On a 200x200 foot lot, the building will provide offices for all DPS field service personnel in the area, including the Highway Patrol, Driver License and Weights Division, Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, Texas Rangers, plus the radio communications crew. At least five new families will be brought to Ozona as a result of establishment of the communications center here. Antennas for the DPS radio will be mounted on the 500-foot tower located at Crockett Heights, five miles east of Ozona.

McDonald Laser Project Success

Fort Davis, Texas--The lunar laser project being conducted by the University of Texas McDonald Observatory here has been labeled a complete success by the project scientist.

The bold experiment, sponsored by UT Austin and NASA, involves bouncing a laser beam off a reflector on the moon's surface daily to measure the distance at any given time from the earth to the moon. The reflector was placed on the moon's surface by Apollo 11 astronauts.

From data received through the measurement experiments, scientists are studying polar motion of the earth, continental drift, the length of a day and information on gravity and relativity.

One Seriously Hurt - Three Accidents Mar Holiday Period Here

Crockett county was one of the safer places to travel in Texas during the Christmas holiday period, with only three accidents reported and one serious injury, although the death toll from holiday accidents in Texas fell short of the predicted 54, there were 41 traffic fatalities in the state.

In the county a Christmas Eve accident 21 miles north of Ozona on Hwy 137 sent a San Antonio man to a San Angelo hospital with possible broken neck and head injuries. Stetson Laminack was still in serious condition at mid-week after he lost control of his 1970 Plymouth Roadrunner and overturned three times on the highway between Ozona and Big Lake the night before the Christmas holiday. The late model car was a total wreck.

The two other accidents reported by Highway Patrolman John Harris, DPS, were minor with no injuries reported.

Late Christmas Day a collision between a Dodge pickup driven by Burl Adwell and a 1965 Buick driven by Clitis Sinclair at the intersection of Ave. F and 10th St. caused minor damage to both vehicles.

Sunday morning early only minor damage was done to a 1970 Ford when its driver, Leola Leamons of San Antonio, was forced to take to the barrow ditch to avoid a head-on collision about 8 miles east of Ozona on Hwy 290, and travel-700 feet into a pasture before

coming to a stop. Neither the driver nor two passengers were hurt.

All Aliens In US Required To Register In Jan.

All aliens in the United States are reminded that the deadline for reporting their addresses to the Attorney General is January 31.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year are required to report by the end of the month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement:

- (1) Accredited Diplomats; and
- (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any post office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office during the month of January. Also, this year the reporting requirement has been broadened to additionally provide for the mailing of completed address reports directly to the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

However, the cards will still be received at all post offices and Immigration and Naturalization Service offices as in the past.

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A NEW YEAR'S MESSAGE

(Repeated by Request)

At this time of the year it is customary to have a New Year's editorial, and usually it deals with events of the year past, prospects for the year ahead, or the perishability of New Year's resolutions.

This year we found what we think is a more appropriate subject in a terse comment made by a refugee from Cuba some time ago. This man, an ex-cab driver from New York, went to live in Cuba before Castro took over. His comment, upon setting foot on US soil:

"I wouldn't live in Castro's Cuba if they gave me a dollar for every minute I spend there."

The refugee, Puerto Rican-born Amerigo Puig, then explained his distaste for the sanctuary we have given Communism in the Caribbean. Castro's regime stripped him of \$25,000, his life savings, which he had saved while working in New York. But that was only part of it. Food, which Cuba once exported, is so scarce that people have to rely on the black market where a chicken worth \$2 cost \$10, where rice is officially listed at 19 cents a pound but costs \$2.25, and where meat is quoted at 35 cents a pound but costs \$5.

You don't have to take Amerigo Puig's word for the fact that Communist Cuba is a pretty miserable place. Seventy others got out with him. They aren't talking, beyond saying they're afraid to talk for fear of endangering relatives still in Cuba. Which is pretty eloquent testimony of a silent nature.

We bring these things up as a reminder that when comparisons are made, the United States is pretty wonderful. And when comparisons are made with countries with a socialistic form of government, whether it's the British type, the Swedish "middle way," or the brutal type found in the USSR, China or Cuba - the United States is a veritable paradise, for citizens of all creeds and colors.

The moral, in the form of a New Year's resolution for 1971: "Let's defend and strengthen the wonderful system that has been given us, and cherish it, each and every one."

IRRESPONSIBLE RHETORIC

Much mention has been made over the matter of "irresponsible rhetoric." Seldom are we told what the charges mean, except that it usually seems to be directed against those who call for law and order.

