Crockett Co. Hospital To Apply For Participation In Medicare

At the January meeting of the Commissioners Court, it was decided to investigate the possibility of securing Medicare Service for Crockett County citizens thru the Crockett County hospital. Lee Rheubottom, Hospital Administrator, was present at the meeting and was re-

quested to have a representative come to the hospital and conduct a survey in regard to the changes and expenses that would be required of the present staff and facilities to meet the requirements for participation in the Medicare program.

After this survey was completed and the report submitted to the Commissioners Court, a joint meeting of the Hospital Board and the Commissioners Court was called. The report, showing all provisions necessary for this hospital to qualify, was studied. It was revealed that most additional personnel requirements could be met by consulting services at a nominal fee. This provision makes it possible for small hospitals to fulfill their obligations without prohibitive expense.

"It was the general opinion of this group, that even though we could not be assured that Medicare would improve the financial status of the hospital, this was a service our citizens are paying for and that they need to be able to secure this service in our hospital," County Judge Berrice Jones reported.

At the regular meeting of the Hospital Board of February 6th, and the Commissioners Court's regular meeting on February 10th, it was unanimously approved by both groups. Rheubottom was directed to prepare all forms and to proceed with the official application for participation of the Crockett County Hospital in the Medicare program.

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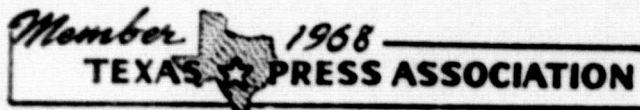

MORE STUDENT DEMANDS

Not to be outdone by the Jewish high school students in California who compiled their "demands" upon the administrators of their school, the Italian students at San Francisco State have come up with some demands of their own.

The Italian-American students want "immediate hiring of two Italian professors of law, a Sicilian Defense Workshop which shall encourage legal aid to members of the Mafia and Cosa Nostra, background tarantella and opera music at lunch-time, vending machines to offer pizza, both sausage and pepperoni, ravioli and garlic bread and 8-ounce cans of Dago Red, and school holidays on Columbus Day, the birthdays of Benito Mussolini and all other Italian war heroes.

But even they have been topped. At the University of Arizona, a group known as the Western Union has demanded recognition of its demands. The spokesman, Mr. Booz Hill, states that he is following the example of

the Black students and the Mexican-American students, who individually filed their ultimatums in the past few weeks.

Mr. Hill states that his Western Union members demand the following: they want to be taught the "colorful language of the Old West"; they are tired of learning modern language from modern teachers; they want degree courses in cowboy history, including in the curriculum cowboy philosophy; at least 5 spittoons in every classroom and chewing tobacco vending machines on the campus and in all residence halls; ROTC courses must include horse cavalry with all instructors having acceptable rodeo experience; credit hours to be given for attending sessions at accredited rodeo schools and a course about cows, white, brown and black, to be taught straight from the cow's mouth.

The final Western Union demand is that U. of Arizona President, Dr. Richard Harvill, appear in front of the Student Union Annex Post

Corn Pudding

2 Pkgs. frozen cut corn, cooked
3 eggs well beaten
1/4 cup light cream
1 teas. salt
dash of pepper
2 tbs. minced onion
1/4 teas. baking powder
Thinly sliced sharp Cheddar cheese
3 slices bacon, cut in 1-inch squares

Mix the corn, eggs, cream, seasonings, onions and baking powder. Pour into a greased medium casserole. Cover with cheese, cut to fit, and then with bacon squares. Bake 40-45 minutes in a moderate oven, 350-degrees, or until firm. Serves 6.

Scalloped Potatoes with a Difference

4 medium potatoes, peeled and sliced thin
Salt and pepper
Flour
2 tbs. butter
3 cups chicken broth or consomme condensed

Place half the potatoes in medium casserole, sprinkle with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. Add remaining potatoes and sprinkle again with salt, pepper and flour. Dot with butter and pour the chicken broth or consomme over and bake covered, in 375-degree oven 25-30 minutes. Uncover and continue baking 10-15 minutes longer or until potatoes are tender and liquid almost absorbed.

Sensing The News

The Issue of Responsibility: McNamara and the Pueblo

Reaction to proceedings in the naval court of inquiry investigating the loss of the Pueblo has not been altogether healthy. Danger exists that blame will be attached to the wrong parties.

We live in an age of permissiveness and excuses, and the weight fashionable opinion is against holding people to strict account for their actions. Thus it is that there has been an outcry in some quarters against any stern questioning of Commander Bucher, former commanding officer of the Pueblo.

