Kitty's Korner

The following article concerning police brutality was written by a concerned mother and printed in the Kaufman, Texas, Herald:

One of the most common phrases heard in our society and our city today is "police brutality." Perhaps I don't understand the meaning, but I would like to give you one mother's viewpoint on this subject.

To begin with, I should tell you that I have two teenage sons, and being a mother, I cannot help but want the very best of everything for them. I am a "typical mother" in that I don't want to see them hurt by anyone. I am not a typical mother, for I see things many mothers never heard of—much less become involved in, because my husband is a minister and we see the very best and the sordid worst.

I would like for you to be brutal with my sons. Is that a surprise?

If you find them speeding in a car, please be brutal. I have sat at a hospital holding a grieving mother's hand because of someone's mistake. That was brutal. I have gone with my husband to tell a wife her husband was killed. That was brutal. I have played organ music in funeral services for babies, teenagers and adults because someone drove too fast. That was brutal. I have helped nurse a beautiful teenage girl crippled in a wreck. That was brutal.

If you should watch my underage sons with liquor in their possession, please be brutal.

If you should catch my husband's side trying to piece together two underage men's lives, both broken by drinking. That was brutal. I have helped feed hungry children because a drunken father didn't come home. That was brutal. I have tried to console a mother whose daughter was killed after being struck by a drunken driver. That was brutal.

If you find my sons committing any kind of immoral act or carrying any pornographic materials, please be brutal! I have listened to the sad cry of a young girl who was pregnant but not married. That was brutal.

If you should find my sons with drugs in their possession, please be brutal. I have tried to rehabilitate a woman just out of prison for shooting her husband while she was drugged. That was brutal. I have seen a handsome young man turn into an ugly old one because of drugs. That was brutal. I have seen a young mother who was addicted to a drug scream and rave for lack of a "fix." That was brutal.

If police ever see my sons doing something that isn't thoroughly in the interest of society, please be brutal. I have walked into a hushed, sacred church that was stripped of everything that could be sold. That was brutal. I have seen a lovely, expensive home and yard completely torn up by vandals. That was brutal. I have seen a school and its marvelous equipment torn apart by young vandals. This was brutal. I have wiped a little boy's tears and helped him hunt for his stolen bicycle. That was brutal.

If you should ever catch my sons doing anything illegal, please be brutal. I have come to realize that your kind of "brutality" cannot in any way compare with the brutality that comes (Continued on Last Page)

First Hail Of Spring Pounds Ozona Mon. Nite

Rain and hail pounded Ozona shortly after midnight Monday, leaving .49 of an inch of rain and some damage to plant life. Hailstones the size of large marbles were piled up in yards and along curbs around town Tuesday morning.

The storm hit the city accompanied by a roaring wind. Fortunately, the hailstones were of the soft variety and no property damage to speak of was incurred.

The storm seemed to center over the city. There were no reports of rain or hail directly north of town, nor to the south, beyond a few miles. The Joe Couch ranch around seven miles west of town reported only light hail and rain showers.

Crockett Gas Field Gains 3 Extensions

The Ozona (Canyon sand gas) field of Crockett County gained three extensions with completion of three projects by the Canyon Co., Midland, approximately 32 miles southwest of Ozona.

The No. 2-1-A. J. S. Pierce, two miles west and 1 1/2 mile east, was completed for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.12 million cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 53,750-1. Gravity of the liquid was 69 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 5,762-6,651 feet, which had been acidized with 5,000 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gallons and 66,750 pounds of sand. Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 1-A-TCRR Co.

The No. 1-4 Austin Mills-paugh, a one mile west, was completed for a calculated, absolute open flow of 700,000 cubic feet of gas daily with gas-liquid ratio of 33,850-1. Gravity of the liquid was 66.5 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,148 feet, which had been acidized with 2,800 gallons and fractured with 42,000 gallons and 66,750 pounds of sand.

Ozona's Annual Track Meet will be held here this Saturday. This year's meet promises to be one of the biggest and best ever. A total of 7 class AA schools, 12 class A schools, and 8 class B schools are entered this year.

Trophies will be given in three classes for the winning 440 relay teams, mile relay teams and class champions. AA schools will run together, A schools together and B schools will run together. By doing this it will give all schools a shot at trophies and individual medals. Individual events will be run together, but the points gained will count toward team championships in each class.

Ozona is fortunate this year in having Grant Teaff, head coach of the Angelo State University Rams, as Meet Referee. Teaff has been the National Secretary for the N. A. I. A. for Track and Field Federation for four years while he was coaching at McMurry College.

