Red Cross Roll **Call Enrollment** Climbs To \$485

# Final Canvass Next Week Expected To Reach 600 Goal

With two or three committee re ports not yet turned in and additional canvassing set for next week, Crockett County stands a good chance to go "over the top" in the 1941 annual Red Cross Roll Call drive which opened in whirlwind fashion Wednesday of last week with a record opening-day enrollment.

Reports from Miss Mildred North, Roll Call Chairman, yesterday indicated that the annual drive had produced a total of \$485.60, which represents a membership enrollment of 426.

Ed Vitela, chairman of the Latin-American committee, has not reported on results of the campaign in that sector. Reports also were lacking from a committee in charge of solicitation among ranchmen.

A wind-up campaign will be launched next week, Miss North announced, with the object of giving every person in the community an opportunity to enroll as a member of the Red Cross. Persons who have not yet been solicited are asked to see some member of the committee of workers, if possible, and take a \$1 membership. The Crockett County chapter has been assigned a quota of 600 memberships and if that goal is to be reached, it will require the cooperation of nearly every person in the community.



# Championship Decider Called For 2:30 On Eagle Field



## MeINTIRE GOES AFTER ADVENTURE IN TEXAS

In 1902 old Jim McIntire of Kansas City published the reminisences of a man who, he wrote in the introduction, had "seen as much lawless life and had perhaps as many hair-raising adventures as any man living." He had chased Indians and outlaws, had himself been chased across three states. had run gambling-houses and saloons, had shot up towns, and had been mashal and deputy sheriff in frontier settlements. And it all came from reading dime novels. The reminiscences were McIntire's own and were entitled "Earh Days in Texas." The volume is one of a score of valuable firsthand commentaries on old-time cowboy life available in the extensive Texas Collection of the University of Texas Library. He does not ask that we build tanks or airplanes overnight, but that, overnight, we make friendship real.

He speaks of a strange discrepancy. For four years the Chinese have been fighting and suffering untild misery. But in spite of all this, the Chinese believe that we are their friends. This belief has existed not for four years but for forty years. At least \$5,000,000 is desperately needed. Half of this money has been contributed, but Mr. Luce says that time is pressing and the other \$2,500,000 which is the minimum required must be raised.