Regardless of whether Commander Bucher was right or wrong in his conduct as commanding officer of a naval vessel, it is only proper that the Navy determine who was accountable for a ship belonging to the United States falling into enemy hands. Accountability is a fundamental concept in the Navy and other armed services. The principle is the foundation on which accurate, faithful service is rendered to the United States.

Unfortunately, the intellectual climate of our era is such many people try to disguise or dismiss responsibility. They give psychological or sociological reasons for not pinpointing responsibility. But a nation can't live by excuses. It has to be very sure that those who are given responsibility are held accountable and answer for mistakes if they make them.

Some of the same people who were so eager a few years ago to muzzle the military are now saying that the "Navy brass" are at fault for sending the Pueblo to sea when she was inadequately armed. They are hastening to convict the military professionals and the professional concept of responsibility. They say that the Navy should emphasize compassion, not accountability. Compassion is a virtue in its proper sphere, but compassion should not be reserved for those who fail to carry out their orders. The defense of the United States cannot be based on sentimentality.

What is needed in considering the loss of the Pueblo is cold-eyed realism. If any uniformed officer was at fault, whether commander or admiral, that fact should be established and made public, and appropriate reprimand should be made. But the public also has a right to expect that the inquiry will go beyond the uniformed personnel concerned. The question should be asked why old, ill-armed vessels are sent on dangerous missions.

The answer to that question must be sought by the Congress. But it is clear that the much-abused "Navy brass" have spent the last eight years asking for new ships. The vast majority of U. S. warships were built during World War II, and are now overage.

Though the "Navy brass" asked for new ships, to carry out assigned cold war missions such as electronic intelligence off the North Korean coast, they have not received them in adequate numbers. The reason is that former Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara fiercely resisted building a modern fleet.

While the Kennedy and Johnson administrations poured billions of dollars into political programs designed to harvest votes, they de-

clined to construct the ships needed for the security of the United States.

Mr. McNamara allowed many elements in the U. S. defense establishment to run down dangerously. Ships were taken from the Atlantic Fleet and sent to the Pacific. Inventories of spare parts were seriously depleted, and replacements not ordered. Far from being the brilliant manager his publicists termed him, Mr. McNamara was a reckless managerial figure who allowed the overall defense enterprise to become unbalanced and weak in many respects.

It is a matter of historical record that Mr. McNamara opposed development of a nuclear fleet and rejected other programs aimed at modernization of the Navy. It is impossible for a naval court of inquiry to call Mr. McNamara to testify on why he let the fleet run down, a policy that is pertinent to the Pueblo tragedy. But a congressional investigating committee can call Mr. McNamara and all the other former high administration officials who had a hand in the Pueblo affair or who counseled against retaliation when a U. S. warship was snatched off the high seas. The full story of the Pueblo disaster and all the key figures in it should be revealed for the public. The way to get the facts is for Congress to hold open hearings. That way, the responsibility for all aspects of a dark chapter in American history will be pinpointed.

Scott Henderson On River Gunboat In South Vietnam

Gunner's Mate Third Class John Scott Henderson, formerly of Ozona, has received orders to serve as a crew member aboard a River Patrol Boat (PBR) operating from Saigon, South Vietnam. Petty Officer Henderson is currently assigned to the USS McMorris, a Destroyer-Escort homeported at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. He is in charge of a three-inch, rapid-fire gun mount, and serves as assistant to the Public Affairs Officer.

The McMorris recently returned from special operations in the Indian Ocean. During the four-month deployment, the ship visited Guam, the Philippine Islands, Ceylon, and Mauritius Island near Madagascar in the Indian Ocean. The return voyage brought port calls in Albany and Sydney, Australia, and Noumea, New Caledonia. On the historic island of Tarawa in the Gilbert Islands, Petty Officer Henderson took part in a memorial ceremony on the twenty-fifth anniversary of the bloody battle for possession of the coral atoll.

While in Vietnam, Petty Officer Henderson will be assigned as a gunner aboard the tiny but heavily-armed PBR's. The Boat's operations include working closely with ground and air units to squelch enemy infiltration and maintain security of waterbound supply routes in South Vietnam. Crewmembers comprise a part of the

Navy's black-beret Special Forces team.

Henderson, who was promoted to Third Class Petty Officer in December, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Henderson who now reside in Aguilar, Colorado. He will receive two month's additional training in counter-insurgency and survival tactics at Mare Island, California prior to his transfer to Vietnam.
