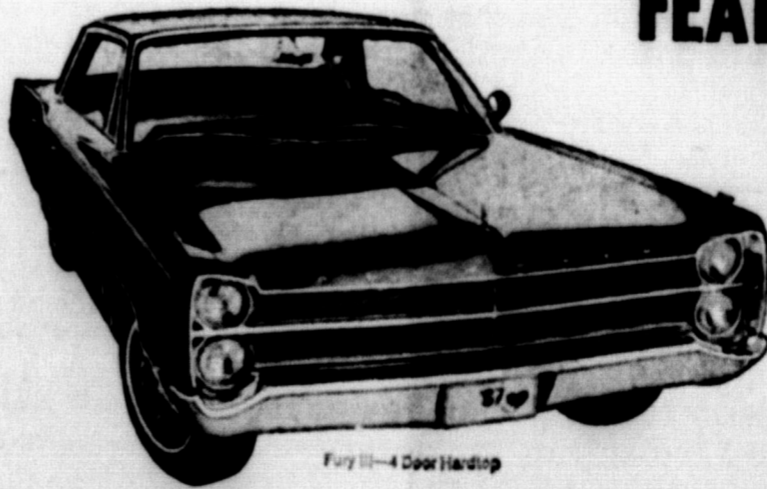
