## Dedicate Markers For Civil War Vet Graves

Grave markers placed on the graves of five Civil War veterans buried in Cedar Hill Cemetery were dedicated at ceremonies Sunday afternoon under the leadership of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, which sponsored the project.

Mrs. Ira Carson, a member of the committee who was one of the leaders in gathering data leading to the grave markings, made the dedicatory address in which she stressed the need for a united America and a renewed sense of love for country. These men and all other Americans who have fought in all wars, were patriots willing to give their lives that freedom might be secure, she said.

"Let all of us acknowledge our debt to all the soldiers who have served through the years that these freedoms might be preserved," Mrs. Carson said.

Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chair-

man of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, recognized relatives of the Confederate veterans who were present for the ceremony.

Graves of the following five Confederate veterans were marked: Pharis Hurst, William Mathias Miller, Henry Street Hudspeth, Samuel Theodore Smith and Joseph L. Casbeer.

The seventh graders took a 12-0 victory from their Junction rivals and the eighth grade gave their opponents a 26-8 pounding in Thursday night's games.

## Lion B Team Overcomes Junction Eaglets

Coach Jim Williams' junior varsity took a 12-6 win over the Junction JV Thursday night for their second consecutive victory of the young football season.

The juniors looked great on defense and were much improved offensively as they ran up 142 yards rushing and passed for 75 yards.

Tim Evans scored both touchdowns for the junior Lions, the first on a one-yard run and the second on a spectacular 35-yard dash. The try for extra points failed both times.

Junction's lone score came on a Lion penalty and fumble that put them on the 4-yard line and enabled them to run it over. Again the try for points failed.

Monty Peltó completed 7 out of 10 passes for a total of 75 yards. In the pass receiving department, Dean Shaw caught 2 for 20 yards, Jesse Ortiz was 2 for 25 yards, Mike Wellman, 2 for 15 and Pete Maldonado, 1 for 15.

Leading rusher for the Lions was Evans with 78 yards on 19 carries, followed by Wellman with 51 yards on 11 carries. Other ground gainers were Oliver Payne, 11 yards on 1 carry; Cheo Vargas, 3 yards on 2 carries; Maldonado, 2 yards on one carry and Rick Humnicutt, who was 1 on 1.

The junior varsity will be in Big Lake tonight for a game with the Big Lake B team.

## Crockett Segment of Chihuahua Trail Gets Historical Marker

A newly erected historical marker on U. S. Highway 290, 27 miles west of Ozona, marking a segment of the Chihuahua Trail and the Escondido Water Hole, an important spot on the Chihuahua Trail, was dedicated Tuesday afternoon by members of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, headed by Mrs. R. A. Harrell as chairman.

The marker, provided by the State Historical Survey Committee and designated by it, was erected in the highway right of way by the local State Highway Department maintenance crew last week and dedication ceremonies were held at 5 p. m. Tuesday at the site.

Mrs. Joe Clayton of Ozona, marker chairman of the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee, and Henry Meadows of Midland, a member of the

Crockett county committee, who assisted in doing research on the trail and the lost water hole, took part in the dedication ceremonies.

The Chihuahua Trail did not come into being full blown as did the Santa Fe trail but was put together in bits and pieces over hundreds of years until the necessity for its extensive use was created by the California gold rush of 1849.

In its essence the Chihuahua Trail was an overland route from a seaport on Matagorda Bay through San Antonio de Bexar to Chihuahua, a wealthy and populous center in northern Mexico.

The Chihuahua Trail was extensively used by the '49ers en route to California as they came to Texas by ships to Indianola on Matagorda Bay then overland to San Antonio, Castroville.

San Felipe Springs, Devil's River to Beaver Lake, Howards Well, Liveoak Creek, up the Pecos to the vicinity of Horsehead Crossing, west to Comanche Springs, Leonita Springs, to Presidio del Norte, up the Concho river to Chihuahua and continued westerly across northern Mexico to San Diego. Through Crockett County the way is marked with scores of graves of those who fell to disease and accident.

The finale in the long history of the Chihuahua Trail occurred in January 1914 when approximately 5,000 Mexican Federalist soldiers and political refugees fled Chihuahua before the forces of revolutionary Pancho Villa and made the long trek afoot, by horseback and a few in cars following the old Trail to Presidio and up Alamo Creek to Marfa where they were put aboard trains for El Paso under the custody of U. S. troops. There is some evidence that some avoided the custody of the American soldiers and made their way down the old trail to San Antonio de Bexar.

