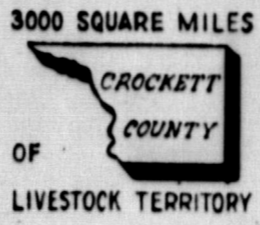

District Champion All Stars Falter In Regional With Loss To Big Spring At Lubbock

After taking a 9-1 victory from Pecos Friday night, the Ozona Little League All-Stars fell to Big Spring 4-1 in the first game of the Regional playoffs in Lubbock Monday afternoon.



THE PITCHING STAFF -- Carrying the load in the pitching department to date have been these two stalwarts, Romaldo Cervantez and Ronnie Schneider. Cervantez, big gun of the local All Stars, won his first two starts, defeating Sonora in the opener and Pecos Friday night, but dropping his third to Big Spring Monday afternoon. Schneider handcuffed the Big Lake Stars in the second game.

A complete report of the game with Big Spring was not available, but according to reports received from those who witnessed the game, the Big Spring lads were adept at hitting line drives that were just too hot to handle and managed to get their runs on such hits. Romaldo Cervantez was on the mound for Ozona all six innings. A base hit by Ronald Koerth brought Ricky Perry in to score Ozona's lone run. One of the largest crowds ever to see a Little League game in Ozona was on hand Friday when the Ozona Stars won the District Championship from Pecos. The first inning was a draw with neither team able to score. The second inning, however, was the highlight of the night for Ozona fans. With two outs and the bases loaded, young Blake Moody hit a grand slam homer to score four runs for Ozona. This was Moody's first start in a playoff game. He replaced Doak Field, who moved in right field. All the Ozona players got at least one hit and all but one scored a run, with Cervantez scoring twice. Cervantez gave up three hits, struck five, hit one and walked out 10 with one Pecos runner scoring. Starting line-up for the Pecos game included Cervantez, all the way as pitcher; Howard Huereca, catcher; Ronald Shaw, first base; Ricky Perry, second base; David Torres, third base; Ronnie Schneider, short stop; Orlando Deltoyo, left field; Ronald Koerth, center field, and Blake Moody, right field. Manager and coach Harold Shaw and Rex Fenton, expressed appreciation for the backing the team received from all the Ozona fans.

Record Number Entries Sept Ceremonies Expected For Jr. Rodeo Friday And Saturday

A record number of contestants is expected for the Ozona Junior Rodeo this year, according to entries received. Many of these are local contestants which will create a great deal of interest for Ozona residents. Events are the same in all three age divisions for both boys and girls. However, the steer riding event in the boys 13 through 15 age group will be limited to the first 20 entries and the bull riding in the boys 16 through 18 age group will be limited to the first 40 entries. The rodeo will kick off with a parade through downtown Ozona at 4:30 Friday afternoon. There will be at least two floats and plans are being made to have the oldest man and the oldest woman in the county riding in an old-fashioned surrey. Oscar Kost is parade chairman, assisted by Mrs. Fred Hagelstein and Mrs. Mike Clayton. Anyone having a float they wish to enter may join the group at 4:00 p.m. on the vacant lot near the South Texas Lumber Co., on Ave. E or call Mrs. Clayton. The parade will travel to town, around the square and through the shopping center, dispersing near the Dairy King. The Lions Club sponsors the rodeo each year and all committees are headed up by club members. Bill Watson is general chairman. Tommy Sanders is chairman of the concession stand this year. Assisted by Jim Marks, Ray Henderson and Jimmie Lott, they promise plenty of hot hamburgers each night and cold, cold drinks. Bill Pagan will be in charge of the gate committee.

Aug. 18-20 Set For School Registration Classes Begin 24th

Supt. L. B. T. Sikes announced registration dates for students in high school and junior high school earlier this week. High school students will register as follows: Seniors, August 18, Tuesday, from 1:30 to 4:00 p.m.; Juniors, 9:00 to 11:30 a.m. and sophomores, 1:30 to 4 p.m.; August 19, Wednesday, Freshmen, 9:00 a.m. until 12 noon, August 20, Thursday. Junior high school students will be required to register as follows: August 18, Tuesday, seventh grade; August 19, Wednesday, 8th grade; August 20, Thursday, seventh and eighth grades. The first day of school is August 24. All high school students are asked to report to the auditorium and all junior high students will be asked to be at the girls' gym at 8:00 a.m. on that day. Classes will begin in the elementary grades Monday, August 24. Students in kindergarten through second grade are to report for classes at South Elementary, hereafter to be known as Ozona Primary School. Students in third through the sixth grades will report Monday, August 24, to North Elementary, henceforth to be known as Ozona Intermediate School. Frio Tex Spots Canyon Wildcat

Frio-tex Oil and Gas Co., San Antonio, will drill a 7,000-foot Canyon sand wildcat in Crockett County, 17 miles south-southwest of Ozona and 3 1/2 miles south of the Ozona (Canyon sand gas) field, but separated by a 7,000-foot failure. It is the No. 1-44 V. I. Pierce. Location is 1,940.3 feet from the north and 800 feet from the west lines of 44-000-W. T. Watt, Abst. 5136.

