We are still sounding the call for volunteers to crash into some of those concrete light nests. Recently one volunteer came forward but he picked the one post that has a light mounted on it and consequently his efforts came to naught.

A very valuable work has been undertaken in the Ozona schools through the cooperation and assistance of Miss Schuee, medical health authority from the bureau of health and nutrition of the University extension division. Miss Schueemayer has been here more than a week and will be here about three weeks longer giving a course of lectures and demonstrations in health and nutrition which will be of great benefit to school children and parents.

Crockett county voters should turn out full strength next Tuesday to cast their ballots in the general election. The contests for public office were virtually decided in the primary elections and the vote in the general election is more or less of a formality in Texas, a confirmation of the primary vote.

But a lot depends on the vote in the general election. If Crockett county polls a full vote she will have a better representation in the affairs of the Demo-

cratic party for the coming year. Likewise if the entire state polls a heavy vote in the general election, the state will have more voice in the affairs of the national government at Washington. It's not much trouble to mark a ballot, take a few minutes of Tuesday and vote. It will be a great feeling next summer for Ozona people to realize that their water needs are amply provided for and that there is no danger of a repetition of the shortage experienced last summer when a breakdown occurred at the plant at the height of the celebration. **SMALL PRISON SYSTEM BE CHANGED?**

At the bottom of the ballot at the next election on Nov. 2 will appear the following:

For the amendment of article 14, section 54, of the constitution, abolishing the board of prison commissioners.

Against the amendment of article 14, section 54, of the constitution, abolishing the board of prison commissioners.

This constitutional amendment relates to change in form of the management of the Texas prison system and the voters of Texas should give the amendment the deep study that its importance demands. In its present form of management a board of three commissioners have exclusive control and management of the state prisons, reporting only to the governor.

Those responsible for the system insisted that the governor would have no direct power over the commissioners' actual operation of the prison system or their methods. Is that true?

These commissioners under the present system, are created by a constitutional provision and can be removed only through judicial procedure. The commissioners have equal authority. They are paid salaries and receive in addition perquisites of office including homes and automobiles.

Should the constitutional amendment to be voted on Nov. 2 be carried, it would abolish the present board and it is the consensus of opinion of thoughtful persons of considerable minds, the way will be clear for a modern system of management.

It will be proposed that the legislature of 1927 create an unsalaried board of five or seven outstanding citizens similar to those controlling all the state educational institutions, which board shall outline policies of the prison system and be empowered to employ one man trained and qualified for prison management and who shall be held responsible for the affairs of the prison and the welfare of the prisoners.

He will be required to report regularly to the unsalaried prison board by whom he may be discharged for inefficiency, waste, brutality or other good causes.

Those who have made a study of the present system and who are versed in the lore of penology make bold to say that the prison system of Texas, a vast property, representing an investment of millions of dollars, has no head and that the system under the present form of management has no system.

**Students Interested In Adoption Of Amendments**

The history classes are all studying the meaning of the four Constitutional Amendments to be voted on next Tuesday. It is believed that all these amendments should be adopted. Especial interest and study are being centered on the Constitutional Amendment proposing to change the form of management of the Texas prison system. The school became interested in the adoption of this amendment during Miss Speer's work in Ozona. The school promised to take up the work in Crockett County and do everything possible toward creating favorable sentiment for the amendment.

service before the hot summer months, it will be in readiness to take care of the needs. Work is also scheduled to begin soon on the new reservoir, which will relieve at once the possibility of a water shortage and provide better fire protection and better water service.

The Republic Production Company's No. 1 Powell well in Crockett county is reported at most ready to be brought in. The drill is said to be several feet into the pay sand and oil rising at the rate of 300 feet an hour in the hole. The Powell field is coming to the front now in West Texas production and it may not be long until the oil rush will be directed toward this city.

### Health Supervision Work Is Introduced Into Local Schools

Miss Schneemayer, representing the Bureau of Health and Nutrition of the Extension Division of the University of Texas, began work in the schools Monday, October 18. Miss Schneemayer will remain four weeks in Ozona, devoting her time to the supervision of health instruction in the local schools. Beginning next week, a colony of white rats will be systematically fed different foods, their weights recorded and studied and conclusions drawn as to relative nutritive values.

Miss Schneemayer has addressed the elementary school faculty and outlined her plans of health teaching. She has supplied them with detailed health teaching plans from the University. These neatly bound, written plans will continue to be used after Miss Schneemayer finishes her work in the local schools. She will continue to address the faculty from time to time.

