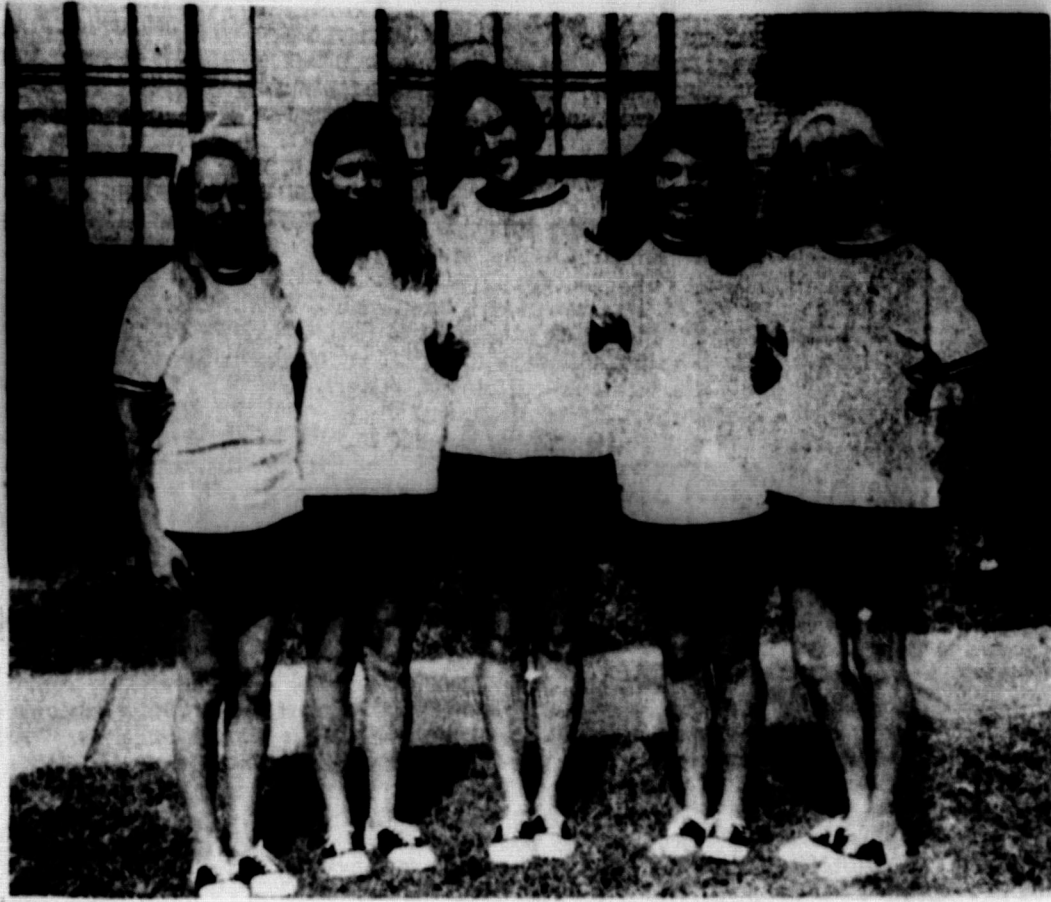
Kitty's Korner

Newest Historical Markers To Be Dedicated During Local History Appreciation Week, Sept. 22-28

The Crockett County Historical Survey Committee is asking Ozona residents to circle their calendars the week of September 22-28 which has been designated "Local History Appreciation Week." In a time of rapid change and stress it is well to pause for a moment and take a new look at the foundations on which the community was built.

Citizens are urged to visit the local museum look at early pictures and items from pioneer homes which are on display there, visit the County Clerk's office where Miss Leta Powell has a fine collection of Ozona history and stories, and reflect on the traditions that have gone into the development of our community.

The week will end with a special program on Sunday afternoon, September 28, at 3:00 p. m. in the Senior High School Auditorium.

Mrs. Ira Carson will show slides and tell the history of many local sites using her collection which reflects her life long interest in Crockett County. Following the program those present will be invited to go to the Junior High School Building, the Crockett Hotel and to Howard's Well marker on the Texas-Pecos Trail (Highway 290) 17 miles west of Ozona where Judge Bernice Bailey Jones will dedicate each of the three official Texas State Historical Markers erected by the local committee.

PEACE DEMONSTRATED BY PEACENIKS

The culmination of Hiroshima-Nagasaki Week sponsored by the peacenik groups was a parade through John Lindsay's Pan City, sometimes known as New York City, and at the end of the trek there was a rally in Central Park with the inevitable attacks on the government in general and President Nixon in particular.

It's strange that one of the darlings of the extreme left, poet Allen Ginsberg, was restrained from taking over the microphone by a group identified as members of the Students for a Democratic Society. Ginsberg is the beat poet known for his drumming, in which he merely sits and chants "Om-m-om-m-om-m" over and over. It's supposed to be soothing. Perhaps the SDSers thought Ginsberg would soothe the audience and obstruct their efforts to incite future violence. Who knows?