The aluminum cast marker erected on a metal post set in a concrete foundation, reads as follows:

THE CHIHUAHUA TRAIL  
"Primitive highway from Texas Gulf Coast into the mining regions of Northern Mexico used by Indians for centuries before coming of Spanish explorers who wrote of this trail as early as 1590.

"Spain's indifference to colonizing Texas ended when the French were found to have occupied Fort St. Louis on the Gulf of Mexico, 1685-89.

Spanish missions and presidios were built, and traffic used the roads of the explorers. This trail was open from La Bahia (near present Victoria) to San Antonio and through present Crockett and neighboring counties, into Chihuahua, Northern Mexico, where by 1750 half of the world's supply of silver was being mined.

"Like all primitive roads, it existed because of wild game supplies, passable terrain, grass and water. The Escondido Water Hole (on private property in this vicinity) on the dry divide between the Pecos and Devil's Rivers had been used for centuries by Indians; it held the only dependable supply of water for many miles. Hidden in a small canyon, it could be used only if found by chance or by a guide. Yet it was the reason for angling the Trail into this area.

On ground around it are the graves of many who did not survive the thirst, fights and other perils of early travel." (1970) (Paraphrasing ours.)

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#### WISE WORDS — LEAVE AN UNANSWERED QUESTION

At the 1970 Lions International convention, Past President Frank V. Birch offered a few thoughts which, if not headlines-makers, invite our thoughtful consideration.

"You and I," Mr. Birch told the Lions, "are a part of what some folks call 'the silent majority.' We don't march up and down the streets, tipping over cars or breaking windows. We don't start trouble in our schools, or playgrounds, or in other people's houses.

"But sometimes I feel that we are too complacent, too self-satisfied. All of us, young or old, liberal or conservative, have for too long been silent on the issue of violence. We have seen fighting on the streets, arson in our schools, degrading behavior by men and women and by boys and girls who should know better. But we have stood by and done nothing about it. We have closed our windows and pulled our shades, and kept out of it — and sometimes even in fear.

"Let us, as good Americans, find once again our ability to distinguish between protest and revolt; between dissent and chaos; between demonstration and destruction; between non-violence and violence.

#### THE FAMILY LAWYER

##### Driving Without a License

When Jeff's car knocked down a pedestrian he felt no great sense of guilt. After all, he had been driving properly, well within the speed limit. Clearly it was not his fault that the man had stepped out suddenly from behind a parked car.

Then Jeff remembered, with a sinking feeling, that his driver's license had expired. Sure enough, the pedestrian seized upon this point in suing for damages.

"Anyone without a driver's license," he argued at a court hearing, "has no business driving a car in the first place."



Nevertheless, the court decided Jeff could not be held legally liable. The judge said his lack of a license, even though wrongful, had no connection at all with the accident.

Generally speaking, the mere fact that a motorist has no license does not make him automatically responsible for accidents. For this would be imposing an extra penalty upon him, in addition to the regular penalty the law already imposes for driving without a license.

Furthermore, an unlicensed driver is himself entitled to collect damages, if someone else negligently injures him. Otherwise, noted one court, he would become a helpless target for any other driver on the road.

On the other hand, there is no doubt that the state does have a right not only to require a license but also to enforce that requirement rigorously.

In one case a citizen became licensed at the idea of police roadblocks, which were used from time to time to check up on the licenses of passing motorists. Finally he went to court for an injunction demanding an end to this practice.

"Until a motorist has done something wrong," he said, "the police have no authority to stop him. He has a right to use the public streets without any interference."

But the court rejected his demand, saying "but the right to use the public streets is subject to the reasonable exercise of the state's police power. A license and good

### COURT STREAMLINING NEEDED



#### Crockett Crude Output Reaches 197 Million Bbls.

Dallas -- Texas oil fields have produced more than 32 billion barrels of oil during the past 80 years of recorded production, according to the latest compilation of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Last year's production of 1,151,775,000 barrels produced an income of \$3.6 billion for Texas which was distributed widely as 198 of the state's 254 counties produce oil.

Crockett County, which has had recorded oil production since 1925, has had a total crude oil output of 196,961,327 barrels up to the beginning of 1970. Crockett county production in 1969 was 7,951,393 barrels at the rate of 21,785 barrels a day.

Thirty-four counties in the state produced more than 25,000 barrels a day.

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

Though we have had only light showers here in Ozona, they have given us the courage and urge to continue gardening chores. For me, the fall months are the most colorful and enjoyable of the year.

Well cared for roses have more perfect form, more free of wind and cold damage, and deeper and richer in color. Trees put on their best show with the display of so many different varieties and colors in leaves before they fall.

