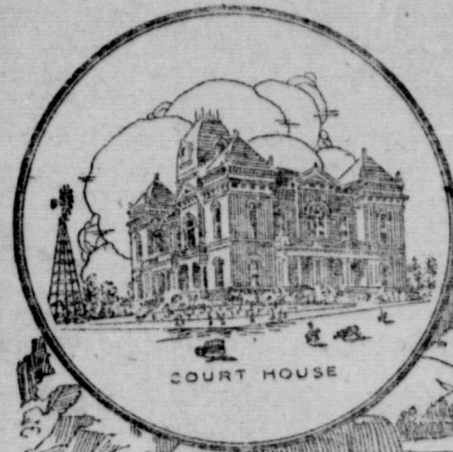
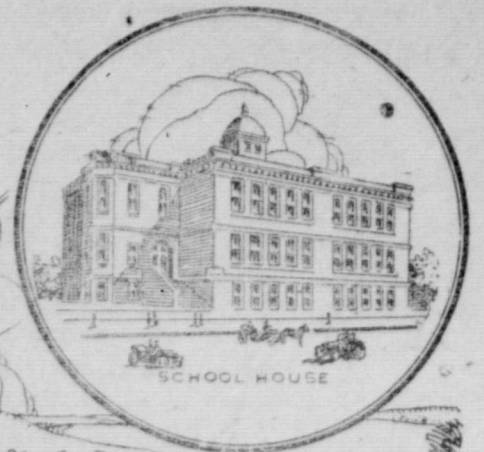

J. M. Shannon's Rosy Eye-Glasses

Bank on a rain either March 1 or 2! Seldom in twenty years has it failed to rain on those dates. If not then, the next best chance is from May 1 to 10.

Such is the prognostication of J. M. Shannon, banker and pioneer livestock man, who has lived in West Texas since '83. He bases his opinions not on records in black and white, but on long observation.

"Livestock conditions are 100 per cent better than at this time last year," remarked Mr. Shannon. "I might say they are 150 per cent better."

In support of this opinion, Mr. Shannon mentioned that a San Angelo ranchman this week has been offered \$37.50 each for several hundred coming two-year-old steers. J. M. Treadwell & Sons in Menard county recently sold a Kansas party 500 wether lambs at \$5.25 each. Baggett Brothers of Ozona on February 15 loaded at Barnhart 100 steer yearlings that brought \$32.50 per head.

Last year at this time there was virtually no market for cattle or sheep on the range. Later in the year, lambs began selling for \$2.75 and \$3 and these prices stuck until recently when the advance set in. The sheep market has been going up for several weeks. Robert Massie this week marketed lambs that netted \$12.75 per hundred pound. With lambs on the range changing hands at around \$5, bred ewes are said to be worth \$10.

"I understand wool buyers already are offering 30c a pound for the spring long clip," Mr. Shannon said. "A year ago 15c a pound was their best offer, though later in the season choice long wools brought 21c to 23c a pound. The market on both wool and mohair should be much stronger in 1922."

Mr. Shannon has ranch interests in many West Texas counties. Three of them are Crockett, Irion and Scurry. He says that so far, feeding has been light, owing to the comparatively mild winter. Less than 10 per cent of the cattle are on feed, though probably one-half the ewes that will lamb out in the spring are being fed. Lambing starts about the last week in March.

"A rain any time between now and then will meet the situation," said Mr. Shannon. "It's generally only a rain in December that rots the grass. Even cold weather with rain wouldn't hurt stock much. The fact of the matter is, nothing can beat a good general rain."—San Angelo Standard.

Mexico is Again in Eruption

Feeling is tense in Juarez and at Fort Bliss, where reports have caused emergency steps to be taken to get ready for a threatened rebel attack on Juarez. Five thousand American troops have been mobilized at Fort Bliss "to protect the border."

While the Juarez garrison, under General J. J. Mendez, is especially alert, having been cautioned by the commander, the General himself declared he has little confidence in reports.

He said, however, that he had heard the rebels were attempting to concentrate men south of Juarez, but that he had discredited the reports.

Army officers at Fort Bliss heard that General Mendez was invited to join the revolutionists, and said that the report was partially responsible for troops being mobilized at the fort last night, as they had understood that Mendez would not surrender without a fight.

Officers of the post also admitted that they heard that rebels were gathering men in Chihuahua preparatory to approaching Juarez.

Brig. Gen. E. L. Howe says numerous reports have been received by him and that they were so strong the army could not afford to ignore them.

"The army is on the alert," he said, "and apart from that I cannot be quoted. We are ready to protect the American border if necessary."

Esteban Cantu, former Governor of Lower California, is one of the leaders of the Mexican revolutionary movement.

Generals and all other army officers who are "not satisfied with the present state of affairs and who are not therefore rendering conscientious service to the army" have been informed by President Obregon that their immediate discharge is ready at their request.

News and Notes for Busy Readers

Disorders continue in Ireland. Many people killed and wounded in riots at Belfast.

"Legal" importations of intoxicants to this country are announced from Washington to have exceeded by a million and a half dollars in 1921 those of the preceding year.

