Commissioners Canvass General Election Returns

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in regular session and canvassed the recent General Election returns with no change in the results. Judge Bernice Jones read a letter from the Highway Department regarding adjustments in regard to Ozona Primary School. There will be a change in speed limit signs and a crosswalk painted for children who must cross Highway 163 going to and from school. It was announced that the Water District and the County in a joint effort had completed the project of ridding the city of outdoor toilets. All outdoor facilities are gone and sewer connections completed. The court spent the remainder of the day with monthly reports.

Pomer Ranch Field Gets 2nd Simpson Strike

One Crockett County field gained a confirmation and another location for an outpost. The Pomer Ranch multipay field of Crockett County gained its second Simpson producer and a 5/8 mile north extension to that pay with completion of Texas Oil & Gas Corp. Midland, No. 1-B Pomer Ranch, 16 miles southeast of Sheffield, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 16.2 million cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 127, 600-1. Production was natural through perforations at 9,342-358 feet. Drilled to 9,652 feet, operator set 4 1/2-inch casing at 9,650 feet and plugged back to 9,650 feet. Location is 1,120 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the west lines of 47-ST-MK&T. The field has one Devonian well. Monitor Natural Gas Co. Midland, will drill the No. 2-34 Zipp Ranch as a 1 1/2-mile southwest, a 1 1/2 mile west and slightly north, and a 1 1/2-mile south-southwest outpost to the Ozona (Canyon sand) gas field of Crockett County, 32 miles southwest of Ozona. Location, on a 640-acre lease, is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 34-MM-T&SLRRCO.

Dist. Title On Line Friday Night When Lions Invade McCamey

Coach Rip Sewell's Ozona Lions will win the right to represent District 5-AA in bi-district play if they can come up with the big one, and that is a win over the McCamey Badgers tomorrow night in McCamey. It will be a co-championship at best. However, with three teams tied in district play, Big Lake, McCamey and Ozona, a win over the Badgers would give Ozona the right to advance to the playoff by virtue of a win over Big Lake in the first district game of the season. Should McCamey win, they will also share the championship with the Owls in all probability, since the chances of an Owl defeat at the hands of the winless Buffaloes seems remote to say the least. In this case, Big Lake would represent the district, since they own a win over the Badgers. Coahoma, the only district opponent to pick up a win over Ozona, lost out to McCamey last Friday night in the final seconds of the game by a 51-50 score. Big Lake downed Crane 27-8 and the Ozona Lions pounded the Stanton Buffaloes 60-8. Coach Sewell thinks the Lions' chances of beating the Badgers are excellent and feels that if the Lions are able to contain the McCamey team's passing attack, they will pick up the win. The Lions had it easy in their homecoming game with Stanton and it could hardly be called a tough scrimmage. The highlight of the night was the crowning of the football sweetheart, Miss Tanya Blanton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tex Blanton, during halftime activities. Other candidates for sweetheart were Georgianne Jones and Suzy Tankersley. Having an off-week, the junior varsity suited up with the varsity and most boys saw action in the second half of play. The Lions scored nine touchdowns and six extra points. Ruben Tambunga had a fantastic night, rushing for 304 yards on 11 carries for an average of almost 30 yards. He scored 5 touchdowns for the Lions, one on an interception. (Continued on last page)

Two Die, Another Hurt In One-Car Accident

A one-vehicle crash early Thursday morning on Hwy 290 13 miles west of Ozona killed two and left another injured. Dead were Linda Sue Baldwin, 19, who was pronounced dead at the scene, and Stephen Lane Turner, 18, who died enroute to Shannon Hospital several hours after the crash. The driver of the imported compact automobile, Judith Vanhorn, 25, was listed in fair condition after being transferred to Shannon Hospital Thursday afternoon. The car hit one of the narrow bridges west of town, and was literally cut in half. Miss Baldwin was a passenger on the side of impact and was killed instantly. A truck driver who saw the crash said it looked as if the car veered straight for the concrete bridge. Turner, a passenger in the back seat, was rushed to Crockett County Hospital along with Miss Vanhorn, but died of massive injuries as he was being transferred to San Angelo. Miss Baldwin and Turner were from St. Petersburg, Fla. and Miss Vanhorn is from Largo, Fla. Miss Baldwin's body was shipped to C. E. Prevatt Memorial Home in St. Petersburg. She was buried in Memorial Park Cemetery there. She was born Aug. 20, 1951 in Greenville, Pa. and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd W. Baldwin of St. Petersburg. Turner's body was sent to Downs-Ford Funeral Home in St. Petersburg. He was born April 29, 1952 in Newton Center, Mass.

