



**Big Brother Watches** 

If the Census Bureau, for the nation-wide nose counting next year gets away with adding still another Paul Pry question to the list that will be asked, Congress should perhaps cover census takers with combat pay, insurance for engaging in a hazardous occupation, and perhaps even be prepared to award Purple Hearts for in-juries suffered while on duty.

For it is very possible that tioners are going to be in line for a fistful of knuckles in the

The chief Paul Fry of the Census Bureau has now told Congress that it intends to ask the precise legal relationship of people living together. It is perhaps conceivable that those who are living together in what is known legally as an illicit relationship, or in the common vernacular are "shacking up" will not be bothered much by this question.

After all, it can be presumed in most of these cases the flouting of convention that results in setting up housekeeping sans clergy will not cause them undue embarrassment in describing the relationship. At least not as much embarrassment as the penalty of a \$100 fine, or months in jail, or both.

And perhaps this question is ustified. Taking the census is ather a boring procedure for the interviewers. Presumably, the more prurient among the titillated over the replies.

This then is how clouds and rain are produced once the air is forced to rise, but how is this done? This can be done by several methods one of a large scale, which produces widespread precipitation, and one of a small scale. A front is defined as the boundary betwen two different air masses. If it is a cold front, this means that the cold and dry air is replacing warm and humid air. The air not only pushes the warm air forward, but also upward since the cold air is more dense. And as the warm air ascends it produces clouds and precipitation. This is why large areas receive rain just before and just after a cold frontal passage. Due to the strong south wind that blows throughout the summer, cold fronts do not penetrate into West Texas. Thus folks must rely on the second major method of causing air to rise. This uplifting is due to heating of air by the ground surface. Air over the hot ground is constantly churning, due to the types of terrain. 


