2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly bringing on controversial matters of no importance.

3. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding the latter up to contempt, ridicule and obloquy.

4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as ruthlessly as possible.

5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.

6. Foment unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders, foster lenient and soft attitudes on the part of the government toward such disorders.

7. By specious argument use the breakdown of the moral virtues, honesty, integrity, continence, faith and the pledged word, ruggedness.

8. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with a view to confiscating them and leaving the population helpless.

9. Hope you will take time to think seriously of the above and draw your own conclusions."

Frank McMullan Funeral Service Held Here Sun.

Rate Of Inquiries Indicate 18th Annual Quarter Horse Show May 23 To Be Biggest

Requests for entry blanks indicate that the 18th Annual Ozona Quarter Horse Show will be a bigger success than usual this year. The show will be held at the rodeo arena in Fair Park Saturday, May 23.

A new event this year is the cutting horse contest, which is expected to draw contestants from as far away as New Mexico. This contest also generates a great deal of spectator interest and will be scheduled for the final event in the Adult Performance Classes.

Around 100 adult entrants are expected with a larger number in the Youth Division.

The Ozona Roping Club, Inc., sponsors the annual one day show and extends a cordial invitation to all horsemen to attend. L. D. Kirby is chairman of the show; Bill Watson, secretary, and Earl Acton is ring steward.

A Champion of the Show trophy will be awarded. To be eligible an individual must show at halter and at least two performance classes.

The Show will get underway with the youth activities. Contestants must be single and 18 years of age or under. Entry fee is \$5 per entry. Adult Halter Classes will follow Youth Halter Division, entry fee \$10 per entry.

Trophies will be awarded all first place winners with the exception of two classes. Youth activity halter classes require four entries before a trophy can be awarded. Ribbons will be awarded through six places in all classes.

Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Mares, Stallions, and Geldings will be awarded trophies and rosettes. An all around trophy will be awarded in the Youth Performance Class. To be eligible at least three events must be entered.

All adult performance classes will be divided into Junior and Senior divisions except for team roping classes. First place in each division will compete for the championship.

Two men died in a car-truck crash at intersection. Two men died as the result of a car-truck collision around 20 miles northwest of Ozona at 8:30 Monday night. The accident occurred at intersection of Hwy 137 and Hwy 29. One man was killed instantly and the other died of his injuries Tuesday afternoon in a Big Lake hospital.

The two men, Alejandro Orona, driver, of Ackerley, Texas and Martin Lopez, a Mexican National of Patricia, Tex., were traveling northwest on Hwy 137 and failed to stop at the stop sign at the highway on which they were traveling intersects Hwy 29.

Angel Reed of Ozona was traveling east on Hwy 29 in a Mack truck-transport. He saw the car and tried to bring his rig to a stop, skidding 97 feet. The car collided with the truck and was knocked 68 feet after impact. Orona was found 41 feet from the car and was apparently killed instantly. Lopez was still in the car and was rushed to the Big Lake hospital by James ambulance, but died of his injuries Tuesday afternoon without regaining consciousness.

Reed escaped injury. Services for the two men are pending notification of relatives at James Funeral Home. Families of both men live in Old Mexico and the Border Patrol was endeavoring to locate them late yesterday.

County Acts To Clear Title To Land For IS 10

Legal steps necessary to facilitate conveyance of title to county land to the State of Texas for Interstate 10 construction through Ozona will be taken at a public hearing to be held by the Commissioners Court June 8.

The hearing is for the purpose of closing and abandoning lands originally deeded to Crockett County by E. M. Powell and dedicated for use as recreational sites only. Powell was a pioneer land owner in Crockett county and the section on which Ozona is located was made available by him as a town-site.

The land in question is that used for so many years as an athletic field and known as Powell Field and land to the west of that tract which has in recent years been used as a Little League playing field.

Interstate 10 Highway will cross squarely through the middle of this land and of necessity the county will have to sell the land to the state for right-of-way. The public is cordially invited to attend the 4-H dress revue and awards presentation at 3:00 p. m.

