Nearly Finished

The beautiful building of Crockett county stone which the Methodists of Ozona are erecting at a cost of \$37,000 will be ready for occupancy within thirty days now. The stone masons finished their work this week after six months of continuous labor. J. A. Gowen of Fort Worth and Walter Kyle of Ozona have another splendid building showing their workmanship. This new home has been planned to house a standard Sunday school of the B type according to the grading of the Methodist church. Five well equipped departments, beautifully decorated in grey and old ivory, will provide for every age of the membership and community. The Cradle Roll and Mothers' room, the large well-equipped kitchen, drinking fountains, blackboards, cabinets of all kinds, and well-adapted furniture make this one of the finest religious education buildings in this part of the State. The ground floor will house the boys and girls of high school age and all the recreational features connected with the church, according to the plans; the large third floor room has been arranged for the young people's class room and meeting place. There are enough rooms to care for every adult and young people's class.

It is hoped that the elective courses now becoming so popular in Sunday schools will be offered in this school in all the adult classes. A good arrangement suggested is three courses offered as follows: "Practical Problems of our Religious Faith," another on Christian Ethics on Everyday Life," and another on "The Bible." In this way every adult over twenty-four will have the opportunity to enlist in a three-months course upon either of these subjects which they desire. These are meant to be practical discussion classes with utmost freedom of expression.

The auditorium will seat about 350 persons, including the balcony. The pews of the old church building have been revamped and are ready for the new building, being of the finest material and in good repair. The windows in the auditorium have been placed by persons of this community desirous of making this a beautiful place of worship. These windows have been admired by numbers who have seen them.

The building committee of which L. B. Cox is chairman, feels that only by the co-operation of the community and the wholehearted zeal of the church could this splendid work have been accomplished so quickly and so well.

Stock Deliveries

The purchase in Crockett county of 3800 wether lambs at ten cents a pound by the Producer's Livestock Commission Co. of St. Louis for Ohio feeders and the recent purchase by J. A. Womble of Fort Worth of 1,000 yearling wethers, 1,000 ewes and 3,000 lambs in Sutton and Crockett counties were deals reported in San Angelo Monday.

Four Crockett county ranchmen will deliver Thursday at Barnhart the 3800 wether lambs sold to the St. Louis cooperative commission company for Ohio feeders. It is expected the sheep will average 65 to 67 pounds in weight. West Bros. sold 1,000 head, Childress Bros. 1,200, Arthur Hoover, 1,000, and George Harrell 600. The price paid sets a new top for wether lambs in

this section of the State. A. B. Hamm of Fort Worth, representing the Producers' Live Stock Commission Co. is here to receive the sheep, which were inspected recently by E. G. Denman of Farmington, Mo. Mr. Denman is president of the Producers' Livestock Commission Company and chairman of the board of directors of all the livestock marketing agencies in the United States.

J. A. Womble of Fort Worth, accompanied here by his son, Amos Womble, Monday purchased 1,000 head of yearling wethers from B. W. Hutcherson of Sonora. He will receive the flock at Monument and make shipment to Missouri. On Wednesday, Mr. Womble will receive 1,000 aged ewes at Barnhart which he purchased from Childress Bros. and about 3,000 lambs obtained from different ranchmen. 1,600 of the lambs were purchased from Clay Montgomery of Ozona. The aged ewes obtained from Childress Bros. have been sold and will be

shipped to Glenn Vick at Graham Texas. - San Angelo Standard.

Livestock Quarantine

Be it remembered that on this 8th day of July, 1926, the Honorable Commissioners Court of Crockett County met at the Court House in Ozona in special session, all the members of said Court being present, whereupon the following order and judgment was duly passed by said Court and spread upon the minutes.

Ordered by the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, that whereas this county has two resident cattle and sheep inspectors duly commissioned by the State Livestock Sanitary Commission and have heretofore been instructed by this Court zealously to protect the livestock of Crockett county from infection by foreign livestock, and whereas, it has come to the notice of this Court that stomach worms, a malignant disease, now exists among some of the domestic animals in certain counties in West Texas, and also that anthrax exists in a mild form among some domestic animals in West Texas, the said inspectors are ordered to inspect all sheep and cattle entering Crockett county, and to issue written permission to enter all found clean and free from scab, fever ticks, stomach worms and anthrax, but to refuse entrance of any animals, flocks, herds or droves of livestock found infected with one or more of such malignant diseases.
No further business appearing, the Court adjourned sine die.

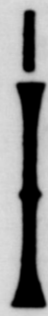
