## Ozona Schools Closed As Health Authorities Combat a Suspected Outbreak Of Paratyphoid Fever

### State Health Dept. Probes Disease Source

Dr. S. J. Lerro, of the State Health Department at Austin, was still in Ozona this morning conducting an investigation in the suspected outbreak of paratyphoid in Ozona.

Dr. Lerro was in conference yesterday with Dr. Don Carlisle of Ozona, going over Dr. Carlisle's record of positive reactors and of the three persons who have died and who were suspected of having the disease.

This morning Dr. Lerro was continuing his investigation, seeking to determine the source of the disease if it exists in this area. He had tested the city water supply this morning and found it completely pure and germ free. He had gone to a ranch near Ozona to test a water supply and further tests of specimens from positive reactors here were being made at the Crockett County Hospital this morning.

### Heavy Property Damage Results From Accidents

There were no personal injuries in the four automobile accidents investigated by Highway Patrolman Orvil Perry, DPS, the past week, but property damage was heavy.

Wednesday afternoon around 5 o'clock a 1963 truck, tractor and semi-trailer, driven by William Masterson of New Albany, Ind. was traveling east on Hwy 290 and hit a bridge railing about a mile west of Ozona. The rig then careened across the highway and ran off in the left barrow ditch and jackknifed. The tractor was a total wreck with some damage to the trailer. Masterson was charged with DWI. Neither the driver nor two passengers were injured.

Sunday at 1:55 a. m. a 1965 Chevrolet belonging to Ann Fowler was parked in front of her house on Ave I when Jo Ann Pebsworth, backing out of a private drive in a 1960 Oldsmobile, hit the parked car. Damage to the Fowler car was \$100. There was no damage to the Olds.

Later Sunday morning at 8:30 on Hwy 290 and the Hoover Divide Road two cars sideswiped each other as they were trying to avoid a collision. Frances Seiver of Kemath, Texas was traveling east on Hwy 290 towing a small house trailer and Monica Esquivel of Ozona was coming off the Hoover Divide Rd. Damage to the Chevrolet was \$125 and to the pickup, around \$25.

Monday afternoon around 3:38 miles west of Ozona on Hwy 290 a blowout caused a pickup-camper wreck. Mrs. Earl Morsman of Camano Island, Wash. was traveling east driving a pickup-camper when the left rear tire blew out and the rig turned over on its side. Mr. Morsman, who was a passenger in the vehicle, complained of back pains but was not hospitalized. Damage to the vehicle was \$800.

Ozona schools were closed for the balance of the week and public gatherings cancelled after a meeting of county health and school officials Tuesday. Dr. Don Carlisle, county health officer, made the decision after the deaths of three persons who had blood tests strongly positive of paratyphoid, along with the symptoms of the disease.

### 4-H SHOW POSTPONED

On advice of Dr. Don Carlisle, Pete Jacoby, county agent, this morning announced that the 4-H Livestock Show, scheduled for Saturday, will be postponed.

Mr. Jacoby said that he hoped the show could be staged Saturday of next week.

### HUSBAND OF OZONAN - Vietnam Land Mine Blast Fatal To Capt. Griffis

Marine Capt. William A. (Bill) Griffis, III, 29, was reported killed in action in Vietnam Jan. 24. Mrs. Griffis, the former Sally Baggett was informed of her husband's death Saturday afternoon in Clinic Hospital in San Angelo where their second child, Patricia Elizabeth, was born Friday.

Capt. Griffis' parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Griffis, Jr., of San Angelo were informed of his death in a helicopter crash by two Marine Corps servicemen Saturday afternoon.

The crash occurred while Capt. Griffis was with an assault helicopter group A spokesman said as Capt. Griffis' helicopter landed, it exploded a Viet Con land mine.

His brother, Marine Corps Capt. Don Griffis, stationed at Quantico, Va., flew into San Angelo Sunday to join the family.