FOUR GIGANTIC MAINLINER ENGINES like this one created a tremendous roar and shaking of the earth when the recently completed Coastal States gas pumping station began operations on the Mitchell ranch in the southwest corner of Crockett County. The huge engines built by Worthington Corp. pump gas in through a 30-inch pipeline under 625 pounds of pressure and out under 1,000 pounds of pressure. Operating at full capacity, the Worthington Mainliners, operating at 4,000 horsepower each, will take care of well over 600,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas per day. Worthington Corp. was the general contractor for the plant which is the only one of its kind in Crockett County. Gas is pumped to the plant from fields in Fort Stockton and west and is pumped out, after traveling through a cleaning process, to a similar plant in Sutton County and on to the Gulf coast where it is routed through lines to various states for consumer use.

HITTING WHERE IT HURTS

The item didn't get a very big play in the nation's press, but it's dollars to doughnuts that the administrators of colleges and universities will not let it pass unnoticed. We refer to a New York City small-claims court ruling that New York University had violated its contract by closing the school for nine days of student riots, and thus owed a \$277 tuition refund to Roger Paynter, a city fire department employee, who's son had been prevented from attending classes.

This, of course, has been the point made by Young Americans For Freedom right along: that a school catalog describing the courses of study to be offered, the semester hours earned, and the fees charged for the enrollment in said courses constitutes a valid contract, or agreement, between the parties concerned; and that failure on the part of the school to provide the courses of study, as described, is an out-and-out breach of contract.

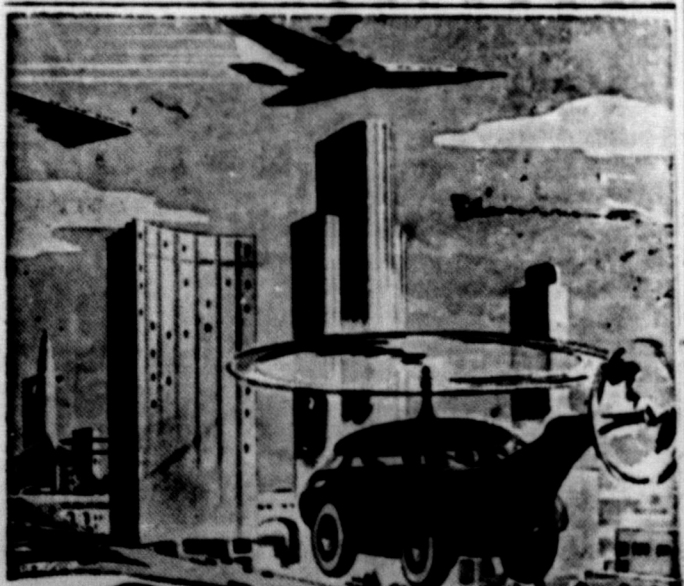
Studies have revealed that the ringleaders and instigators of campus riots have been composed largely of off-campus, non-students "professional revolutionaries," combined with neighborhood punks and punks with only a tiny handful—not more than one to two per cent—of legitimate student participants. And many of that tiny student minority have been revealed as free-loaders or "rich kids" who appeared to be in school for no serious purpose, other than to avoid working for a living or ducking military service.

In the meantime, the vast majority of hard-working students, many of them attending school only because of genuine sacrifice on the part of responsible parents, have been the victims of administrative permissiveness.

We hope that the decision of the small-claims court in New York will signal a return to sanity, and responsibility, in the academic community.

THEY AREN'T SPRING CHICKENS

We really shouldn't be surprised that among the six alleged bomb-planters picked up by the New York Police recently was a 54-year-old Bronx woman, old enough to be a grandmother. Although the "new left" is frequently associated with the term "youth", the fact is that most of the ring-leaders are well-along-in-years men and women. The darlings of the "new left", well publicized and promoted by the "liberal" press, include such elders as Dave Dellinger who is 52 years of age; Rennie Davis, along with Tom Hayden, (ring-leaders of the Chicago riots) are both 29 years old, and the comic-characters Abbie Hoffman and Jerry Rubin are 32 and 31 respectively.

Should Peace Be Expensive?

Out of the debate and controversy over the war in Vietnam emerges a most disturbing line of reasoning.

A major thrust of those opposed to the war is that if the nation pulled out of Southeast Asia the money being spent there could be used for a variety of domestic programs.

This is the disturbing factor in all these discussions.

