Funeral Service At 2 Today For Vic Montgomery

Funeral services for George Victor Montgomery, 58, will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Ozona United Methodist Church with Rev. John Berkley, pastor, officiating. Burial will follow in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

Mr. Montgomery died Tuesday evening at 8:15 in Crockett County Hospital after a lengthy illness.

He was born in Comanche June 12, 1914, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Montgomery. He moved to Crockett County with his family in 1926. He attended Ozona schools and was a member of the 1932 graduating class. He excelled in athletics and attended Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, where he was a member of the TCU Horned Frogs. He was a halfback and kicker on the TCU team that went to the Sugar Bowl in 1935 and won the Southwest Conference in 1936 earning the best team spot in the Cotton Bowl. One of his teammates, Sammy Baugh, went on to become successful in professional football.

The bodies were taken to Janes Funeral Home and transferred Monday. Services for Miss Bruce and Mr. Mandil were pending in El Paso, while services for Snow were pending in Alpine.

Reported in good condition at Crockett County Hospital at mid-week was Mrs. Almeda Hoover, 70, of Ozona, the driver of a car involved in the accident.

Gerald Ayles Georges of El Paso, the driver of the third car was not injured.

Huff Unanimous Choice For All District Team

The District 7-AA All-District Football Team was chosen by coaches at a meeting last week, and the Ozona Lions netted five places on first team offense and defense, nine places on the second teams and four honorable mentions.

Gerald Huff, Ozona Lion halfback was a unanimous choice for first team offensive back and also made first team defensive back.

Melecio Martinez was the only other Lion named to the first team offense. He was named to guard position.

Named to first team defense were George Gries, senior lineman; Oliver Payne, junior lineman, and Huff, defensive back.

The three Lions named to the second team defense were David Weant, line; David Sewell and Ricky Webster, defensive secondary.

Sewell and Webster also made the second team offense at quarterback and end. Ruben Tambunga was named to defensive back on the second team, along with Randy Crawford at end, George Gries at tackle, and Lessly Russell at center.

Lions given honorable mention were Gary Whitley and Ruben Tambunga on defense and Freddy Vela and David Weant on offense.

The accident occurred as Snow was attempting to pass the Georges auto, a 1968 Dodge station wagon, both traveling east. Mrs. Hoover was traveling west in a 1966 Oldsmobile. Snow attempted to avoid collision with the Hoover car and went into a broadside skid. The Hoover auto crashed into the side of the Snow car, knocking it into the path of the station wagon driven by Georges, and it also hit it broadside.

The deaths brought to five the number of traffic fatalities in the county within a week's time. Navy corpsman Wm. J. Stewart and his wife, Sharon, were killed instantly Tuesday of last week when their compact car collided headon with a pickup about a mile and a half east of Ozona.

The only other potentially serious accident in the county during the holiday week and weekend occurred at mid-afternoon Thanksgiving Day. John L. Henderson, Earl Hacker and Wayne Patterson, all of Ozona were traveling east on Hwy. 290 in the Henderson pickup and attempting to turn into Crockett Heights when they were struck by a car, also traveling east, and driven by a Mr. Mendoza of El Paso. The collision turned the pickup over on its side, but all three passengers escaped injury. Mrs. Mendoza, a passenger in the car suffered facial cuts and was hospitalized overnight in Crockett County hospital. The Mendoza car was passing in a line of traffic when the collision occurred, according to witnesses.

Crockett Field Gains Extender Plans Underway For Annual BB Tournament

The 7,890 Pennsylvania gas production in the Davidson Ranch multipay field of Crockett County was extended one mile south with completion of Delta-Suburban, Oleresa, No. 1-15 Davidson, seven miles southeast of Ozona and 1/2 mile east and southeast of Canyon production in the De-Paul multipay field, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 780,000 cubic feet of gas per day.

Production was through perforations from 7,875 feet to 8,184 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons and fractured with 45,000 gallons.

Drilled to 8,147 feet, operator set 5 1/2-inch casing at that depth and plugged back to 8,122 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 1,880 feet from the east lines of 15-KL-GC-8-SF.

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HERE COME THE GLOBS

WHAT ARE GLOBS?

They are the "Get the Lead Out Boys" who, having hatched an imaginary "health hazard" of lead in the air from auto exhaust, suddenly find out that there is no substantial evidence to indicate that airborne lead ever harmed anybody.

They were only temporary without a cause, however. Their plans were suddenly revived with the announcement of a metal catalyst which would take care of the pollution problem — but only would operate on gasoline containing no lead.

