Mr. Clepper was fatally County when he dived or jumped into the Llano river and sustained a broken neck.

He was pulled from the water by a friend and taken by automobile to Kimble Hospital in Junction by Mrs. Clepper. He was in poor condition and unconscious upon arrival. He was transferred by ambulance to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo Sunday morning suffering paralysis from the neck down.

Death came as he was being flown by air ambulance to a Houston hospital Wednesday morning. The plane was about twenty miles out of San Angelo when his condition became critical. The aircraft returned to Mathis Field and Clepper was rushed back to the hospital where he was dead on arri-