The extreme left's cousins, the neo-Nazi National Renaissance Party, also sent some cohorts to harass the marchers. These are the

clowns who keep forgetting that Adolph Hitler is dead. When this group tried to get the peaceniks to fight, the police intervened and averted the battle. It is sad that these radical groups start incidents of this kind, forcing the police to risk their necks to defend one faction from another.

There is not much we can add to this as editorial comment that you haven't heard before, but we thought you might share our interest in the internal feuds.

JUST ANOTHER SMALL BUSINESSMAN

How would you like to start a small business? Would you be interested in a \$135,000 loan with a \$15,000 personal stake to buy a \$135,000 automobile dealership? Try the Small Business Administration. It has the money, and its yours to begin with since it comes from the taxes you pay. The government guarantees payment of the loan and a local bank puts up the money.

This is one of our government's methods of helping

the needy small businessman get his foot in the door and build a small business of his own. It is a worthwhile project on the whole. We need more small businesses to spread the wealth of the nation to all who can make it in the field of business. Very few people really mind helping a man in need of a little capital to get a start.

In the case of the \$135,000 loan, you must be a member of a minority group to qualify. If you are not so qualified, the collateral and equity you are required to furnish might be up to 50% of the total amount of the loan. But as a member of a minority race you put up about 15% and, as in the instance above, this may be lowered or waived.

The government-guaranteed \$135,000 loan did go to a good risk, however, even though two banks had refused the applicant's previous requests for the money. He is currently employed at a salary of \$85,000 and must be a fairly good businessman since he already owns a share of a chicken franchise firm and a florist shop. The loan recipient is St. Louis Cardinal baseball player, Lou Brock, who said he thought that his loan request was being handled in the conventional manner. He has also said that he did not know the loan was being guaranteed under the privileged minority program.

We wonder how many more loan fall into this pattern? How many other \$85,000-a-year men are "starting out" in business with the taxpayer as co-signer on their loans? Maybe it's time someone found out. Where are the congressional watchdogs?

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THE PRINCE OF DARKNESS

Earl Warren's resignation became effective two months ago, June 23.

I have waited these days without comment much as a man hesitates to pronounce a successful the execution of a cancer. But times up, now it looks like Warren is gone, for a fact. Perhaps, then, it is safe to write his political obituary.

What a public life! Earl Warren so far as I have ever been able to learn, cannot lay claim to a single act of a creditable nature. This, after 59 years at the public trough. In 25 years of following his career and of being in the orbit of those who have known him well, I have never heard mention of a charitable act ever being performed by Earl Warren.

I do have memories of another sort, distinct memories. I will tell you of two.

I once had a friend named Clinton Duffy, who, when I first knew him, was warden of San Quentin. I remember, late of a summer's afternoon, sitting on Clint's front porch and listening to him spin prison tales. And what tales he told; he was born at the place, son of a deputy warden, as I remember.

Inevitably the talk turned to death row and, in turn, to the governor — Earl Warren. I wanted to know of the Great Man's clemency.

Clint Duffy told me, in effect, Warren had none: "Nobody will ever know," this famed penologist said, "how many men have been put to sleep in the Green Room because of the implacable, unbending nature of Warren. Men who should have been reprieved".

Clinton Duffy told me that.

And I remember the story told me by a man who, to the best of my knowledge, to day is a member of the California judiciary but who, during Warren's tenure as governor, served Warren as extradition - and - clemency secretary.

I got to know this then-young man because he con-

tinued on in the same post when I served in the governor's office as an aide to Warren's successor.

"There was this fellow scheduled to die", my friend told me. "I had given his execution papers to the governor for review — that was my duty — some days before. And they didn't come back and they didn't come back."

"Clint Duffy kept calling about what to do; whether to make preparations for the execution or not. I told him I couldn't tell him anything. Warren hadn't let out a peep."

"As time passed, I became frazzed. I didn't know what to do. The staff was deathly afraid of Earl Warren and none of us ever entered his office unless sent for. Even with a man's life hanging there, I couldn't screw up enough courage to ask for an interview."

"But I did, finally, when the execution was but a few hours off. And I will never forget standing in front of Warren's desk. I began to stammer out why I was there and I made a hash of it. When the purpose of my visit finally got through to him I could see the blood begin to rise out of his collar. It crept past his wattles but I couldn't stop talking. Finally, he was livid and I shut up. And there I stood. Warren's pale eyes glowed. I will never forget what he said: 'When I want advice from a secretary, I will send for you.'"

"I crept out of there".

Dwight Eisenhower, unknowing as always, appointed this man Chief Justice of the United States and never denied the widespread story of a comment he reputedly made about that appointment: The appointment of Warren, so they had Ike saying, " was the biggest damn' fool mistake I ever made".

The U. S. Senate will soon begin action on confirmation of President Nixon's nomination of Judge Clement Furman Haynsworth of South Carolina to fill the late Fortas vacancy on the Supreme Court.

Although confirmation is opposed by such liberal forces as NAACP, AFL-CIO and the extreme left-wing Americans for Democratic Action, as of this time it appears likely — but by no means certain — that the Senate will vote confirmation.