Summer-growing bulbs that rest in winter that have not already died down naturally, should be encouraged to do so by gradually reducing the water supply and finally with holding it. Amaryllis, caladiums, tuberous begonias etc. If caladiums have been grown in pots, they may now be dried off and the pots stored in a cool, dry place where they won't freeze.

Sweet peas planted in September may be expected to bloom from Christmas on. Lawn of seed mixtures or Bermuda may be sown this month. Keep moist for seed to germinate and get started before cold weather.

Young plants of snapdragons, pansies, stock and calendulas may be planted now if very hot, shade them lightly for several days.

Continue to water azaleas and camellias regularly during dry weather. Also fruit trees that are now making buds for next year should be watered freely if dry weather continues.

For best results, hedges of all kinds should receive their final trimming this month. Prune hypericum (gold flower) in late fall or early winter. Select oldest wood and cut to four inches of base. The oldest wood is lacking in foliage. If allowed to grow unhampered, they will have little bloom.

Never shear a plant unless you are planning a formal hedge. If you want to fill in vacant spaces you may move well-budded chrysanthemums into pots. Do this in cloudy weather if possible and soak plants the day before transplanting and again for several days. Stake if needed.

Pick off all dead leaves and rake all litter from beneath plants. This may prevent overwintering of insects and disease organisms.

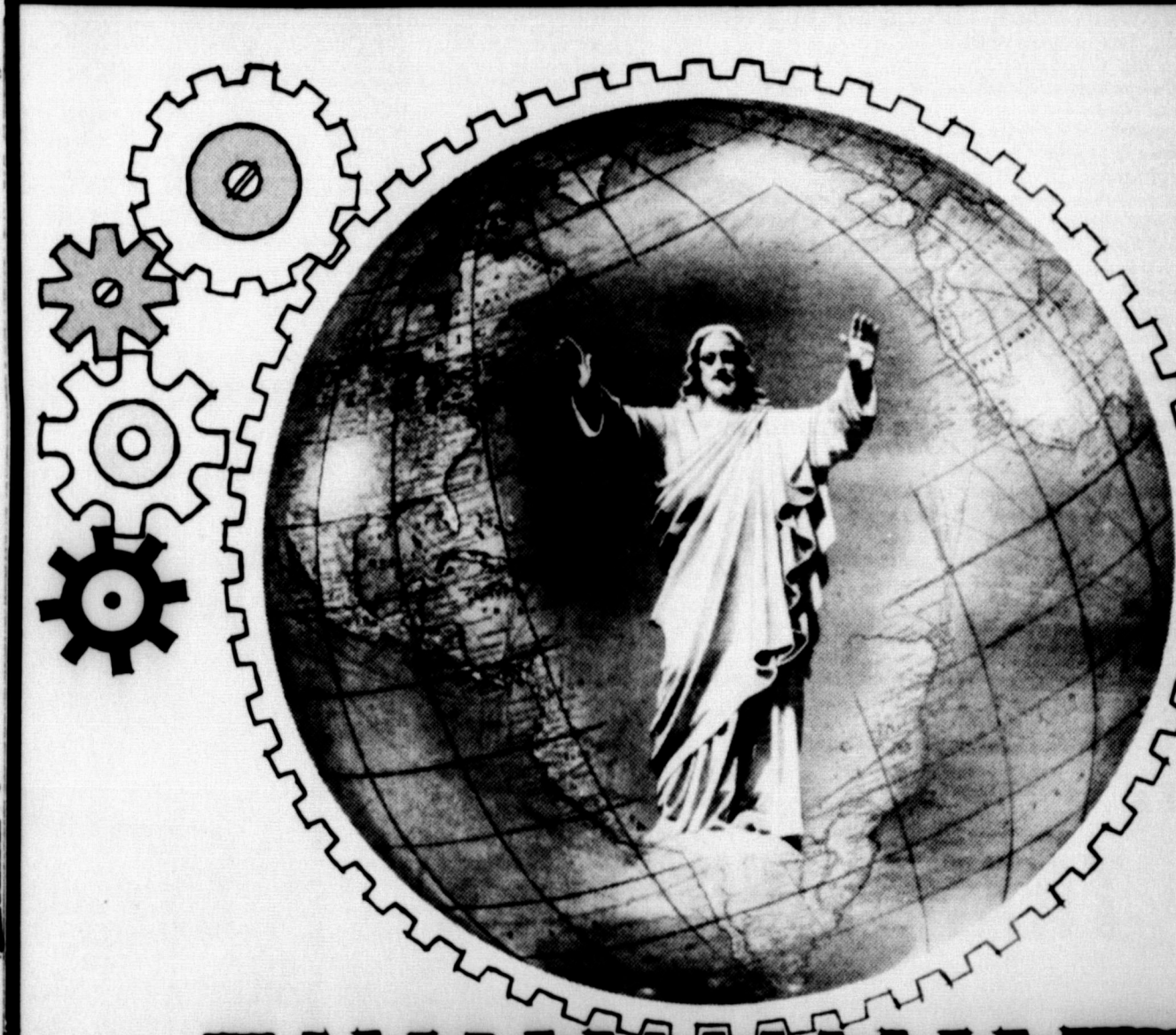

### Producers Urged To Fill Out Crop Questionnaire

Information supplied by some 25,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will become the basis for the official crop production estimates for each county and the State.