Monday of this week she addressed the Parent Teacher meeting on the subject of food values. She stressed the necessity of more milk and vegetables and less meat in the daily diet. To ward the last of her stay she will address interested parents in a series of meetings.

### Great Personages of the Bible

#### Paul

OF THE many interesting episodes in the life of the Apostle Paul, his visit with Peter is one of the most important. After Paul had seen the Lord in the vision on the Damascus highway, he asked "What did Thou have me do?" In answer to this question he was given his commission to go and preach the Gospel. Paul deeply appreciated the responsibility of this new work which opened before him. He also realized that he was not sufficiently prepared for the task, because he had never seen Jesus. He had heard a great deal about Him, but he had never come into personal contact with Him. He felt that a personal contact of this nature was a prime requisite. In the absence of it he was at a great loss. It seemed to him that it was impossible for him to speak out of the rich depths of a personal experience. As Jesus had died, a personal contact was now impossible, except that which was possible in the spiritual sense. Paul, therefore, endeavored to find some person who had this personal touch with Jesus when He was alive. From him he concluded it would be possible for him to acquire that which he felt he so much needed. This explains his visit with Peter at Jerusalem. We do not know very much about this visit so far as the record of it is concerned, for it is referred to in a single brief sentence: "Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to visit Cephas, and tarried with him fifteen days." What a wonderful fifteen days those must have been. Peter had seen Jesus in the flesh. He had traveled with Him and worked at His side. He was a companion of His for the most part of His earthly ministry. It was the privilege of Paul to hear from Peter, who had had first-hand information and experience, all about the One whose Gospel he was to preach. Pungent, gripping, and inspiring must have been the many hours of each of the fifteen days in which these two friends talked together concerning the personality and message of the greatest character of the ages. Whatever doubt Paul may have had concerning the message of Jesus prior to this visit with Peter, it certainly was dispelled as the result of the visit. Peter did not answer the questions which Paul doubtless asked by offering him a mere definition or opinion based upon what he might have heard others say, but he told him out of his own personal experience what he knew about Jesus. This had an important effect upon the mind and heart of Paul for the reason that Peter was his friend, and he had unlimited confidence in him. In other words, the Person whom Paul was commissioned to declare seemed to him far more real than He ever could have been if he had not gained this sense of reality from his friend Peter.

It was the sense of the real in art and literature, as well as in biography, that appeals to us, for the reason that there is absent all pretense, sham and imitation. That which is real grips one's mind. The artificial and unreal fail in this respect, for they are a mere pretense. Religion to Paul was something real, and for that reason it so dominated his career that he became one of the most important and best known characters in all Biblical literature.

Paul was by nature a humble man, although he possessed in a remarkable degree the courage of his convictions. This was evidenced not only in his zeal for the religion of Jesus, but also during that period of his life when he was persecuting the very truth which, after his conversion, he advocated with all his power and strength. Paul was summoned to a very difficult task, and he needed the support of all the courage and strength that it was possible for him to obtain. He left the humble home of Peter with a great light illuminating his heart and with fire burning in his eyes. He now possessed the courage to undertake the work of telling the world something concerning a truth of which he had no doubt. He knew now that what he was going to talk about was absolutely and unquestionably true. He was convinced of the reality of his message.

The following incident is related by a noted astronomer and his friend who was a philosopher. They were walking together in a garden when their conversation happened to lead them to a discussion of religion. The astronomer's name was Newton. He spoke slightly of religion, which provoked from the philosopher, whose name was Hadley, the following reply: "Newton, when you talk about astronomy I love to hear what you say, and I always profit by your remarks, for you speak about a subject concerning which your knowledge is very great, but when you speak of religion as you do I do not like to hear you, for you speak about a subject concerning which you have little or no real information. You have never been willing to make the experiment." The philosopher drew from experience. "The astronomer says that Paul before his visit with Peter, needed the reinforcement which comes from the possession of the sense of reality." (Oct. 1924, Western Statesman Times.)

### MRS. WEST LECTURES

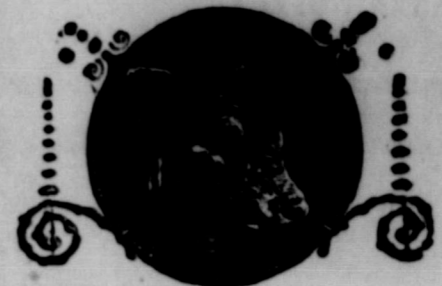
Mrs. W. E. West Wednesday gave the school a most interesting description of her stay in Paris. Her address was delivered to the Crockett Club with the 21.