The Judge, now 56, was appointed to the Court of Appeals by President Eisenhower 12 years ago. He is a venerable and distinguished member of the bar whose decisions on the bench have indicated that he is a strict constructionist who believes it is the duty of courts to interpret the law, not to make the law.

Haynsworth is the first man from the South to be appointed to the Supreme Court since 1954. His record shows that he believes in the Constitution, in law and order, and in the legitimate exercise of individual freedom. He certainly possesses the attributes to become a great Judge.

Thus, it may turn out that for the first time in 13 years the Supreme Court will be made up of men who are independent of the activist, liberal coalition which has ruled that Court throughout that period. As it now stacks up, assuming Judge Haynsworth is confirmed, the liberal activists will be in the minority, with the majority controlled by Justices Harlan, Stewart, White,

Haynsworth and Chief Justice Burger. And as many as three other vacancies on that Court appear likely before President Nixon leaves office.

This development is, of course, highly significant for the American people, and a welcome one. It may mark the beginning of a new era in judicial responsibility, with the Supreme Court in the future expected to adhere to strict construction of the Constitution, while exercising proper judicial restraint in carrying out its duties. Let us hope that will be the case.

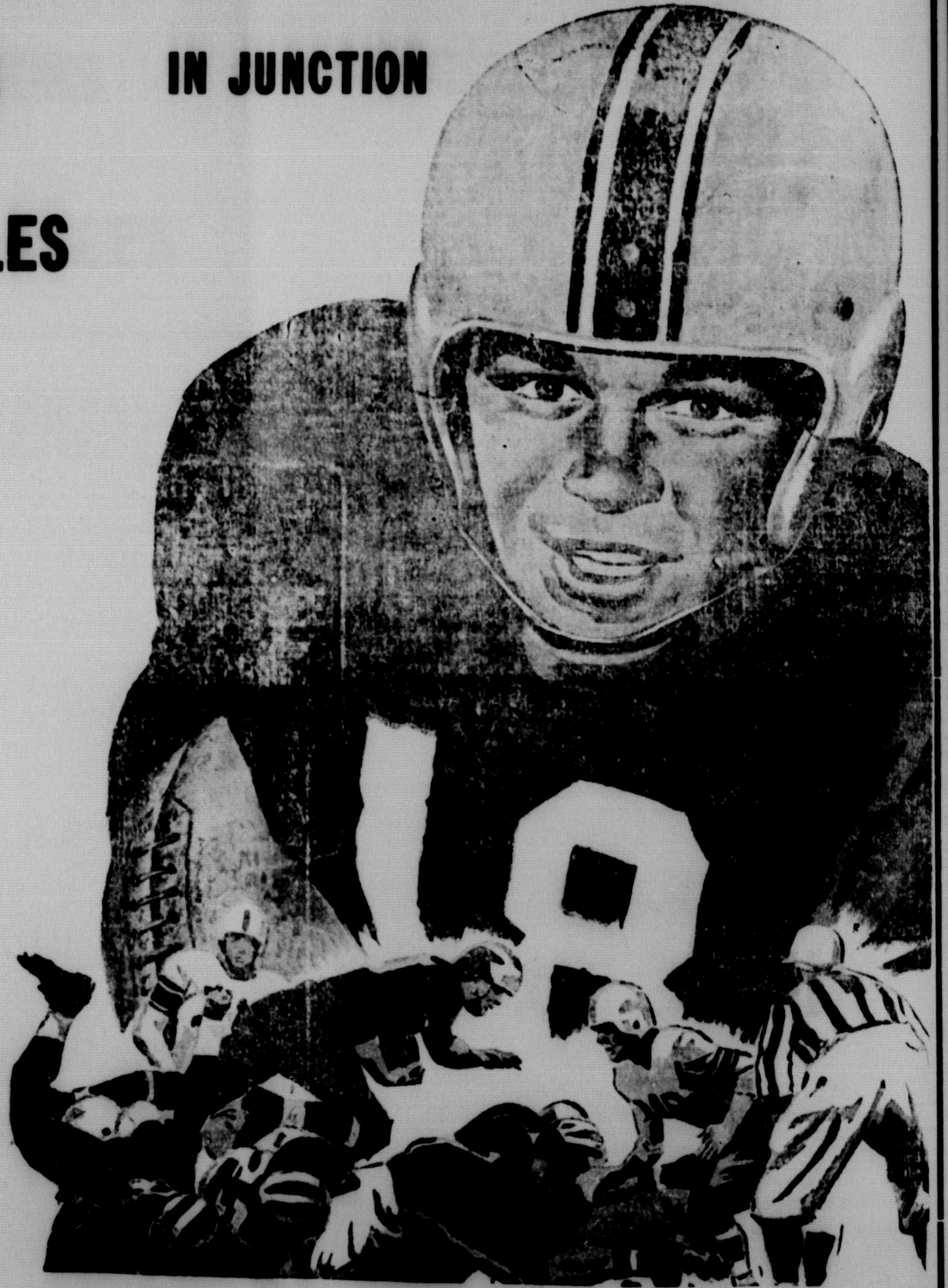