Obviously, the war in Vietnam costs money, as do all wars. Yet if the war is ended why is it necessary to find some need as much money, then the Federal money is withheld.

This, then, means that 20 per cent, or one out of every five people is working for government, and their paychecks come out of taxes.

Thus in all this discussion of how to spend the money that would be saved with Vietnam ending, it appears the cart is being put before the horse.

Perhaps a little more discussion should be placed on how to use these savings to cut taxes. But perhaps that is too much of an old-fashioned idea. Perhaps the modern idea is that if you have the money rolling in, don't let loose of it, but figure out some new way to spend it.

The rise of Federal spending goes down to the county and

city level. Unless these local government units adopt some matching spending programs, then the Federal money is withheld.

The figures can be quite revealing. As of June of this year the government figures show 75,174,000 people were employed. Of the total, slightly over 12,000,000 were employed by government of all levels.

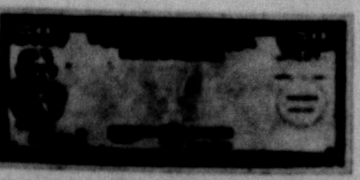

Sift together dry ingredients. Beat butter and cream cheese until fluffy. Add beaten eggs and beat well. Blend into sifted dry ingredients. Chill dough one hour. On lightly floured board, roll dough 1/4 inch thick. Cut individual rounds with floured biscuit cutter. Make an impression in center of each round with thumb. Fill imprint with preserves or jelly (about 1 teaspoon). Bake on an ungreased baking sheet in moderate oven (375 degrees) for 18 minutes or until delicately browned. Serve warm. Makes about 24.