Now, this new catalyst has not been fully tested; it is not generally accepted by the automotive industry as a wise solution; and it cannot possibly be installed on a majority of cars on American roads for many years to come. But that did not deter the GLOBS. They were off and running again.

Careful examination of the available data indicates that the new catalyst is needed for only the first 30 seconds of your auto engine operation. After that the catalyst serves no purpose as other devices and systems take over the job. In other words, if you drive your car for two hours a day and start your engine ten times, you only need the costly unleaded gasoline and the high-priced catalyst for five minutes out of the whole day and even then the reduction of atmospheric lead will have been negligible.

But GLOBS, you see, are undeterred by the facts.

So to accommodate their contrived environmental whims, you will be forced to pay more for your car (\$400-\$500) more for your gasoline (3c-4c per gallon), get an inferior performance from your engine — and who knows, you may be one of the unlucky ones who will lose his job when many small refineries are forced to close.

Additional GLOB-created problems arise in the expense of transporting and storing lead-free gasoline because of the trace lead which will remain in pipes, pumps and tanks. If you own a gas station you would have to completely clean your tanks and maybe even get new ones to comply with the no-lead standards.

The ridiculous part of the entire performance is that all this activity and expense will accomplish absolutely nothing. And who do you suppose will get stuck with the bill? — why you, of course, the Consumer.

Yes, the GLOBS are a strange crew. First they create a problem where none existed. Then they marshal all the forces of bureaucracy and liberal media to solve the newly created "problem." Facts don't faze them; statistics are of no interest, logic is abandoned, costs skyrocket; controls are imposed; emotionalism is substituted for reality and confusion is rampant.

Demagogues, of course, have a field day while the actual air pollution problem will not be affected one way or another.

We ought to save everybody a lot of time, money and inconvenience and wipe the GLOBS off our government.

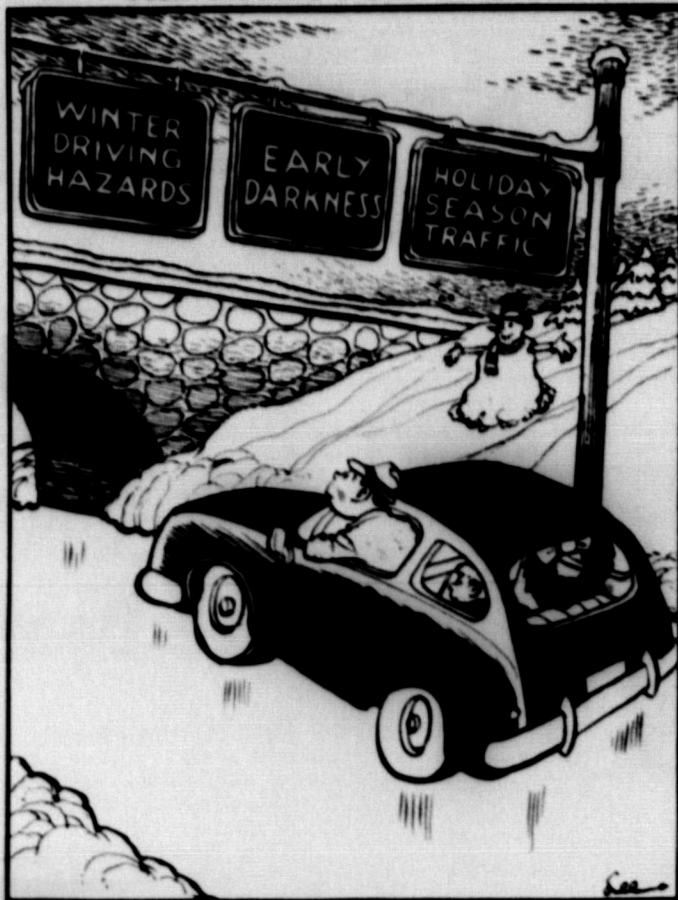

Employing Everyone Is Called Impossible

Putting to work all persons now unemployed is impossible, according to Dr. Geoffrey Moore, Commissioner of the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Testifying before the Joint Economic Committee of Congress, he pointed out that, of the 4.8 million persons listed as unemployed during September, a major portion were out of work of their own volition. While 1.7 million of the September unemployed had actually lost their jobs, another 800,000 had simply quit.

In addition, Dr. Moore said, this nation's economy always has large groups of people who are listed as unemployed while they are:

- Seeking some new type of work because of change-of-feeling about their former job or because of some newly chosen goal or objective in life;
- Quitting to find a better job, most often in their own field of work, but under improved or different conditions than those under which they had been employed;
- Entering the work force for the first time, primarily teenagers and those getting out of college;
- Entering the work force for the first time in their life for any number of other reasons.