Midland Firm Spots Wildcat

Chesapeake Bay Gas Co., Midland, will drill its No. 1 Todd Estate, a 1,150-foot Grayburg wildcat in Crockett County, 18 miles west of Ozona and 3/8 miles north of Grayburg conglomerate gas production in the Howard Draw multipay field, but separated by a 1,294-foot failure. Location is 1,802 feet from south and 2,176 feet of west lines of 49-WX-GC&SF.

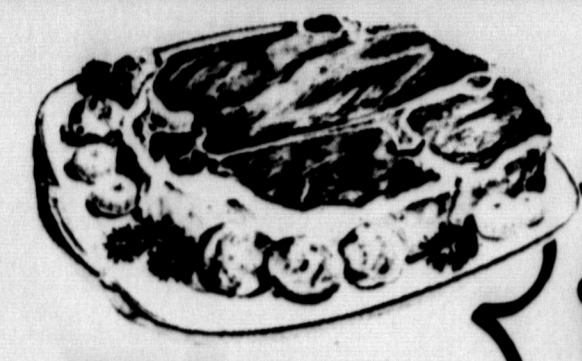

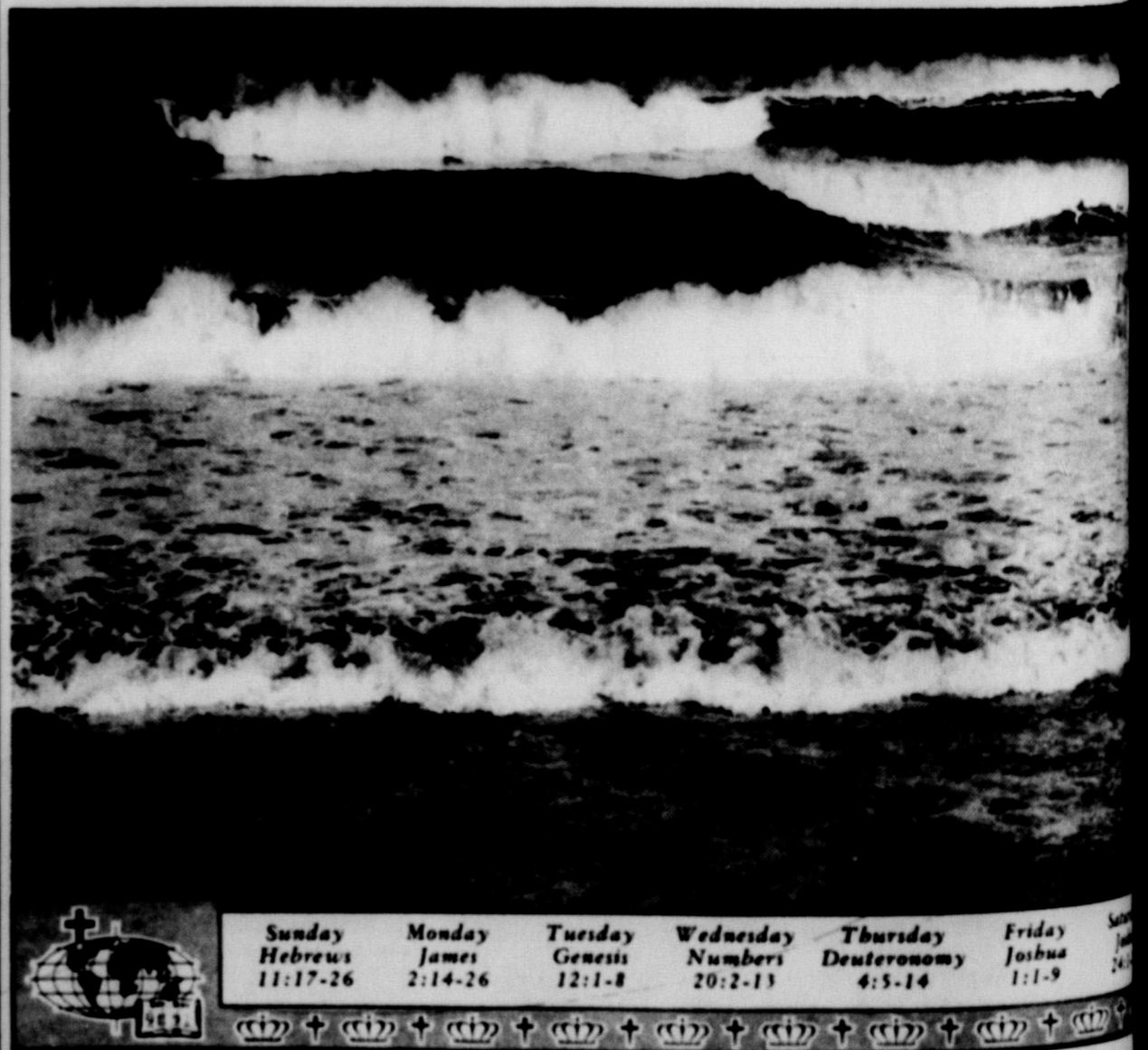
OCEAN'S EDGE

Americans - and proud of it

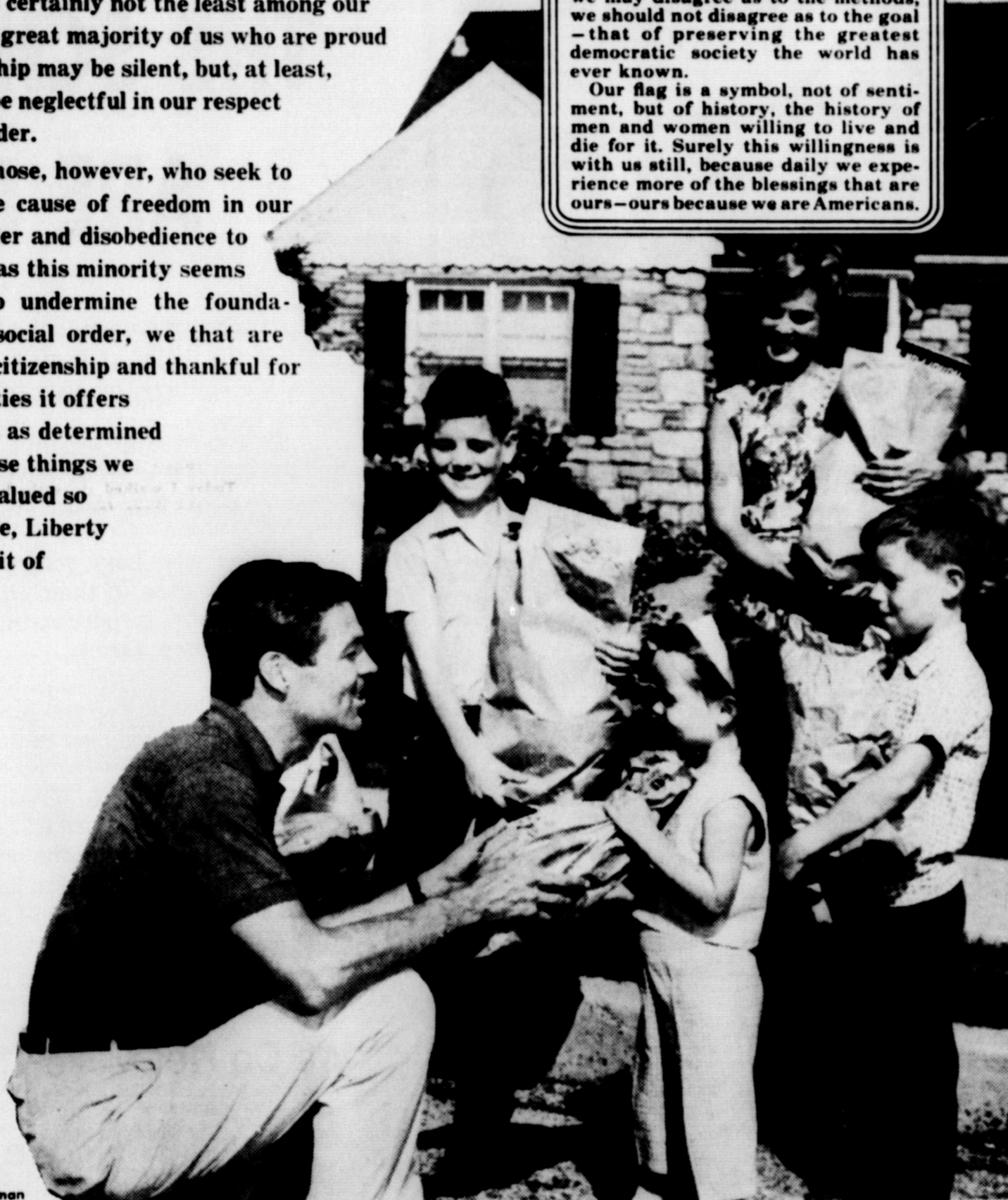

Tips For Gardeners

Correction: The formula for daylily and iris in last week's column should have read 1 tablespoon of Vigoro rather than vinegar.