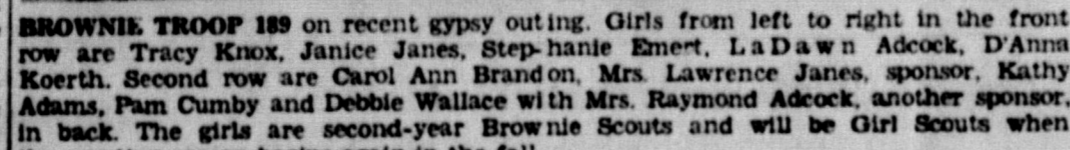

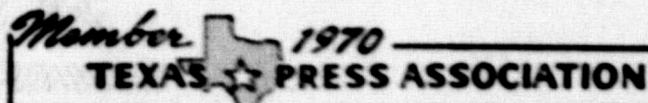

Two Wildcats Are Slated In N'west Crockett County

Nor-Am Petroleum Corp., Midland, will drill two Ellenburger wildcats in Crockett County, 37 miles northwest of Ozona.

The No. 1 Harris-Smith, a 10,000-foot prospector, is 2 1/2 miles southwest of the Encantado (Pennsylvanian detrital and Strawn) field, 3/4 mile east of the Continental Oil Co. No. 1-E Harris-Smith, an Ellenburger failure, and 3/4 mile northeast of the Reynolds Mining Co. No. 1 Harris, also an Ellenburger failure.

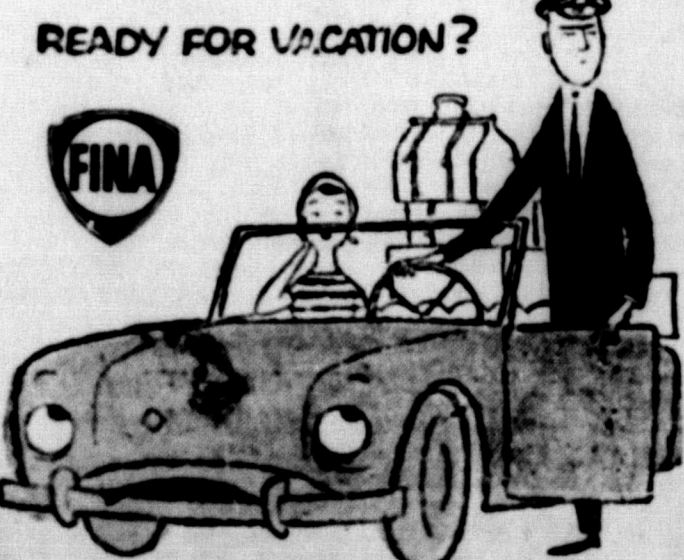
Location is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines.

The Conoco project was drilled to 10,484 feet, plugged and abandoned June 1954. Top of the Ellenburger was picked at 10,025 feet, on ground elevation of 2,616 feet.

Drilled to 10,120 feet, the Reynolds Mining test was plugged and abandoned August 1954. The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,600 feet: Dean, 6,500 feet; Strawn, 7,890 feet; Devonian, 8,830; feet; Simpson, 9,510 feet, and Ellenburger of 9,977 feet.

The No. 1 Union-Shannon, a 7,500-foot test, is one mile southwest of the one-well depleted Pillow (Clearfork) field. Location is 660 feet from west and 990 feet from north lines of Richard Pillow No. 1. The depleted Pillow opener, Monterey Oil Co. No. 23 Harris Smith was an 8,000-foot Ellenburger failure.

The project is also 1/4 mile west of Conoco 1-B Shannon which was plugged and abandoned August 1951 at 7,320 feet. The Wolfcamp was topped at 5,760 feet and Ellenburger, 7,240 feet, on elevation of 2,600 feet.

Tippett Field In N. Crockett Gains Extender

The Tippett, North multipay field of Crockett County gained its second Montoya gas producer and a location northeast extension to that pay with triple completion to Shell Oil Co. No. 3-34 Tippett, previously completed location northeast extension to lower Leonard production in the Tippett multipay field and fifth 5,050-foot Wolfcamp oil producer and a location northeast extension to that pay in the Tippett, West multipay field, nine miles south of McCamey.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 15 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 5,459-461 feet, which had been acidized.

It was finalized April 9 from the 5,050-foot Wolfcamp for 83 barrels of 39.7 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1.976-1, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,096-99 feet; and April 29 from the lower Leonard for 102 barrels of 42.6 gravity oil, plus 8 barrels of water, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,623-4,706 feet.

Drilled to 5,592 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 5,551 feet. Location is 660 feet from the northwest and 4,958 feet from the northeast lines of 34-31-H&TC.

