Crockett Still Under Quarantine

One hundred and thirty-six counties in Texas will on April 1 or April 15 be released from both federal and state quarantines against the sheep scab, according to instructions that have just been received in San Angelo by Dr. I. B. Paxton, chief of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture. They came from D. H. Cunningham of Fort Worth, chairman of the state livestock sanitary commission, and upon the recommendation of the federal bureau.

Dr. Paxton said Friday afternoon that this leaves only eleven counties in Texas under quarantine against the scabies, these being Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Kimble, Menard, Pecos, Torn Green, Schleicher, Terrell, Sutton and Val Verde.

Ozona, Texas, Feb. 27, 1918. Dear Mary Ellen:

I am writing to you on the first opportunity that I have had, with any promise of being able to give you the information you ask at any length and detail.

I was glad to know that you and the family have definitely determined to return to Ozona. I knew that you would, in time, but feared you would not make good your resolution for some time yet. Nearly all those who have left for a number of years have returned, are returning, or are getting ready to return.

To say that you "would not know Ozona," would not be quite true. The same old hills and the same old "draws," and, better than all, the same old "best people on earth," would serve to identify the town as soon as you arrived. The people are simply wonderful. I cannot help thinking that an all-wise Creator must have had some as yet mysterious purpose in view when He assembled in one spot such a people as this.

Everyone, and especially the "stranger within our gates," agrees with me in this opinion, an opinion that is frequently and emphatically expressed. Ozona has become known far and wide for its many attractions, not the least of which is the superior quality of its citizenship.

I would not, however, advise you to come here until you have made some arrangement for a place to live. It is almost impossible to secure either a business or residence house in the town, although both are being built in numbers right along.

Four more Crockett county boys left for the wars last Saturday, in response to the last call. They were Melvin Jolly, George Russell, Houston Smith and Jose Landin.

They left Ozona just before noon, reached San Angelo at six p. m., and left over the Santa Fe at two o'clock Sunday morning. Before leaving home the boys were given an elegant "spread" at the Brown Hotel. All kinds of good things were served up by Mr. and Mrs. Brown in the way they so well understand. Mrs. Mauldin furnished pretty place cards with appropriate motto texts, both humorous and patriotic.

There was but little time, but short talks were made by a number of those present, including Judge Davidson, Rev. Hardon, L. B. Cox and J. R. Brooks.

A fair guard of honor motored to Barnhart with the boys in the T. A. Kircald car. These were Mrs. Mauldin, and Misses Fussell, Stricklen, Davidson, Russell, and Kinsaid.

The statement is given out from Washington under date of February 24th that the next movement of selective service men to training camps will be on March 4th, when 10,077 white men will be called. About seventy thousand men remain to be called under the first draft.

Camp Travis, Texas, Feb. 17.
 Dear Kuzn Bill:
 When a soldier wants an excuse for doing a thing or for not doing any thing he says, "I'm in the Army now," so I hope you will not be angry with me for not writing to you. I will take a chance on it anyway because I haven't a great deal to write about. You know Uncle Sam is a little bit particular about what his boys write back home.
 I came down here on the 8th of October last year, and have been more or less busy ever since. It isn't a great deal that I have learned but I have gotten a little benefit out of seeing some of the other boys get so much wisdom and becoming such able soldiers. Army life has not given me disappointment worthy of mention. I have had no occasion to grumble about food and lodging. In fact I believe that soldiers have never been treated better than we are being treated. If we show our appreciation properly we will make the Government the best army that has ever trod the earth. Some broad statement isn't it? But, in the face of what is being done for us, it is justifiable.
 Not many days ago I heard Ex-President Taft make an address to the soldiers of the Camp and he convinced me that he is one of the Nation's very able men. You know I would not be

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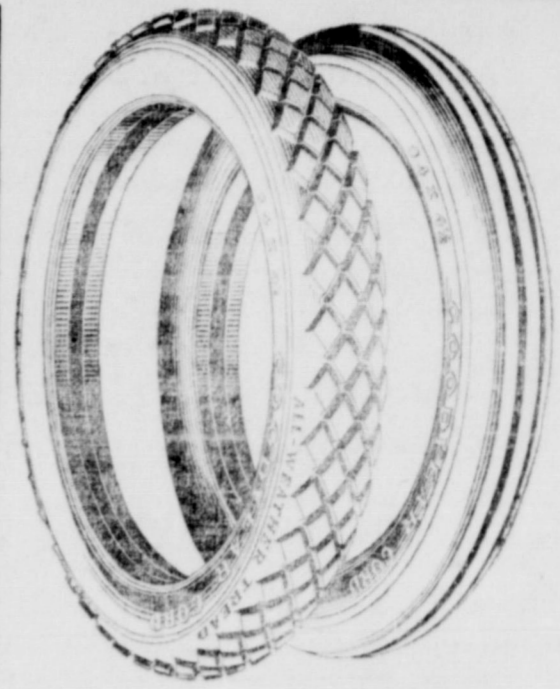

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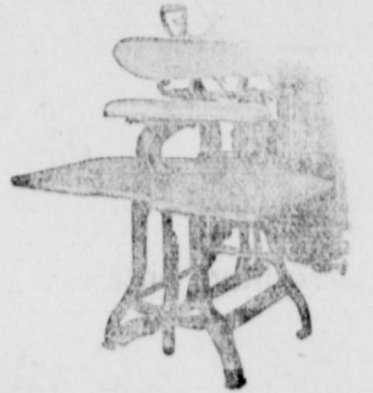
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