Dr. James M. Peebles, Los Angeles, Cal., expressed a wish that he might live to be one hundred years old. He would have been one hundred years old March 23rd, but died Feb. 15th.

Federal Judge Landis has finally resigned from the bench, and will devote his attention to his position as baseball magnate. He says he can't find enough time for his "varied activities."

Now in his eighty-sixth year, "Uncle Joe" Cannon announces that he will not be a candidate for re-election to Congress. Having served twenty-five years in that body, he feels that he should take time to enjoy himself a little before he gets too old.

Good Report on Ozona High School

State High School Supervisor Gordon Damon was a recent official visitor of the Ozona High School. You will be interested in reading the following outline of his report to the State Department of Education:

In order that the school may be properly certified, it is essential that the minimum requirements be met. To that end, the supervisor recommends:

1. An up-to-date encyclopedia is needed and should be added to the library.

2. It is recommended that all the English work be combined under one teacher and that this department be built up to fourth unit standard.

3. It is recommended that the school consider the inclusion of animal production in its course of study. This might prove of greater advantage than the more formal sciences.

4. It is recommended that the school be permitted to retain its credits in mechanical drawing and shop work. While these subjects should have been dropped from the list of credits, as they were not taught for two years, they were not dropped. The present work appears of a standard enough character to permit its recognition.

5. The excellent condition of the building, the smooth running organization of the work, and the general efficiency of the teaching force, deserve the commendation of this Department. The work being fully accredited, no additional units are requested this year.

Conditions and Prices Better

Kansas City reports that the general trade is getting so accustomed to an advance in the sheep market the first of each week that an advance of 75c in two days does not cause much if any comment. Of course there is a limit, but what is the limit?—that's the question. The market has gone much higher than even the most optimistic predicted, and fed lambs are making a larger profit per head than at any previous time in the history of lamb feeding.

Reports from Boston indicate that trading between dealers still constitutes the bulk of the current business in wool. Manufacturers are buying a little, but only for some immediate need. The little available is held at high prices. Rumors are afloat of some withdrawals from bond, especially Concordia and South Americans, on the plea that they are not skirted within the meaning of the law. The trade shows great anxiety to accumulate wool.

The Jericho pool, in Fountain Green, Utah, rejected all bids for their 1922 clip of nearly 800,000 pounds, the highest offer for which was 36 1-2 cents per pound flat, made by the American Woolen Company, Boston. The selling committee for the pool held that 40 cents was the minimum acceptable to growers.

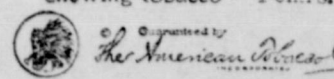

More About the Edwards Killing

In last week's Stockman an account of the murder of Hayden ("Hayd") Edwards, at his ranch near Comstock, was published.

The following additional information is excerpted from the Val Verde Herald:

Two bullet holes, one just above the heart and another above the left eye, the latter ranging downward through the neck, told the story of his death at the hands of some unknown person, or persons. The dead man was found by Ben Billingsley, partner with M. C. Edwards, a second cousin of the slain man, in the conduct of a store in Comstock, when he and his family went to the ranch to visit and look after the health of the dead man, who had not for some time previously been in the best of health.

The dead man was sprawled face downward in front of his door, and from all indications had been dead for some time, perhaps a week, since seven head of cattle held in the ranch corral at the time of his death were dead from lack of water and food, while some horses prevented from access to water by fences were in a condition described as "reeling" from starvation.

Robbery is thought to have been the motive of the murder, since two blankets, a pearl-handled sixshooter, and some money, which the murdered man is believed to have had at the time of the killing, have not been located. The whereabouts of the missing articles remains unrevealed, despite the search made for them since the finding of the slain man's dead body Sunday afternoon.

A search of the dead man's premises disclosed the fact that the bullet, or, if shot twice as some seem to doubt, one of the bullets which passed through the body of the dead man, was fired from the outside, possibly while Mr. Edwards was sitting in his doorway, since it passed into the building through the open door.

It is believed that some other articles, finally coming to rest in the room, where it was picked up by the searchers. It is believed to have been fired from a 45 pistol, possibly the gun belonging to the dead man, which is missing.

An effort was made to communicate with Mrs. Elia Jurnigan, of San Antonio, a sister of the deceased, but she could not be located. A brother, George Edwards, of Ozona, attended the funeral. Other relatives present were: W. R. and M. C. Edwards, cousins, the former of Del Rio and the latter of Comstock; Richard Baker, of Comstock; Jess Baker, of Carta Valley, and Dudley Edwards, of Ricksprings, nephews.

The little ranch belonging to the deceased consists of five sections, or 3,200 acres, upon which there were about 150 head of cattle and a few horses.

The following pathetic incident is related by the West Texas News:

There was a rat terrier dog at the remains, faithfully guarding the same. A neighboring ranchman reported that for the past eight days that dog had come to his place every day, walked around in the yard and all but told them that something had gone wrong with its master. He thought nothing of it at the time thinking that possibly Mr. Edwards had business somewhere in that neighborhood and that the dog had come by the place.
