Marshall, small son of Mr. and Mrs. Greene Cooke, was seriously burned a few days ago by stepping in fire, and is now under treatment for the burns.

If every man in Crockett county would vote his conviction at the polls next Saturday, as he should, there would be no need for a run off primary so far as this county is concerned. The same would hold good for the State as a whole. But other things enter into the question besides a man's convictions. Fearing that if he votes his convictions he will be backing a losing candidate, causes many men to vote for a candidate that he really doesn't favor for the office. In Crockett county a peculiar situation exists, which will have some bearing on the race in this particular county.

It has been the desire of Crockett county citizens to have a highway designated through Ozona to Barnhart in order to have the maintenance of the road under supervision of the State Highway Department. This road would preferably be from Del Rio direct to San Angelo by way of Ozona. Should such a road be designated as a State Highway and the maintenance of it taken over by the Highway Department, Ozona then would have a complete system of State roads through the country, all maintained in tip-top shape by the State; in fact, the road from Ozona to Barnhart should be designated. It has been figured out by the citizens of this country that regardless of the election wager made between Mrs. Ferguson and Dan Moody that the present governor will be in the office until January, which will give Crockett county six additional months in which to secure the designation of the road through Ozona to Barnhart as a State Highway, and it is thought, that if Ferguson is given a good vote in the country, it will materially aid the cause. As a result, there will be many more Ferguson votes in Crockett county than many of our citizens have thought possible, some of the most influential citizens of the county having made a decision to vote for Ferguson because of the highway situation and not because of any other reason.

Personally speaking, we have a great desire to have the road from here to our shipping point designated as a State road, in order that the road may be maintained properly and kept in an all-weather travel condition. We need it, and the road will do us more good than any candidate for Governor will. We want the road, and we believe that Ozona and Crockett county citizens would be justified in taking any and every legitimate means to have the road designated. If it will help the cause any to vote strong for the Fergusons in this county we believe that no harm would have been done, and possibly a great deal of good. If you can figure out a way to help us in the matter of getting this particular road designated as a State highway under State supervision we believe that you should take advantage of that means to help it along. If you can see where a Ferguson vote would help us to get the road, you should cast your vote for Ferguson, not because you approve of the Fergusons but because you have Crockett county interests at heart.

This line of talk is a little different from what we have handed our readers, but the situation is such that we believe we are justified in making the departure.

However, regardless of the race, we still believe that Lynch is the only man in the race, judging from qualifications, and would like to see him win.

We have nothing against Dan and figure him in the primary in August with Mrs. Ferguson. We have nothing against Mrs. Ferguson, and should we have occasion to do so, would support her if convictions were that way.

We figure her in the runoff with Dan Moody. Of the two, in the run off we figure Dan to win but by small majority. The Republican candidate Haynes, will not have a chance.

More Building Now

Ground was broken this week for the new home of Joe Davidson on the hill north of the school house next to Bill Grimms residence. It has been reported also, that Morris Dudley will soon begin the erection of a new home on the lot just across the street from the Baptist parsonage in the north end of town work is progressing rapidly on other buildings under construction in Ozona.

The T. A. Kincaid residence is nearing completion and interior work on the building is now being done under directing of W. R. Wallace. This home is one of the several brick veneer buildings now being erected in town. The new home of the Kincaids is of light tan brick and presents a very pleasing effect.

The new home for Mr. and Mrs. John Mitchell is being rapidly built and will soon be completed. This building is a brick veneer house the brick facing being of dark tan.

Happy Wedlock Sure Thing If Bride Is Cook

Haphazard meals yearly ruin thousand marriages. Most marital ships would maintain an even keel if brides knew cooking.

Many of the first year's troubles between newlyweds would be avoided if the wife were capable of preparing foods with an experienced hand. Wives are to blame for the failure of many business men in the final analysis. The business man's health depends a great deal on what he eats. And it's up to his wife to see that he gets the right kind of food. A healthfully balanced diet goes a long way toward making the tired business man less fatigued.

The expert home manager sees to it that her husband never comes home to a delicatessen lunch. There is a carefully planned meal waiting for him. The real housewife knows that an unbalanced diet means trouble and avoids it. Likewise, she appreciates the fact that variation in her menus is important. In this connection the following recipes have been selected as an aid to the home manager:

Frozen Salad.
 1/2 cup mayonnaise 1/2 cup candied dressing cherries
 1/2 cup dried pineapple 1/2 cup dried apple
 1/2 cup pineapple 1/2 cup banana juice
 1/2 cup cream 1/2 cup evaporated milk

Mix the fruit and juices. Combine milk and cream, chill and whip, then fold in the fruit and mayonnaise. Pour into a mold and pack in equal parts of salt and ice. Serve on lettuce leaves. This serves eight.

Orange Bavarian.
 1 tbsp. gelatin 1/2 cup evaporated milk
 1/2 cup cold water 1/2 cup whipping cream
 1/2 cup orange juice 1/2 cup lemon juice
 1/2 cup salt 1/2 cup sugar

Soak gelatin in cold water, add fruit juices, sugar and salt. Heat in the top of a double boiler until gelatin dissolves. Strain and set in pan of cold water. When mixture begins to set, fold in the evaporated milk and cream which have been beaten stiff.

The Prodigal Son

A YOUNG man, heir of fortune, self-willed, and overindulged by a loving and gracious father, suddenly decides he wishes to paddle his own canoe. He requests that his fortune be given to him. The request is granted by his father, after which the young man goes out to see the world. He had a very crude idea of what being the world meant. Seeing the world to him seemed to consist in seeing life at its worst instead of at its best. To see the world to him meant to see the evil, the degenerate, the dissolute, the immoral. It perhaps never occurred to him that seeing the world could mean quite another thing, for the world had much to offer in its art, music, philanthropy, friendship and love. What the prodigal did with his time we do not know. Perhaps he alone knew just how he squandered it. We do know, however, that it was not profitably spent, for when he reached the end of his rope he finds

himself a hired man on a large estate and his daily task is to feed the swine. A most menial and distasteful task for one of the Jewish faith. While engaged in this work he begins to think. The vision of his home with its bounteous provisions came to him. He could endure the misery of his task no longer, so suddenly he makes up his mind to return home. He was urged to do this not by a motive wholly selfish, so evidenced in the resolves he made. A short time past he requested his father to give him his inheritance. How different was his second request. Now he asked that he might be taken back home, not as a son and heir, but as a servant. "Make me one of thy hired servants." In his degradation he suffered physically and mentally. Not only was he hungry; he was lonely. Somehow these two experiences seem to go together. He had no friends. "No man gave unto him." Livestock Quarantine

Be it remembered that on this 8th day of July, 1926, the Honorable Commissioners Court of Crockett County met at the Court House in Ozona in special session, all the members of said Court being present, whereupon the following order and judgment was duly passed by said Court and spread upon the minutes.

Ordered by the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, that whereas this county has two resident cattle and sheep inspectors duly commissioned by the State Livestock Sanitary Commission and have heretofore been instructed by this Court zealously to protect the livestock of Crockett county from infection by foreign livestock, and, whereas, it has come to the notice of this Court that stomach worm, a malignant disease, now exists among some of the domestic animals in certain counties in West Texas, and also that anthrax exists in a mild form among some domestic animals in West Texas, the said inspectors are ordered to inspect all sheep and cattle entering Crockett county, and to issue written permission to enter all found clean and free from scab, fever ticks, stomach worms and anthrax, but to refuse entrance of any animals, flocks, herds or droves of livestock found infected with one or more of such malignant diseases.

No further business appearing, the Court adjourned sine die.