Now is the time to begin planning for the year ahead, just what and where you will be planting. If you plant a new flower bed for fall, spade the ground, and soak it thoroughly. Let it dry out so it will break into small particles. You may need to add some sand and peat moss or new dirt to make a good loam. Plant more seed than you would in the spring because of poorer germination at this season. Gaillardia, California poppy, larkspur, snapdragon, pansies, bluebonnet and other hardy annuals and perennials may be planted this and next month.

One of the favorite summer flowers making a splash of color now is the perennial phlox.

Some Do and Don't hints for gardeners:

Do
Follow a regular feeding program for plants, trees and shrubs.
In using commercial fertilizer, always follow the directions.

Feed plants while they are making buds.

Feed plants after pruning to cause good growth.

Feed plants after they have finished blooming to replace food they have used in making blossoms.

Follow a regular watering schedule, both summer and winter.

Remember, nothing will take the place of regular care and cultivation.

Don't

Over feed plants.

Apply plant food without knowing what food is needed.

Grow the same kind of plants in the same location year after year without replacing the soil or adding plant food.

Feed plants that look sick. Plants need to recover before being fed heavily. Keep well watered and when it begins to revive apply feed gradually.

Feed after plants have been damaged by freezing.

Keep well watered and allow to recover before feeding.

Think plants can be set out and left to take care of themselves.

Forget to water regularly, specially now many shrubs may suffer from lack of moisture. Flower buds for next season's bloom or fruit are being set in many plants such

as holly, camellias, azaleas and others.

Forget to take a pail of water along so that the ends of flowers may be plunged immediately into water after cutting. The best time for cutting is early morning or late evening.

Daily the public and each individual is urged to help protect our beautiful parks, highways and countryside from fire, litter and vandalism.

Here in Ozona the county makes it possible to have several beautiful parks for everyone to enjoy and use. Litter barrels are placed in each, and in convenient places along the streets, yet many fail to realize the importance of seeing that litter is placed in these barrels. It would save many hours of work each day cleaning up the litter. Hours

that might be spent on improving the conveniences furnished for public pleasure and use.

Also, if everyone would see that the vacant lots and alleys were mowed and cleaned, many fires would be prevented during this extremely dry summer.

What a difference our concern could make in such a short time to help keep our city clean and attractive.

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

Somebody Loves Them
In these times the impression can be easily gained from the news that everybody is down on the policeman.

A seven state survey taken among independent businessmen in the states of West Virginia, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana by the National Federation of Independent Business comes up with some different answers.

Businessmen in these states, and they probably reflect the view of the entire nation, believe that the solution to the growing crime wave in the country is more police, and higher paid police.

Of course, it is the local businessmen in a community who would bear the big share of the burden of having more men on the force, and to meet the increased pay for the men in blue. But despite their concern with taxes, they apparently feel this money would be well spent.

It is also refreshing to note that the so-called "silent majority" is supporting the local police.

J. Edgar Hoover, the highly reliable FBI director recently issued a report for the first two months of this year which gave some appalling statistics. In that period of less than 60 days 9 police officers were killed and 2,394 badly injured in 37 cities and communities.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (JURIS) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company.

"(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:

"(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.

"(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

"(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

"(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxpayers electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

(continued from page one) ery major war in which the United States has fought, frontier doctors, school teachers, buffalo hunters and ordinary citizens who were in the vanguard of settlers who migrated to Texas in the early 19th century.

The name and location of the markers will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers.

The Hudspeth grave marker contains the following inscription:

"Henry Street Hudspeth 187-1900). A confederate veteran. Captain, Co. B, 2nd Calvary. Civil War. Born in Mississippi. Came to Texas, 1877. Served as county clerk after moving here, 1888.

"Married Elizabeth A. Royal. One of his five children was U. S. Congressman C. B. Hudspeth.

"Recorded -- 1970"

A similar plaque to mark the Casbeer grave reads: "Joseph L. Casbeer (1839-1918). A confederate veteran.

"Born in Lamar County. In Civil War, was in Co. G, Col. R. T. P. Allen's Texas Infantry, and was discharged in 1865.

"On Sept. 5, 1871, married Miss Matilda Peacock, in Lampasas county. They had 2 sons. Moved to Ozona in 1898.

"Recorded -- 1970."