Class AA teams participating are the host team, Ozona, Alpine, Andrews B, Big Lake, Crane, McCamey and Stanton. This includes every team in District 5-AA, of which Ozona is a member.

Sonoran Killed, Ozona Man Hurt In Hiway Crash

Wesley C. Young, 50, of Sonora was fatally injured and P. C. Perner of Ozona received minor injuries in a one-vehicle accident 21 miles south of Sonora late Saturday night. Young died enroute to a San Angelo hospital and Perner was treated and released from Hudspeith Memorial Hospital in Sonora.

The accident occurred when Young lost control of his pickup on a rain slick highway and the vehicle overturned, throwing Young some distance from the pickup.

Funeral services were held Tuesday in St. John's Episcopal Church in Sonora with burial in Sonora Cemetery.

Young was a prominent Sonora drilling contractor and a former sheriff of Sutton County. Perner is a Crockett County rancher.

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

BOTH the house and Senate battled last week over compulsory busing and the right of parents to send their children to local neighborhood schools. The Senate did the unexpected: it voted to require HEW to apply the same desegregation rules in the north as in the south. This was done over the bitter opposition of the northern liberal die-hards, who opposed applying the compulsory busing concept to northern schools.

In the House the pro-busing crowd was soundly defeated in efforts to knock out anti-busing provisions written into the annual HEW appropriation bill.

Spelled out in clear language, the bill includes three provisions designed to remove any remote doubt about the intention of Congress. One item contains this: "No part of the funds contained in this Act shall be used to provide, formulate carry out, or implement, any plan which would deny to any student the right or privilege of attending any public school of his or her choice as selected by his or her parent or guardian."

The Bill is now in the Senate where the extremists, probably including the HEW, are expected to fight to delete or water that language down to make it meaningless.

THE Annual HEW appropriation (which replaces the one vetoed by the President), as approved by the House includes about \$400-million more than the President had preferred — which unless the Senate changes it, might precipitate a second veto.

A few days following the veto the President changed his mind about the government's mid-school-year commitment to provide funds for federally impacted school districts. On second thought, he urged the Congress to substantially comply with the government's commitment, and requested that the new bill include \$440-million for that purpose. At the time of the ve-

to he had asked for only \$200-million.

EMERGING as a national hero is Judge Julius J. Hoffman who presided over the trial of the 7 Chicago hoodlums whose courtroom criminal outbursts and revolutionary antics sought to obstruct their trial for inciting violence during the 1968 Democratic convention. There appears to be compelling reasons for disbarment proceedings against the lawyers who conducted the defense. The Judge deserves the plaudits of every law-abiding and decent-thinking American citizen.

Casing Run In Crockett Test For Completion Try

King Resources Co., Denver, Colorado was running 5 1/2-inch casing for completion attempt after drilling to 8,992 feet in the Fusselman at No. 2 Marathon-Harris, section 10, block 3, WC survey, 30 miles northwest of Ozona, three-quarters of a mile southwest of the dual 8,500-foot Pennsylvanian detrital and 8,900-foot Fusselman discovery and one location southwest of Strawn oil in the five-well Enconrado pool of Crockett County.

The pool has two Strawn and two Fusselman oil producers at present.

A 70-minute drillstem test of the Strawn at 8,472 to 8,517 feet surfaced gas in 14 minutes, the volume being estimated at 6,000 cubic feet daily. Reversed out was 21 barrels of oil, 2 1/2 barrels of oil-cut mud and 12 barrels of salt water.

A 4 1/4-hour test of the Fusselman at 8,923 to 8,932 feet developed gas at the surface in 11 minutes and oil in three hours and 14 minutes, followed by a flow of 2 1/2 barrels of oil in one hour. Recovery was 1,800 feet of 44 gravity oil, plus 2,410 feet of salt water.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Strawberry Jam Cupcakes
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup shortening
2 eggs beaten
2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teas. salt
1 teas cinnamon
1 teas. nutmeg
1 teas baking soda
1/2 cup sour milk
1 cup strawberry jam

Cream sugar with shortening until fluffy, add eggs and blend. Sift flour, salt, spices and soda together and add alternately with milk to creamed mixture. Fold in jam and bake in greased muffin pans in moderate oven 20 to 25 minutes. Remove from pans and frost with any frosting. Makes 20 cupcakes.