County Agent Pete Jacoby said a representative number of farmers and ranchers in Crockett County will be among the 25,000 in Texas receiving the questionnaire from State Statistician Cary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. The questionnaire will be mailed during the last half of October and early Nov.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers in planning their production and marketing, farm program participation and also for providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, emphasized Jacoby.

The program of estimates for each county is provided by the Texas Legislature. Since Texas covers such a wide area and with great diversification of production, State totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry, Agriculture, the county agent explained. This is a joint project, he said, between the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Because of the importance of the program, the county agent urges every producer in the county who receives a questionnaire from the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service to fill it out completely for his farm or ranch and return it to the Austin Office of the Reporting Service.

### Two Outposts In Crockett Field Slated

Monitor Natural Gas Co., of Midland, will drill two outposts to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field of Crockett County, 28 miles south of Ozona.

The No. 1-46 V. 1. Pierce, 1/4 mile north of a 5 3/8 mile south extension, is 1,360 feet from the west and 1,320 feet from the south lines of 46-A-TCRR.

The No. 2-46 V. 1. Pierce, one mile northeast of the extension, is 1,700 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 46-A-TCRR.

Both projects are contracted to 7,000 feet. The extender, The Rodman Corp., Qnessa, No. 1-47 Harvick, was finalized Nov. 12, 1967 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.8 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratios of 33,292-1, through perforations at 5,446-6,140 feet.

Operator had suggested field designation of V. 1. P. (Canyon).

Twenty-two Ozona girls were among an estimated 500 who attended the District 4 El Comiso Girl Scout Council's Autumn Action in Junction last Saturday.

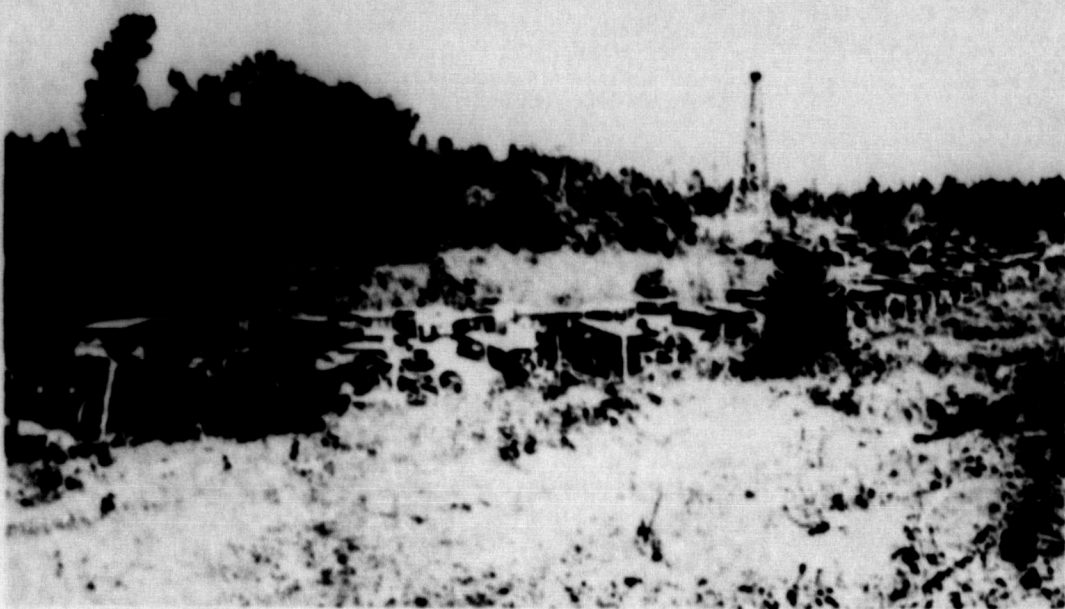

The first try for extra points failed when the kick was blocked and the second was a pass try for two points which failed to jell. Had the Lions been successful in these endeavors, they would probably have tried for the field goal at some point in the fourth quarter, although a steady drizzle fell throughout the second half.