The Montoya gas opener, the firm's No. 13-E Tippett, was finalized Oct. 22, 1969, from the Montoya for a calculated, absolute open flow of 900,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 5,450-52 feet. Also a triple producer, it was finalized from the above pays.

The field has one Montoya oil producer, Shell's No. 18 Amacker Trust, 3/4 mile to the north-northeast.

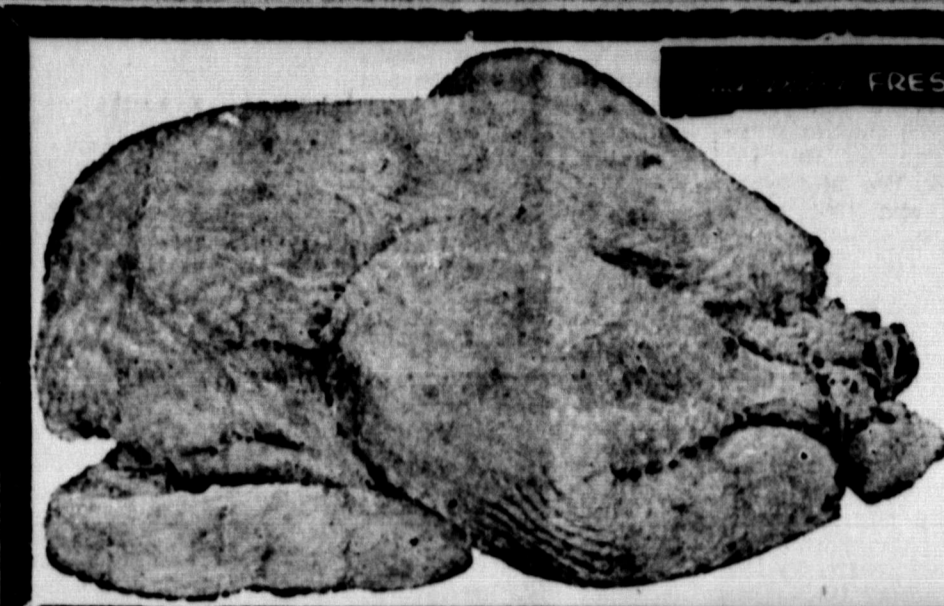

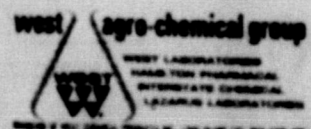

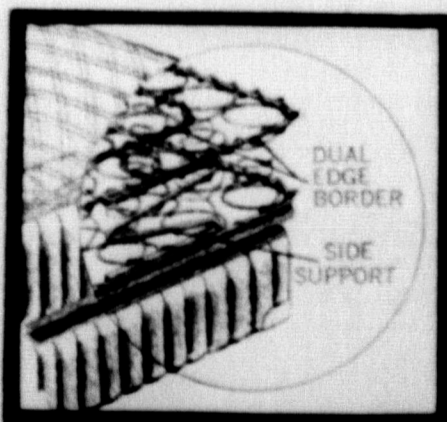

Ozona Soldier Awarded Bronze Star For Heroism

Duc Pho, Vietnam - Army Specialist Four Oscar C. DeHoyos, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carlos DeHoyos, and wife Josefine, live in Ozona, Texas, recently received the Bronze Star Medal in Vietnam.

Spec. 4 DeHoyos earned the award for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force in Vietnam.

The 21-year-old soldier is a machine gunner in Company B, 4th Battalion, 3rd Infantry of the Americal Division's 11th Infantry Brigade near Duc Pho.

"Pvt. First Class DeHoyos distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous action on 3 January 1970 while serving with Co. B, 4th Bat. 3rd Inf.," the citation accompanying the award reads.

"On that date the company was in a night defensive position near Phong Dor when it was assaulted by a numerically superior enemy force. During the initial stages of the attack, a section of the unit's defensive perimeter came under particularly heavy mortar fire. Alertly spotting several insurgents attempting to gain entry into the laager site through this weakened area, Private DeHoyos unhesitatingly moved forward to engage the enemy element. Displaying considera-

ble expertise in close combat, Pvt. DeHoyos engaged the insurgents effectively and succeeded in repulsing their attack.

"Through his timely and courageous actions, Pvt. DeHoyos served as an inspiration to his fellow soldiers. Pvt.