Mrs. Griffis and daughter, Sarah Ann, 3, were making their home in Springfield, Va. while Capt. Griffis was away. They were here visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Baggett, and planned to return to Springfield in March. (Continued on Last Page)

Dr. Carlisle said no definite diagnosis of paratyphoid had been made, but with 15 positive blood tests of the disease, he felt the closing of the public schools was necessary in case the disease is present in Ozona. Blood cultures are being done and if even one case is present, he will recommend inoculation of the entire population of Ozona.

An official from the State Health Department arrived in Ozona yesterday to consult with Dr. Carlisle at the latter's invitation. So far there has been no indication of where the contamination is coming from if the disease is present.

So far shots have been given only to the families of those having positive blood tests and those in close contact with them.

The disease is of shorter duration than typhoid fever and is usually not as severe, but can be, Dr. Carlisle said. It is spread by contaminated food, feces and vomit. In its pneumonia-like state, it can enter the respiratory system. The disease comes on slowly with nausea and vomiting along with elevated temperature the first week. Constipation is often present in the first week of the disease. High fever and diarrhea are common the second week. During the third week, along with the fever, there is involvement of the abdomen, pulmonary involvement and sometimes perforation of the intestines. Temperature falls and rises during the fourth week of the disease.

There have been no cases of paratyphoid in Texas for a number of years, although it is common in Mexico, medical authorities say. Residents are advised to stay out of crowds and as close to home as possible until further notice.

There is no need to panic since there is a definite possibility that the disease does not exist in Ozona, Dr. Carlisle emphasized. Precautionary measures are being taken in case the disease is present, but there will be plenty of time to inoculate the population if investigation shows that it is necessary.

I came uneasy to my country. My birth was shrouded by the clouds of war.

I was far too young to have had a hand in it — but I was, after all, born in one of the Axis nations. After living a year under Russian occupation, I had a chance of meeting the fighting men of America. And I knew that instead of bringing revenge they brought gum.

And they talked about home. They talked eternally about home.

They were strange men on a strange ground and while we, as children, looked up to them, they still scared us a little. But as the years passed, and the talk became deeds, the fear was replaced by respect. America put away bitterness, not to be forgotten, but so it wouldn't interfere with the main job of helping people.

Because of my experiences, the opportunity of living in the United States gives the words, "Peace on Earth Toward All Men of Good Will," a deeper meaning for me.

Now, as another Christmas approaches, it's my strange fighting men on another strange ground.

Now, as then, it's hard to be away from home at Christmas.

Now, as then, there's a reason it has to be done.

Occupation by Chairman Mao is no different from occupation by the Russians. Czechoslovakia wants freedom as much as America but doesn't have the means to pursue and retain it. Whereas freedom is the right, at birth, of all men, we find it our duty to answer the call and come to the assistance of freedom seeking men.

We struggle for this principle in the session halls of the United Nations.

We struggle for this principle in the emerging nation.

We struggle for this principle in our own country.

And we struggle hardest for this principle in the unhappy swamps of Viet Nam.

So it can't be the happy Christmas it should be. Our young men are standing in another part of the world. Their seats at the dinner table are empty. Their graduation suits hang empty in our closets. Their cars sit empty in the sheds. But there's no emptiness in our hearts.

We haven't asked that he stand for liberty, only to take away our support in his struggle. We haven't joined with his enemy to defeat his aim. And we won't let him down by misinforming him about our feelings.

This Christmas it's time for a moratorium. A moratorium against doubt. A moratorium against failure to reassure our brothers and our sons that we know why they can't be with us and that we're sharing the pain of their absence.

It didn't make headlines because it was done thoughtfully and quietly, but just a few weeks ago, in thousands of smaller communities across the nation, Americans stood in chill winds in parks and on court house lawns. They heard amateur speakers give voice on Veteran's Day to the real feelings in the land. Feelings which tend to be smothered by shouting antics in Chicago court rooms. The deeper feelings which must be conveyed to the Americans who stand for us in the defense of freedom.

MILITARY DISSENT VS. AUTHORITY

According to an Associated Press news item, an "anti-war" group on the Strategic Air Command (Barksdale Air Force) Base in Louisiana is upset because certain of their numbers have lost stripes, been transferred and/or investigated. We fail to find any reason for their objections. It is the military to defend "the national security". That means us; we the people. And anyone who has any knowledge of the extremist leadership of some of the "anti-war" groups can readily understand the reason for concern when that element invades our vital protective networks, such as the SAC.

