





Small Carry-Over, Short Clip Improve World Wool Outlook

Although conditions in the domestic wool manufacturing industry are somewhat uncertain, the supply situation is relatively favorable in that the corry-over of old clip domestic wool is reported to be small and present indications point to a reduction in the clip for 1934, says the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in its cur rent report on world woo! pros-

Trading in raw wool and in semi-manufactures has been quiet in domestic and foreign markets the last month, with price declines on most grades of wool in the Boston market. Bids have teen lowered slightly on new clip wools throughout Western States.

The bureau reports that the selling season is about over in foreign primary markets and that available supplies are small, with prices fairly well maintained. Trading in the United Kingdom market is reported as being in an uncertain position because of German import restriction and other continental difficulties.