There are, however, numerous examples of not only irresponsible, but inflammatory rhetoric. How about Jerry Rubin as a starter:

"The first part of the Yippie program, you know, is to kill your parents. And I mean that quite seriously, because until you're prepared to kill your parents you're not really prepared to change the country, because our parents are our first oppressors."

Or this bit of sage Rubin advice: "Quit being students. Become criminals. Break every law."

Or Bernadine Dohrn's emotionally charged "They used guns at Cornell and they got what they wanted." Both of these lovelies appeared, among numbers of other extremists, at Kent State—long before the fatal Monday, May 4.

Or how about the ill-famed attorney William Kunstler who, quoting as his authority Willson O. Douglas' invitation to use violence to "restructure" American society, has this to say in an interview:

"You condone arson," Kunstler was asked.

"Yes," said Kunstler, "if a point has been reached in a given situation where the mechanisms of society are not responding to serious grievances."

There is, indeed, much "irresponsible rhetoric" these days—but it doesn't seem to be coming from those who are calling for a return to a sane and safe society.

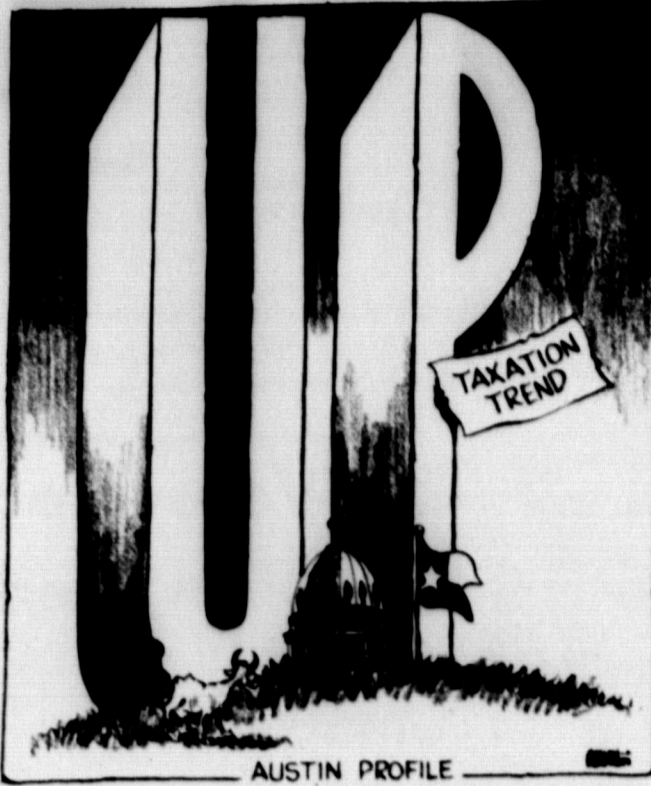
From Kitty's Kitchen

Tuna Tetrazzini

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 3/4 cup chopped celery
- 1 cup half and half
- 1 1/2 cups grated sharp cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped pimiento
- 1 cup pitted ripe olives
- 2 flat cans flaked tuna
- 1 (7 oz.) pkg. thin spaghetti

Melt butter in heavy skillet, add onion, green pepper and celery, cook until tender. Add cream, one cup of the cheese, pimiento and olives. Heat slowly until cheese melts.

Add tuna and mix well. Pour over cooked spaghetti and mix lightly. Salt and pepper to taste. Pour mixture into large buttered casserole. Top with remaining cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until piping hot through and through.

