Hail stones approximately the size of a small pea and irregular in shape created a sea of ice, but aid not damage livestock or plant life. storm and cut through the ice making fissures up to four feet deep in places.

The road was closed to traffic until noon while highway equipment scraped ice from the highway. Flooding washed trees and brush across the road, stopping up culverts and closing the highway in Val Verde county all day

The Frank McMullan ranch, 7 miles south of Ozona, was the hardest hit by the freak hail storm. And so from the moment I saw them, Sue and Lee have been our own, bringing laughter and joy without measure.



Mrs. Robert Cox, Duplicate Bridge Club director, announced a change in schedule this week for both the Tuesday night and Saturday afternoon clubs.


