

Of this total amount the United Kingdom got 145,348,000 bushels of wheat and 8,512,000 barrels of wheat Hour; France got 79,798,000 bushels of wheat and 5,462,000 barrels of wheat flour; Italy 87,136,000 bushels of wheat and 1,895,000 barrels of wheat flour. Russia received only 130,000 bushels of wheat and 25,000 barrels of wheat flour.

Do these sons grudge risk their beautiful youth, their lives, their country? Yet some people he tate at white bread and bacon, and refuse to buy Liberty bonds!

The last-named hesitation is not orly unpatriotic, but it is absurd. Later we will know the meaning of the expression, "What I give I have." The money we invest in Liberty bonds will Adv. be ours when other money that we

now have is gone. All such talk as I have quoted is wickedly unpatriotic. Let us give as our sons give-ungrudgingly, proudly, because we are counted worthy to make sacrifices for the greatest crusade against evil that the world has ever known

Make It An Honorable Service. What would the Son of Righteousness say to our hesitation about trifling luxuries? He died for his cause. We women are not called upon to do that. (Some of us may wish that we were.) But we are called to sacrifice our selfishness for it.





BURIAL OF AMERICAN VICTIMS OF THE TUSCANIA SINKING





IMPOSSIBLE TO **HOODWINK SPIES**

Every Army Secret Is Quickly Learned by the Army Intelligence Service.

SURPRISES ARE FEW

American Troops Taught Lesson When German Airmen Felicitated Division on Move Which Had Been Kept Secret.

Paris .- The intelligence or spy service of the rival armies now facing each other in France has developed into a wonderful mechanism. Underground, on the ground and above the ground the system of surveillance, listening, patrolling, spying and reconnoitering is in incessant operation night and day. Spies have performed astonishing feats. It may almost be said that no important movement on either side is unknown to the enemy. The size and composition of opposing troops are thoroughly known, as well as the names of officers, their degree of skill, the hold they may have upon their men and the manner in which they cooperate with other commands.

Surprised by Airmen.

A high officer attached to one of the American divisions now in training in France tells of the surprise to which he was treated by enemy airmen. The division had been established several weeks in camp not far from the battle line. Every evening, precisely at 8:30, the division was inspected by parties of German airmen, who flew in regular formation at a fixed height. The regularity of this aerial inspection became a byword among the Americans. They set their watches by the airplanes of the enemy.

On a certain day the word was cautiously sent out to commanding officers that the entire division would move on the following day five miles to the eastward by a little south. The country was muddy, and an early start was to be made. That evening the airplanes did not appear at 8:30, and the Americans began cracking jokes among themselves, finding fault with their

At 10:30, however, the Germans appeared, flying low and dropping a number of suspicious looking bags of small size, which were made distinctly vistble by the searchlights. The soldiers were ordered not to touch these bags, as it was feared they might be a new form of trick bomb, Early the next morning one of the bags was opened. It contained a printed circular in English reading somewhat as follows:

Causes Overhauling.

"Greetings to the officers and men of the-American division. May you

have a pleasant time going through the mud tomorrow morning to your new camp, five miles east by south."

Needless to say the entire system of communicating intelligence in the division was overhauled, and every man connected therewith was constructively held up and dissected as a possible spy, without revealing in the slightest degree any information showing how the Germans may have obtained knowledge of the order. French officers told the Americans

that this incident had been repeated many times in its essential features, all along the front.



That seems rather a limited sum of money with which to provide anybody with warm sanitary living quarters, having baths, hot and cold water, steam heat, electric light, modern kitchen facilities, and all the comforts of home. Yet this man is going the job and carry out his construction in record time.

It is interesting to figure with him a little-if you just remember that present figures must be rough esti-

mates to a certain extent. First of all, he can eliminate a large proportion of this shipbuilding army because many of the new shipyards are handy to cities with ample housing and all conveniences, and Uncle Sam will solve the housing problem in those places by improving the transportation service between a man's work and his home. But other shipyards have been created in undeveloped spots along our wide stretches of seacoast, and in these places it becomes necessary to provide workers with modern living

Community Dwellings.

Thousands of these shipbuilders will be single men, and for them a special type of community dwelling has been designed on the order of a club house. Each community dwelling will accommodate 125 men. Each man will have a room to himself and it will be an outside room. Each clubhouse, moreover, will be divided into five groups or separate clubs of from 25 to 80 Each of these separate clubs will have shower baths and a large community lounge, making it possible for a worker to find a congenial community subdivision to organize its social affairs, and studies. Moreover, great pains have been taken to avoid any appearances of standardization or monotony in exterior design Only the materials and inside appointments have been reduced to standards while exterior lines and or nament may be modified according to ocal conditions to secure individuality and beauty. That is not all.

The plans have been drawn for these individual family cottages with the idea of permanence. In so far as possible, they will be erected at shipyard sites which are fat'ly certain to be permanent. Single men are free to move to temporary employment for the war and disperse if shipyards are abandoned when peace comes. Married men with families cannot do this, of course, so they will be assigned to the permanent yards as fast as possible with the expectation that they may live there for years.

The plans take into account act only the provision of homes for them when they are shifted into shipbuilding to meet the war emergency, but the purchase of their own homes on installment payments equivalent to rent if they feel that the new locality is a suitable one in which to work and live, and bring up a family.

Present estimates indicate that the family houses can be erected for considerably less than \$3,000 each. This does not include the cost of land, not has that been figured in the building