Apple Betty
3 cups sliced apples
1 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 teas. cinnamon
4 tbs. butter melted
1/4 cup water
Mix apples, 1 cup bread crumbs, brown sugar and cinnamon. Place in buttered baking dish and pour melted butter and water over top. Mix remaining crumbs with a little extra melted butter and sprinkle over top. Bake in 350-degree oven 30 to 45 minutes. Serve hot or cold with hard sauce. Serves 6.

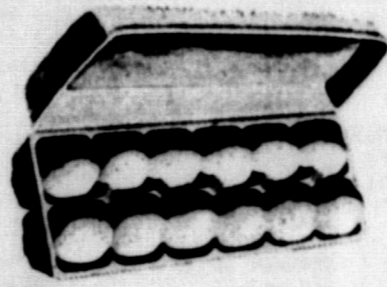

With the Japanese farmer owning his own land, small though it might be, he started producing. Japan, which in prewar days as well as the early postwar period, imported about fifty per cent of its rice, now has a surplus each year of about ten per cent.

This is an even greater problem to the Japanese than to Americans. As what might be called rice connoisseurs, the Japanese people do not like rice that has been in storage. Their palates find that the flavor of their diet staple deteriorates quite rapidly.

Neither can they export their surplus, because the Japanese rice price is about twice the going market price, at the government's official pegged price.

Thus, while the Japanese food supply is short on other items such as vegetables, it is more profitable for the Japanese farmer to continue growing rice.

Rendition Blanks Mailed To County Property Owners

Renditions went out this week to property owners in Crockett County from the tax office. All those receiving the renditions are urged to sign and return the form to the tax office in order that property may be rendered for the 1971 tax rolls.

Those who have built homes the past year or made improvements should bring the valuations of same to the

tax office even though the government subsidy bill runs fairly close to a billion dollars per year, which is a lot of yen.

This leads to one of the most perplexing paradoxes of the times. While in many nations there is starvation because their economies cannot afford to buy the surplus foods produced, there is apparently ample money to buy modern arms, to subsidize a national airline, to buy a royal yacht as in Ethiopia, but there's no money to buy groceries.

A different system does not seem to work too well either. The National Federation of Independent Business recently published free for anyone who requests it, a chart comparing the United States with Russia.

Among other things, this chart shows the Russians produce a prodigious amount of potatoes, almost 165 million tons compared to 15 million tons in the United States.

Thus, in view of this huge production of spuds, it would be assumed that they would be quite cheap in Russia.

But the contrary is quite true. While the average Ivan must work 3 minutes to buy a pound of them, his American counterpart must only work two minutes. Thus, it strongly appears that under capitalism or communism, when government attempts to negate the laws of supply and demand, an imbalance results.

TIPS For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

Many garden chores should be accomplished in March.

Plant dahlia tubers in deep holes, be sure to stake when planted and place name marker.

Divide perennial phlox and daisies.

Start planting gladiolus bulbs every ten days to have continuous blooming. They should bloom in about 70 days.

Get plants into the ground as early in March as possible, however, any tender plants that can be killed by frost should be protected. Should there be a late freeze keep clay pots, hot caps or fruit jars handy to cover.

Don't forget to spray roses for early arriving bugs. Also pruning should be done by March 15. Cut out all dead wood and old canes. Do not prune running roses until after they bloom.

Should you want to plant an early vegetable garden to have home-grown salad ingredients, select a place that will have five or six hours of full sun every day the sun shines. Onion plants are now available at local stores. Some tomato plants and sweet peppers may also be planted along with loose leaf lettuce, early beets, herbs and radishes. They can be planted in a garden space or as borders of flower beds.

Feed pansies liquid fertilizer now for many early blooms.

Since the hail, prune all broken limbs on shrubs and trees.

South Crockett Canyon Gas Field Gets Extension

Canyon sand production was assured through perforations at 4,476-677 feet by B. W. Wiseman, Jr., and No. 1-114 Adams Ranch, in 114-0-GH&SARR, deep wild-cat failure, 1 1/2 miles west of the nine-well Adams-Baggett (Cnayan gas) field, two miles north of the one-well Hudspeth (Strawn gas) field and 25 miles southeast of Ozona.

The following four-point gauges, no time, were reported: gas at the rate of 200,000 cubic feet daily on a 7-64-inch choke, with tubing pressure of 1,125 pounds; 300,000 cubic feet daily on an 8-64-inch choke, with tubing pressure of 1,000 pounds; 400,000 cubic feet daily on a 9-64-inch choke, with tubing pressure of 900 pounds; and 500,000 cubic feet daily on a 10-64-inch choke.

Drilled to 11,737 feet, it is plugged back to an unreported depth with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 4,192 feet.
