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#### MARIJUANA IS DANGEROUS!

For a long time the "hop heads" have insisted that no physical danger is involved in smoking "pot," or marijuana. The truth is, up until now three had been very little hard information vailable, one way or the other, as to any lasting physical damage.

The short-range effects have been apparent; hallucinations, narrowed vision and distortion of time, loss of coordination, the lack of ability to concentrate and reason, confused associations, blurred speach, etc. But all of this, claim the apologists for "pot". is "no worse than" getting drunk on alcohol. But if getting high on marijuana is as bad as intoxication from booze, this alone should be sufficient condemnation. According to Dr. Hardin Jones, Prof. of Physiology and Medical Physics at the University of California in Berkeley, each year about 75,000 persons die because of alcohol (25,000 from accidents and 50,000 because they graduate to heavy use of alcohol and perish from liver disease). Additionally, says Dr. Jones, about 300,000 live but have alcohol-induced injuries.

An additional hazard of marijuana is that when a new and more powerful drug is introduced into a circle of "pot" smokers, the group will take up the new drug. The history of most hard drug addicts shows that they started with marijuana.

Now, however, scientists are turning up evidence about marijuana which should discourage any sane person from touch- a subsidy to non-unionized eming the stuff. "This is organic cellular damage," Dr. Wade said. "First it causes personality alterations .. a flattening of the personality, what we might call a decay of the moral fiber.

Dr. Wades chilling conclusion: "Persons who suffer such brain damage do not ever recover from it."

Investigation shows that most users of marijuana first do so for no better reason than that some person already using the drug asks another to "join the fun." There is only one answer to give to that invitation: "No, no, and a thousand times, no."







Over our city many of the trees are at their peak of brilliant yellow and red fall colors. The early freeze curled the more tender leaves of the tallow trees as they were just beginning to turn. The lancedleaved sumac is the prettiest it has been for several years. And don't miss going by to see the handsome red oak in the Pogue yard on highway 163 and the Spanish oaks at the hospital.

In late November begin to

plant Dutch bulbs every ten days for a succession of blooms by Easter, and continue through December. This is the ideal time in most sections to plant Tulip bulbs. Set them at an even depth of about six inches, They make a more attractive display if planted in groups or drifts rather than a straight row. Plant in deeply prepared and well drained soil. Bulbs will respond to good top soil mixed with compost, leaf mold, humas and 1 pound to 1 pound of Bone Meal to each square yard. Never use fresh manure near them. Keep in mind that bulbs root downward. The quality of the soil beneath them is more important than that of the soil above them. Pot amaryllis bulbs in pots for indoor blooms or plant

outdoors for spring. Don't forget your evergreen shrubs entering winter with insufficient moisture are more sysceptible to damage from low temperature and drying winds. Hollies and pyracanthas may drop their berries and camellias and azaleas their flower buds. To avoid damage, soak soil



# WE CONQUERED THE WIND TO BRING YOU BETTER TELEVISION

Last Friday's big wind provided the test of a recently installed brace on our 400-foot television tower to prevent tower twist and fade out of television signals during heavy wind storms.

And the installation proved its worth. In one of the strongest winds seen here in many years, the tv signal remained steady on sets in Ozona homes served by the cable system. Heretofore, such a wind would have put the system out of operation for the duration of the blow.

The improvement, what is known as a star mount, has been installed in both Ozona and Big Lake towers which bring you microwave signals for transmission on the cable system. The big iron beam frame, 18 feet across and forming a three point star from each tower face, is mounted near the the top of the tower and guyed with six big guy wires.

This prevents both sway and twist of the tower. Microwave transmission being a line of sight travel, a deviation of only a fraction of an inch is 42 miles will completely lose the tv signal. With the new tower brace, the equipment remains accurately sighted and the sign nal remains steady.

Crockett County's petroleum industry produces 7, 951, 393 barrels of crude oil valued at \$25, 517, 967 and 72, 626, 874 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$9, 949, 879 for an annual economic value of \$35, 467, 846.

These figures, just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, show the county ranked 37th among state counties in oil and gas production during 1969.


"Production from Crockett County helped meet this record demand, " says Kenneth E. Montague, Association President, "We are now calling on it and the rest of Texas to meet an even greater demand as events in the Middle East have again forced us to dip into our declining reserves. Unfortunately, the price for Texas oil is inexploratory drilling to replace

Crockett County landowners and others with mineral interests received \$4, 433, 481 in royalty payments last year. Texas received \$1, 173, 827 from crude oil production taxes and \$706, 441 from natural gas production taxes.

Estimated drilling expenditures totaled \$8, 489, 617 with \$1, 248, 996 of that amount spent on dry holes yielding nothing for the driller. Ira Rinehart's Yearbook showed drillers completed 34 oil wells. 47 gas wells and 28 dry holes. Twenty-three wildcats were drilled with 16 of them dry.

The county's oil and gas processing plants also added to the economy. The Oil and Gas Journal listed 6 natural gasoline plants with a capacity of 147.0 million cubic feet

Reports from the Texas Employment Commission show some 277 persons were directly industry in the county with an annual payroll of \$1, 941, 388.