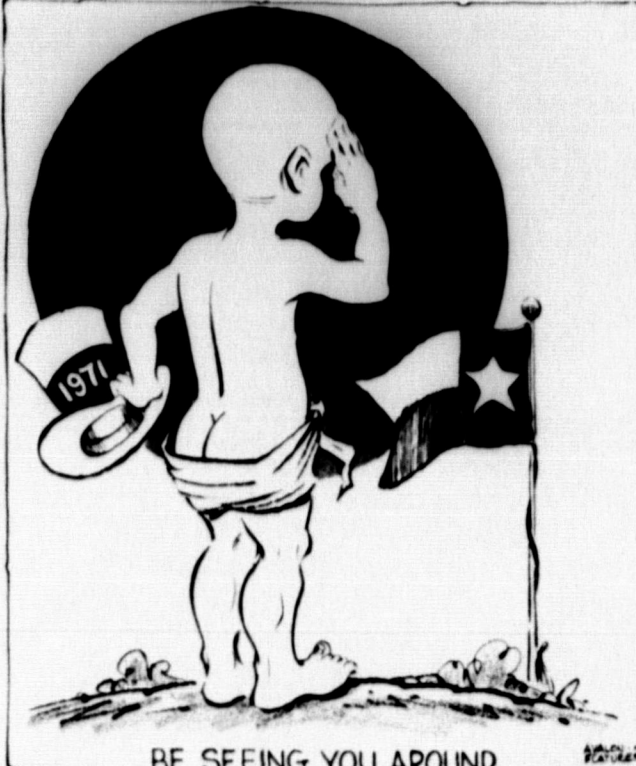
as no surprise to members of law enforcement. The lack of respect for the law and the contempt for and abuse of persons in positions of authority have kept pace with the climbing crime rate. Thus, the role of the policeman becomes increasingly dangerous. The rate of assaults on police in 1969 rose 7 percent over the 1968 figure. And since 1962, assaults on police officers have increased 144 percent.

The law enforcement officer today bears a heavier burden, faces more frustrations, and is second-guessed more than ever before. The public asks more and expects more of the present day policeman because the public need for protection is greater. When a policeman is assaulted or slain, the criminal significance of the incident extends far beyond the victim officer. It extends to the door of every law-abiding citizen.

The price of enforcing the law is costly. Perhaps no one knows just how costly, except the slain policeman's family and his fellow officers who stand at rigid attention by his graveside and hear the echoing volleys of the farewell salute and the fading strains of taps.

Only an aroused citizenry and swift and certain punishment by the courts can reduce felonious acts against police. When a law enforcement officer dies at the hands of a killer, part of our system of laws dies with him.

Auto License Renewal Forms Out in January

Austin--If you own one or more of the more than seven million motor vehicles in Texas, there is some important mail coming your way early in January.

It is your registration renewal application. This is the second year of operation for the new, easy computerized registration procedure devised by the Texas Highway Department.

Last year, the system greatly reduced bothersome waits and long lines which plagued vehicle owners at county tax offices and substations in years past. Prospects are that the system will work even better this year. Also, it is not necessary to present last year's registration

receipt of the certificate of title. The renewal application you will receive in the mail is all you will need. Registration begins February 1 and continues through April 1.

The renewal application will arrive in the mail in a slender envelope marked, "Important--This is Your License Plate renewal application."

The application is a three-part form with instructions printed on it. One important thing to remember is THE CARD SHOULD NOT BE TORN APART.

After the registration period begins February 1, each vehicle owner can take the renewal application and the fee to his county tax office, or he can order his plates by mail. If the owner wishes to register his vehicle by mail, he should send the entire three-part renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1 to the local county tax office as ear-

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club
By Mrs. Bailey Post

January is the month to plan your garden on paper for best results as the months progress.

If you have not yet sent away for the new seed and nursery catalogues, do so without delay. Seedmen give more detailed attention to early-placed orders, so send them in soon. Keep chiefly to varieties of known performance, kinds that have done well for you before, or that are known to thrive in our locality, but for added zest and fun in your gardening, try a few varieties the seedmen term "novelties."

If ordering trees, shrubs, evergreens, fruit trees, roses, perennials or other plants rather than seeds, early ordering is also essential. It is important to set out plants at the right time for various kinds. Planting too late is a frequent cause of failure to live. Buy only from reliable dealers and expect to pay fair prices. Beware of plant bargains.

During this dry period, you should soak the soil around all trees and shrubs in your yard on a mild day when the soil is not frozen. If there is sufficient warning before a freeze, water the garden well. Remember, evergreens particularly, are sensitive to lack of moisture during the winter months.

Dormant spraying of fruit trees as well as ornamental trees and shrubs that are infested with scale insects, or other pests that may be controlled by this kind of spraying, should be done before new growth begins, and at a time when the temperature at night is not expected to go lower than 35 degrees. Let some of the spray cover the ground to kill any fungus spores that may have fallen there.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

A Legislative log jam threw the U. S. Senate into virtual pandemonium last week, entangled in a web of its own creation. The result: the House approved trade bill was sidetracked for the session, and along with it the Administration's giant welfare expansion plan, which had also been approved in the House, was left undecided.

A new food stamp bill was tentatively agreed upon but lacks final action by both the House and Senate.

For the first time, to receive these stamps able-bodied recipients would be required to accept available employment, including strikers.