If a slob hunter has children, he does his best to pass his sloppy traits on to the next generation. He gives the kids .22s or BB guns in hunting

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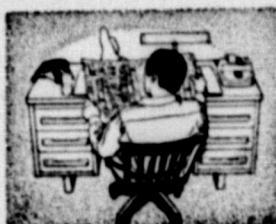
camp and urges them to go out bird hunting. It doesn't seem to matter that all birds except the English sparrows, European starlings and pigeons are either game birds or protected by law.

Hiway Beautification Act To Effect Many Sign Owners In Texas

Austin -- Owners of advertising signs along Interstate, US and major State-numbered highways have until December 31 to apply for permits required under the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The act controls all outdoor advertising signs from the largest signboard to the smallest sign hanging from a fence along the right of way line.

The Texas Highway Commission established the deadline under the legislation which became effective on June 29. The act requires that no person may erect or maintain a sign within 660 feet of an Interstate or federal-aid primary highway in Texas without a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

In addition to the license, the sign owner must have a permit for each sign he has now or which he plans to erect.

On-premise signs -- those advertising activities conducted on the premises and those offering the property for sale are exempt.

The act will be implemented in stages. The first stage requires the owner of the sign to obtain a State license and post a bond. The license fee is \$25 and the license is valid for an indefinite period.

The license application must be accompanied by a bond in the amount of \$2,500 for each county in which signs are located, or a maximum bond of \$10,000 for owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond form applications may be obtained by writing the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas 78763.

After obtaining a license, the owner is required to obtain a separate permit for each existing and new off-premise sign on the affected highways. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the Right of Way Sections of the Highway Department district offices.

For each sign permit required, the owner should submit an application accompanied by a check or money order for \$5 to the Highway Department district office for the county in which the sign is located. If the permit application is for an existing sign, the Highway Department will check to see if the sign conforms with the Beautification Act.

Permits now will be issued for signs in place prior to June 29 even if they do not conform to the law. They will be permitted to stay in place until programmed for acquisition or removal.

Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law.

Anyone planning to put up a new sign on the controlled highways should check with the Highway Department district office in his area before doing anything, to determine if the proposed sign location conforms to the law.

The Highway Department also has begun removal of

abandoned and illegal signs on controlled highways. An abandoned sign is one in which the owner no longer claims any interest. An illegal sign is one which is located on private property without permission of the property owner. Property owners on the affected highways with such illegal signs should contact the Highway Department district office.

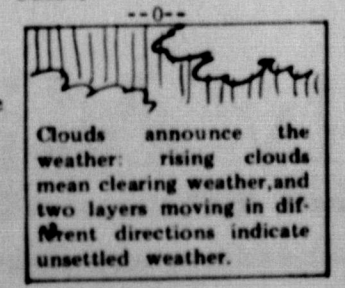
Young Men Still Required To Register At 18

Austin -- Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has again reminded young men of their obligation to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday.

Glantz stressed that the requirement to register will continue in full effect whether the all-voluntary military force becomes a reality or not. Every native born and resident-alien young man is required to present himself for registration from 30 days before to 30 days after his 18th birthday. If for any reason, a young man has failed to register he should do so immediately to escape the penalty of Federal law.

Failure to register may result in a fine, imprisonment, or both, under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act.