Americans do not challenge the right to dissent. But few people can challenge the fact that the military is not a valid place for that dissent. There are many examples throughout history of takeovers of the military by radical elements. The records show that these

takeovers invariably lead to the overthrow of the civilian government. One need look to our Latin American neighbors for proof of this.

In the United States, the military is subject to control by the civil government with the President of the United States as the Commander-in-Chief. This chain of command requires obedience to authority. Therefore there must be discipline in effect at all times. Demonstrations outside of military bases is one thing; demonstrations inside the military is another matter. And GI participation in protest movements, on or off base, is something to be viewed with all due concern.

General Douglas MacArthur challenged the authority of President Truman during the Korean — Un-declared — War. And for this action he was summarily removed, despite the overwhelming support of the people. Should the current handful of dissidents in uniform be considered better than an outstanding military leader who gave so ma-

ny decades of his life in service to our nation? Is he a different code of conduct for privates than these Generals? It is truly remarkable how the left-wing demonstrators claim of their "rights," except right to be held accountable for their acts.

It is time for the rest of us to "launch a protest" on behalf of the thousands of our armed services men. Question: If there are no (and apparently there are few) within the military who dislike what the military must do, as its duty, to let us give the disgraced their freedom and return them to the status as private, self-supporting citizens — with dishonorable discharges.

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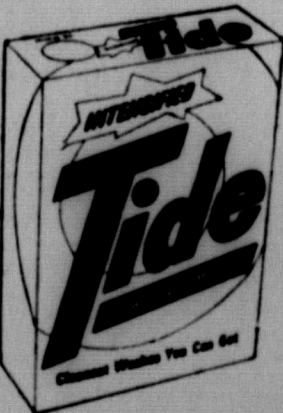

**Washington News Letter**

Congressman O. C. Fisher

President Nixon's State-of-the-Union message unveiled the tone of the 91st Congress. Emphasizing anti-crime and anti-pollution, he envisioned a decade of progress and challenge. But he made it clear this will take a lot of doing.

All such addresses sound good. In this instance Mr. Nixon was at his best, as he hammered away at the nation's life and the urgency of remedial action.

A key point was his New Federalism concept — of fragmenting federal power and giving more of it back to the people, where it belongs. This sounds good, but the real test will come in translating the objective into meaningful reality.

The fact is that by pyramided enactments, particularly in the decade of the '60s, the Congress has whittled away at people's local

functions and lodged them securely in the hands of a vastly expanded federal bureaucracy.

Indeed this trend has shown an alarming distrust of the capacity of the people to govern themselves.

An example of this exercise of raw power is found in federal controls applied to education. Already federal bureaucrats are dictating, on a quota basis, the make-up of teachers in public schools — with emphasis on race rather than merit. The whims of a single bureaucrat is often greater than all the power of locally elected school boards and other officials who are responsible for the efficient operation and financing of local schools. Will HEW strike next at school diets, air-conditioning, text books, etc.?

One HEW "inspector" recently in my district complained because he found an elementary school principal's desk was in the same room where a secretary's desk was located.

And another HEW whim

threatens to withhold federal aid money from schools which do not cross-bus youngsters from one neighborhood school to another — for the sole purpose of achieving a racial mixture which would be more to the liking of an HEW brain-truster.

It would seem that if the President really wants to turn some federally accumulated power back to the people, a good place to start is in the management of our local schools. In this process he could dispense with perhaps a thousand eager-beaver federal employees who are drunk with power and fatally bent on mischief.

**Ozona Girl Asks Help For Fellow College Student**

Ginger Glynn, student (sophomore) at Wayland Baptist College in Plainview, Texas, called her family Tuesday night to ask their help in spreading the word about a project at the college — that of helping out a fellow student.