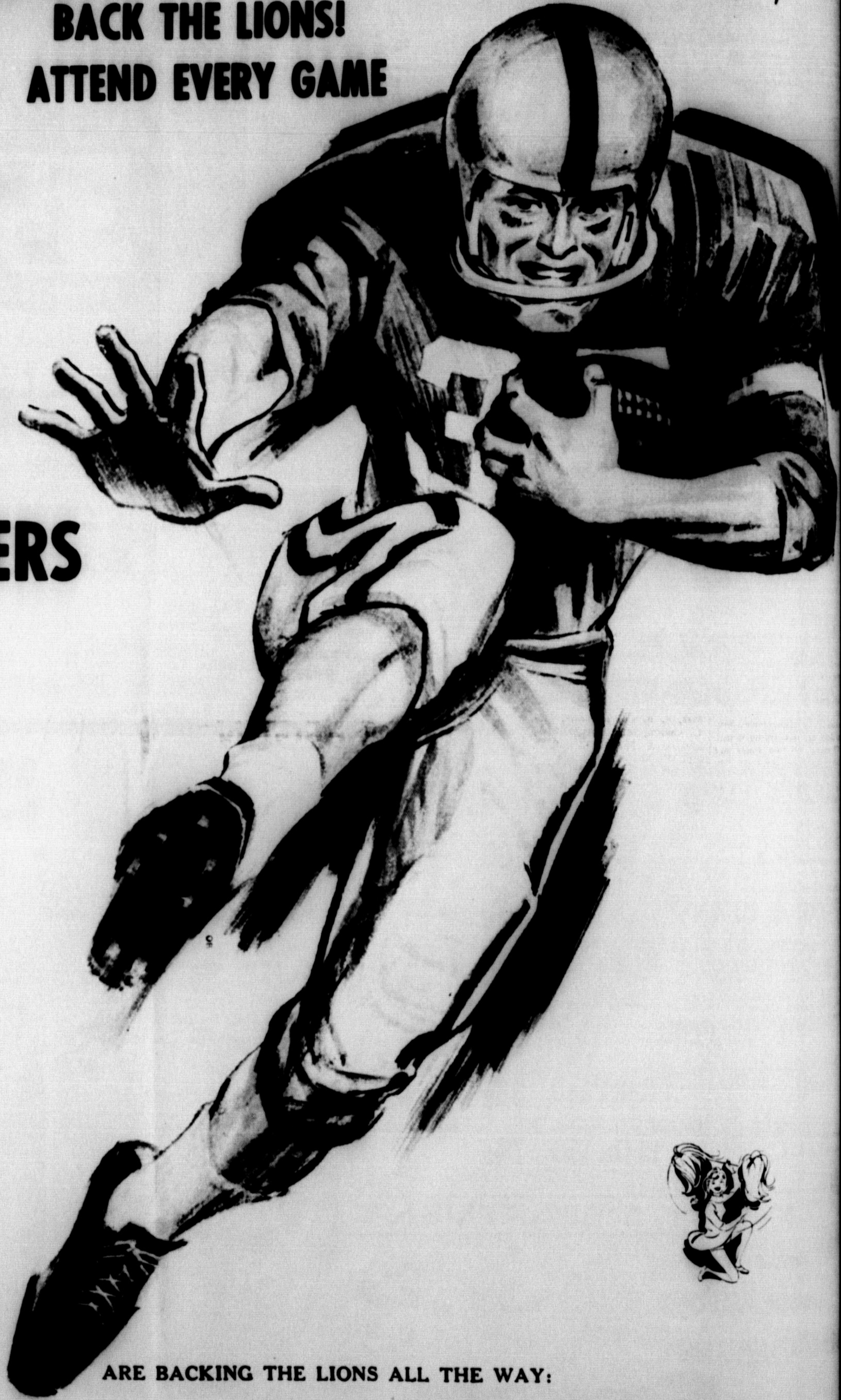

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

From Kitty's Kitchen

Sour Cream Pound Cake

3 c. flour
1/2 teas. soda
1/2 lb. butter
3 c. sugar
6 eggs, separated
1 pt. sour cream
1 teas. vanilla

Sift flour with soda. Cream butter and sugar; beat in egg yolks until lemon colored. Add sour cream and flour mixture and beat well. Add vanilla. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into batter. Turn into greased and floured tube pan. Bake for 1 1/2 hours at 300 degrees.

I pilfered this recipe from Tisde Mitchell after eating some of the cake at her house one night last week. She adds a touch that enhances it considerably. After pouring half the batter into the pan, she sprinkles a mixture of about 1/2 cup of brown sugar, 1 teas. cinnamon and 1/2 cup of chopped nuts over the top, then pours in the rest of the batter. It is especially good served warm.

Radar Vs. Motorist

Citizen Haines, given a ticket for speeding, determined to fight his case in court. At the hearing, officers relied on radar evidence to prove the charge against him. According to radar, Haines had indeed been traveling well over the speed limit.

But the police overlooked one thing. They failed to produce evidence that their radar equipment was in good working order on the day Haines was arrested. Result: he won an acquittal.

This case illustrates how the law, while accepting the benefits of technical progress, is also concerned with fair play for the individual. Almost everywhere, in traffic cases, courts will insist on evidence that the radar equipment was working properly when it was put to use.

Today it is standard practice for such equipment to be checked regularly. Usually this is done by tuning forks or by clocked road tests. Even so, some motorists, still not convinced, have challenged the entire principle of radar, calling it too experimental to be trusted in the courtroom.

In an earlier day, the law too was skeptical about radar as a scientific principle. But now that skepticism has largely disappeared. As one judge put it:

"X-rays, electrocardiograms, time by watches, identity by fingerprinting, and ballistic evidence are freely accepted in our courts for their general reliability, without the necessity of expert testimony as to the scientific principles underlying them. The use of radar for speed detection may now be said to fall in this category."

In one case an arrested motorist, flagged down by radar, tried a different tack. He claimed he was the victim of an illegal "speed trap." But the evidence showed:

- 1) that the vehicle containing the radar equipment was plainly marked as a police car; and

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

House plants during the present month need routine attention in the matter of feeding and watering. Take care that none get so dry that their leaves wilt or shrivel on their stems, but do not keep the soil in a constant bog-like condition. And, go easy on fertilizing now. Most plants will not need that attention, but pot-bound old foliage plants with plenty of leaves, such as ferns, dracaenas, fatsederas and philodendrons, may be given diluted liquid fertilizer twice a month.

At night it is apt to be very much colder close to a window than toward the center of the room. Move tender plants on cold nights or pull the shades. Cold drafts are extremely bad for house plants. Some, such as Poinsettias, drop their leaves at once if they are exposed, others may not show immediate damage but are permanently harmed. See that your plants get all possible sunlight now. Keep them away from hot radiators and other sources of dry heat. Long spindly growth is a sure indication that your plants are getting insufficient light, that the temperatures are too high, or that both conditions exist.

Cut tops of peonies back a few inches, add a cup of bone meal to soil around the plant and mound with soil for the winter.

If you find it necessary to prune a sizeable branch from a tree at this time of the year, it is well to leave a stub several inches long, then remove in early spring and paint the cut with tree wound paint.

Keep after slugs and snails. Repeated baiting produces the best results. Watch for other diseases and pests.

Finish planting and transplanting perennials this month and many annual flowers may be seeded. Kinds to sow include larkspur, poppy, phlox drummondii and cornflower.
