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

**School Children Must Have Shots To Enrol** 

Supt. L. B. T. Sikes reminded parents of school has been set for Ozona. Local children of the recently passed bill by the Texas Legislature which requires immunization against several diseases before admittance to school. Before enrolling in school

this fall all students must show proof of immunization against diphtheria, rubeola, rubella, tetanus, poliomyelitis and smallpox.

The bill applies to students enrolling in any elementary or secondary school or institution of higher education with two exceptions. The immunizations are not required if the student presents an affidavit signed by a doctor who is duly registered and licensed under the Medical Practice to the historical mark- Act of Texas, in which it is

#### **BLIND-ALLEYS OF CONFUSION**

We have been seized with the idea for some time now that there is more madness than method in the following:

- The desperate pursuit of defeat for the Allies in Vietnam by some persons, papers and politicians.
- 2 The inspired drives to get rid of Edgar Hoover as head of the F.B.L, ignoring older men in Congress or on the Supreme Court.
- The much-publicized wartime trials of American 3. mulitary officers accused of battlefield crimes.
- The persistent deficits in our international trade balances year after year, with this year's threatening to be the worst of all.
- The proposed increases in welfare, though the 5. Federal budget is faced with another big deficit.
- A running debate on ending all capital punish-6. ment, along with the discovery of 25 bodies of men murdered by someone totally undeterred by the prospect of life imprisonment.

Each of these developments follows a course that is not consistent with the history of the United States. It is not normal to seek defeat, nor to try military officers in the middle of a war, nor to drop the head of the F.B.I. because of age without concern about the ages of other top government officials, nor to argue more about the rights of killers than of those liable to be killed.

Each of these developments weakens and confuses the nation. They are by no means the only such actions. Whatever the motivations, they should not be permitted to lead us into chaos. 

Those few who have been exposed to foreign ideas, remarks the author, Seymour Topping, "have been re-educated or absorbed in the villages as peasants."

In many factories, continued Topping, the army "grapples with" any resentment over the fact that workers do not get paid overtime. They work a six-day week, they often work on the seventh day, and they have to listen to propaganda lectures day after day on their "free" time

Topping confirms the fact that Red China has not yet entered the industrial age, while many countries have passed into the post-industrial electronic era of automation and computerization. The average worker in Taiwan produces 39 times as much as the average worker on the Mainland.

Another of the "great feats" of Mao's China is that "virtually all places of worship were closed," reported Topping, and "the sophisticated Chinese taste for beauty and grace in art finds little satisfaction in the Maoist society.

Another of the "great feats" of Mao is that he has reopened many of the universities he closed down several years ago, reported Topping "but most of their student bodies and faculties have been sharply reduced in size." He continued: "Strong emphasis is now placed on practical rather than theoretical studies," pointing out that two years of manual labor is being used to replace the three years of secondary school. "Garbed in loose-fitting tunics and trousers," he added, the people have a "unisex" look

Still another "feat" of Red China is that the average city family has to live entirely in one room, but they can "often" get one more room if the grandparents move known for its aid to the blind in. 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



A hook is to fishing what a bullet is to hunting. Each is inexpensive, yet each is THE item that actually puts fish and game on the table.

The only time a good hook costs in excess of a dime is where big-gamefish species are involved. But for the usual largemouth bass, speckled trout, flounder, redfish, etc., caught in Texas waters, the general hooks sold in sporting goods stores will suffice.

Most fishermen buy a sufficient quantity of hooks. However, they err in trying to make hooks perform "above and beyond" this period of usefulness and purpose.

We know a few professional saltwater fishing guides who will not use a hook for more than one fishing trip. On the other hand we know some fishermen who try to hoard hooks and seek to make them stand for countless fishing trips.

The true life of a good fishhook is somewhere in between. 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
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



A. I can't think of any device which would force you into the nearest savings bank on pay day. BUT, I certainly favor a system which would help you put money aside

- Q. Hasn't the time run out for some of the older E Bonds?

The Treasury recently announced a third 10-year extension for E Bonds issued from May 1941 through April 1952, a second 10-year extension for E Bonds issued from May 1952 through January 1957, and a second 10-year extension for H Bonds issued from June 1952 through January 1957. Incidentally, Freedom Shares-sold in combination with E Bonds from May 1967 through June 1970-have been granted a 10-year extension, so they, too, will continue to earn interest.
- Q. Should I cash in my old E Bonds and buy new ones paying the higher rate?






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