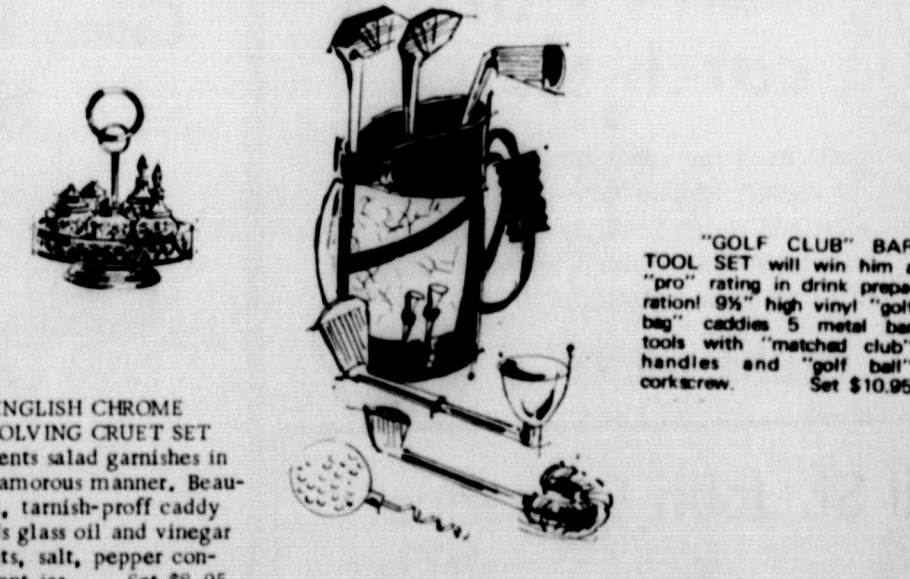
Young men may register at the office of the local board near their home or place of residence, or may be registered by volunteer registrars who are located in most high schools or other similarly convenient locations. 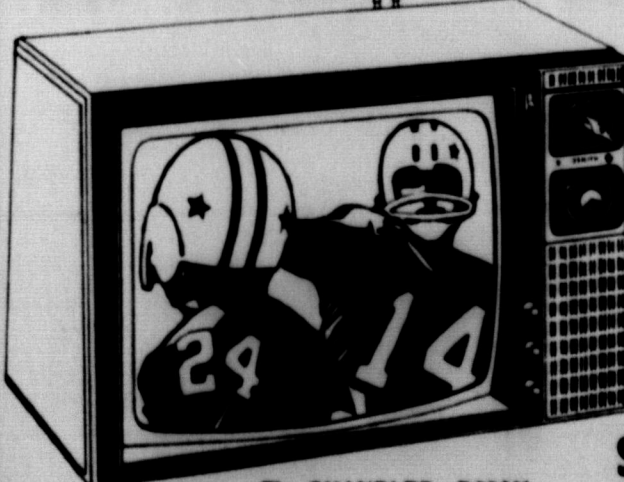

INNOCENT LOOKING TOYS CAN BE DANGEROUS

Even the most innocent looking toys are potentially dangerous in the hands of the wrong child.

That's the basic message from Food and Drug Administration toy safety experts who are trying to reduce the number of toy injuries in the United States, a figure put at 700,000 annually by the government.



Some stuffed animals can be easily taken apart by a child-exposing dangerous wiring underneath. Check for unprotected wiring around the ears, arms and legs before purchasing such a toy.

Happily, thanks to the FDA, consumer groups and concerned manufacturers, toys are, in fact, safer than ever—but there are ways to keep the accident rate down.

The most important factor is parental supervision. Whether children are playing indoors or out, alone or with others, they must be watched.

Choice of toys is a key to safety too. Select toys suitable for a child's age, interest and abilities. Keep in mind younger brothers or sisters who may have access to toys bought for older children. And, check labels on fabrics. Choose items with non-flammable, flame resistant or retardant fabrics and stuffings marked washable and hygienic.

Repairman vs. Homeowner

Homeowners with grievances against repairmen are no novelty. But repairmen too have their grievances. If a plumber or a roofer or an electrician suffers an injury while working on your premises, you may well be held responsible in court.

In the lexicon of the law, a repairman is classified as a "business visitor." This means you owe a high degree of care for his safety. If he trips on a broken step or slips on a greasy floor, the fault—and the cost—is usually yours.

Take this case:



An absent-minded homeowner, backing his car out of the garage, knocked the ladder out from under a painter working on his shingles. When the painter filed suit for damages, the court ordered the homeowner to pay up. This was no way, said the court, to treat a business visitor.

It is also true, of course, that the repairman himself has duties with regard to his safety. In particular, he should be alert to the kind of dangers that are common in his line of work.

A plasterer hired to patch a kitchen ceiling, had just gotten started when a chunk of plaster came crashing down on his head. He too tried to collect from the homeowner. But the court said this was the kind of danger a plasterer is supposed to foresee and avoid.

A similar ruling denied damages to a tree surgeon, injured when a dead limb collapsed beneath his weight.

A repairman may also be held to have "assumed the risk" of an

accident if he uses your premises in an unauthorized manner. For example:

A painter, refinishing a house, hung his scaffolding from a gutter—without checking with the owner. While he was at work, the gutter suddenly pulled away from the wall, causing him to plunge to the ground.

But when the painter filed suit for damages, the court decided he had no claim. The judge said that by choosing such an unorthodox means of suspension, he had also chosen the risks that went with it.