An amendment to prohibit those on strike from receiving food stamps (unless they were receiving them prior to the strike) was voted down in the House. It had my support, I don't think it fair or proper for the government to take sides in such disputes and there-

by interfere with the normal processes of collective bargaining.

The food stamp welfare program began in 1964, at an initial cost of \$75 million, designed to supplement diets for the poor and help prevent malnutrition. The next year it was \$100 million, and the third year it was upped to \$200 million.

Gaining momentum, the annual cost was increased to \$225 million, then to \$315 million, then to \$340 million, and for fiscal year 1970 it shot upward to \$610 million.

This year the Senate approved \$7 billion for food stamps, and the final compromise was \$1.75 billion for the current fiscal year.

Many loopholes and abuses in the application of the law have been reported. \$14-million in stamps went to General Motors strikers, and 15,000 teamster strikers in Chicago got the stamps from May to July, this year.

Believing the bill lacked needed safeguards against abuses, and that the cost is excessive, I was constrained to vote against its enactment.

NEWS for OUTDOORSMEN
by VERN SANFORD

Although Texas has about the finest outdoors playground to be found anywhere, there are times when a fellow wants to see what's on the other side of the mountain. Anyway, that's the way we felt last summer when L. A. Wilke, another outdoors writer, and I teamed up for a flying trip to the Jackson Hole country.

It indeed was a flying trip. We boarded a Frontier jet Monday noon in Dallas and by 6 p.m. deplaned at Jackson, Wyo. after having spent a couple hours visiting a fishing tackle plant in Denver. It would have required three days driving to get where we flew in only a matter of a few hours.

At Jackson, we were met by two great guides, Jim Marcel and Deke Hedrick of High Country Outfitters and made ready for a float trip on that famous Green River. We put in near Pinedale. Entire journey ordinarily requires three days, but we took only one day of a trip

which customarily covers 120 miles. Water was beautiful and loaded with fish, especially fighting rainbows and hefty German trout.

We went down the fast moving river in inflatable rafts operated by these two excellent boatmen. Mind you, this is not a white-water trip. We found no rapids, but the velocity of the stream was such that we were constantly moving unless we beached at a turn to take pictures or just admire the scenery.

After a day of that, we boarded Frontier again and flew into Billings, Mont. This flight took a little more than an hour. Here we got one of those second-best rental cars and drove down to Lovell, Wyo., a distance of about 90 miles.

Next day, accompanied by a group of Lovell businessmen and park and game officials, we went to Bighorn Reservoir. This is a new impoundment on the Bighorn River, created by the Yellow-

tail Dam, located downstream in Montana. This river, flowing north, is one of the most unusual streams in America. We went for 46 miles between high canyon walls. Sometimes as we looked up we estimated the height as 2,000 feet.

Scenery was fantastic. High walls of weathered sandstone, towering upward on both sides, were estimated to be millions of years old.

This is still Indian country and much of the land on both sides of the river is reservation, with no trespassing permitted. However, there were no places to get off. When you get on this reservoir and pass the half-way mark, you must continue.

For that 46 miles there was no gas pump. Our boat was equipped with three six-gallon tanks and we used most of the gas on the way down. We fished very little that first day, just sightseeing.

Although there is a recreational tract of nearly 70,000 acres set aside in the area, it is not developed as yet and everything is still very primitive. This summer there will be some additional facilities, however, perhaps including rental boats. Also the Indians are installing a marina near the dam and it should be ready before summer ends.

Next day we went fishing. Bighorn Reservoir has been stocked with several species of trout, walleye and perch. Although our fishing wasn't spectacular, our party did come up with a good string by any standards, including a four-pound walleye.

Information on this impoundment is available from the Chamber of Commerce at either Lovell, Wyo., or Hardin, Mont.

After driving back to Billings we took the Frontier jet to Bozeman, Mont. got a rental car and motored overland 30 miles to Livingston and Yellowstone River. There we were guests of Paul McAdams, who spends his winters in Texas and his summers on the banks of the Yellowstone River. He raises trout for catchout ponds on western guest ranches and we got a sample of some of the finest rainbow fishing any person could ever want.

Although this is perhaps the favorite fly-fishing spot in the United States, we used spinning and spin casting tackle with best results. Small spinner lures were most tempting to the rainbows and brown trout.

After a day at McAdams' Jumping Rainbow Ranch we returned to Bozeman for the night, boarded the jet for home next morning and were back in Austin by mid-afternoon.

Now that's what I call a flying fishing trip.