Larry Parks, a ministerial student at the Baptist college, has Bright's disease, and students have rallied to help pay for his current treatments — 3 a week at \$600 a treatment, and to help supply him with a special kidney machine so that he can continue in school. Officials at the school have arranged with certain corporations, to trade in coupons, trading stamps, etc. for cash to be used in this project. 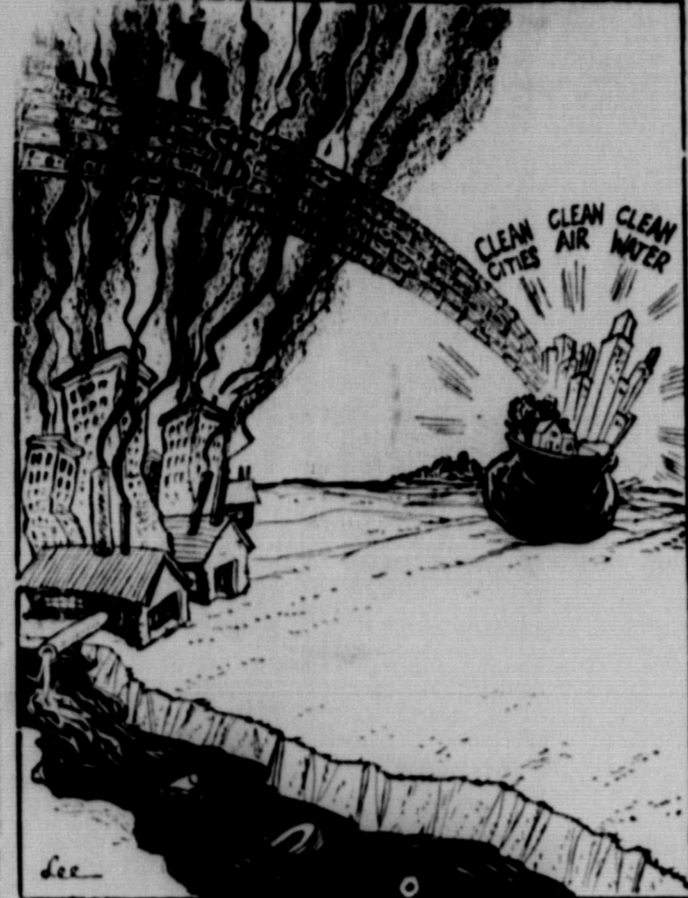

**Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen**

**Mexican Macaroni**

1 (8 oz. pk.) elbow macaroni, cooked barely tender

1 pound pork sausage  
3/4 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper

3 cups canned tomatoes, coarsely chopped  
2 cups dairy sour cream  
1 tbs. sugar

1 tbs. chili powder (scant)  
Salt to taste  
1/4 teas. dried oregano

Cook sausage in large heavy skillet with the onion and green pepper until the meat is somewhat browned, breaking up the sausage into small chunks. Drain off fat. Stir in tomatoes, sour cream, sugar, chili powder, salt, oregano, and well-drained macaroni. Pour into a large casserole, cover, and bake 35-40 minutes in a moderate oven, remove cover last 10 minutes.

**Shell To Drill Crockett Wildcat; Outpost Slated**

Shell Oil Co. will drill the No. 2 Cowden and State as a 6,700-foot wildcat in Crockett County, seven miles southeast of McCamey and 3/4 mile east and slightly north of dual McKee and Ellerburger oil production in the Tippett, North multipay field.

Location, on a 164-61-acre lease, is 2,173 feet from the northwest and 46 feet from the southwest lines of 24-36-H&TC.

It is approximately 1,500 feet south of its No. 1 Cowden and State, a 6,967-foot wildcat failure, abandoned Jan. 26, 1962. A test at 4,176-266 feet, identified as Strawn returned 820 feet of sulfur water; a test at 5,625-860 feet, 130 feet of slightly gas and oil-cut mud; a test at 6,045-115 feet, identified as Devonian, only water; and a test at 6,195-6,240 feet, 90 feet of slightly oil and gas-cut mud.

The Canyon Co. Midland will drill the No. 1-7 Childress as a 3 1/2-mile southwest outpost to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field of Crockett County, 31 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 2,200 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 7-A-TCCR Co. The project will be drilled by rotary 7,000 feet. Ground elevation is 2,093 feet.