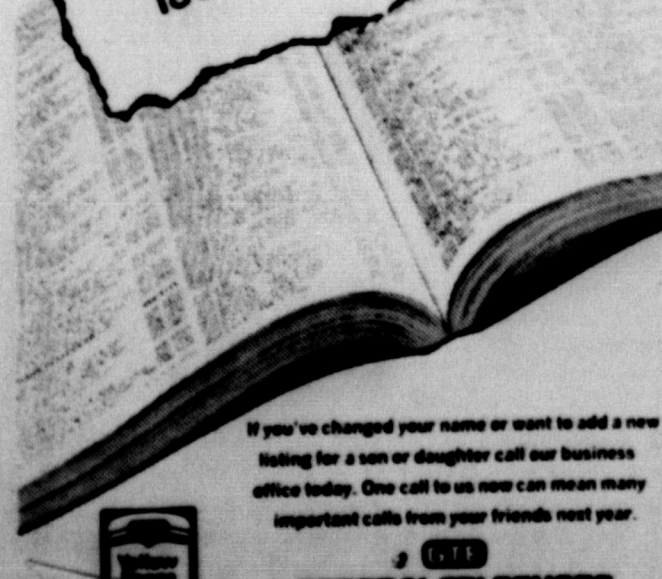

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

Again an early freeze nipped the top tender leaves on some of the trees, especially the few tall trees in town, so we will have to wait another year for a more colorful show.

The Boston ivy on buildings, homes and trees, the Spanish oaks, Sumac and red plum have shown the most vivid reds. Seems the pecans have been slow turning to their usually beautiful yellow.

Hardwood cuttings of many deciduous shrubs and trees may be placed in sand now, in a cold frame or directly outdoors to root.

Send away orders for trees, shrubs, fruit trees and roses that are to be planted next month. Before planting be sure you have well-prepared soil and well-drained. Dig the hole at least 12 inches wider and 6 inches deeper than the root ball of the plant being set out. Water the plant well, remove from the container and place in the hole. Position the plant for the best effect by viewing and turning it. Fill in around the plant with a good soil mix containing at least one-third compost, peat moss or other organic material. When the hole is half filled, firm the

soil and add a liberal amount of water slowly. They continue to fill the hole to the normal ground level. Water slowly again. Be sure the soil is well firmed to eliminate any possible air pockets around the roots. Any deciduous plants or trees may be moved now.

Continue to set out pansies, calendulas and ornamental kale this month for winter color.

Pinch out the tips of snapdragons, stock and other recently planted annuals that are growing tall and leggy.

After chrysanthemums have finished blooming, remove all dead flowers, and cut plants back to about 6 inches from base.

Watch your evergreens and water well before a hard freeze is forecast, if no rainfall for several weeks.

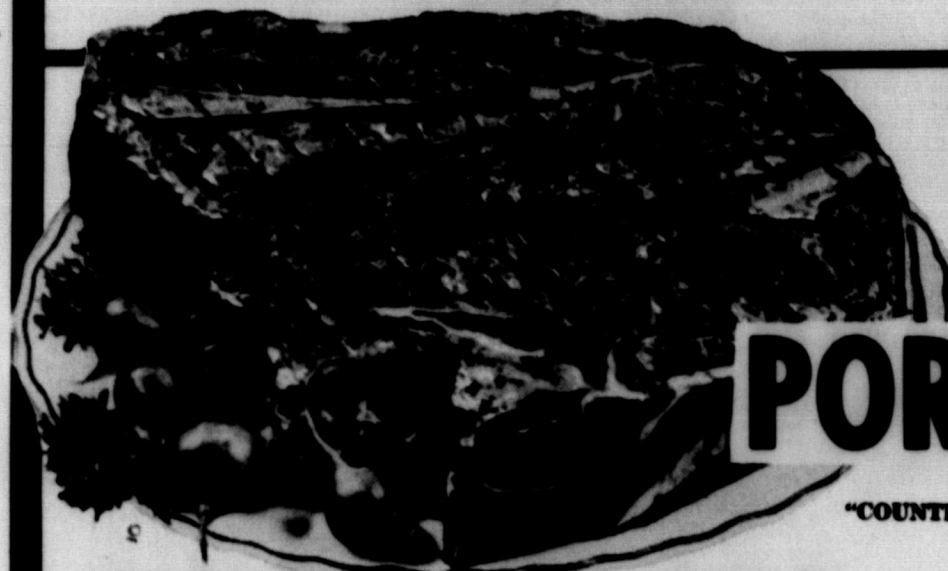

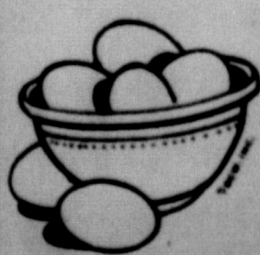
