



## Texas Minerals Produce Wealth

Over 34 Millions Come From Earth, Aside From Oil in '33

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 11-Minerals aside from petroleum produced in Texas during 1933 had an aggregate value of \$34,089,202 ecording to the University of Texas Bureau of Economic Geology. A total of 1,082,967 tons of sulphur was mined in 1933, with value of \$19,089,202, according to compilations takens from the State Comptroller's Office. Actual production, according to the Unied States Bureau of Mines, totaled 1,083,445 tons, valued at \$19,502,010, the difference in valnes being accounted for by the assumed value per ton for the sulphur. The gross production tax is paid to the State comptroller on the assumed value of \$13 per ton, while the Bureau of Mines uses a value of \$18 per ton. In 1930, production was 9,129,593 tons, with a value of \$38,332,674; in 1931, it was 875,947 tons, with a value of \$15,767,046. The value according to reports to the State comptroller.

Production of other minerals in Texas during 1933, according to the University bureau's report, were: 126,069 tons of asphalt, with a value of \$353,847; 3,091,071 barrels of cement, \$5,268,605; elay products 28,951 short tons nite, 821,878 tons, \$833,000. Fuller's earth, 45,295 tons, \$411,350; gypsum, 112,106 tons, \$1,058,869; lime, 36,286 tons, \$339,305; sand and gravel, 4,317,312 tons, \$2,264 905; stone, 1,215,820 tons, \$1,140-589. Miscellaneous minerals valu-

ed at \$925,596 were also produced. Mining of copper, lead and silver has been at a standstill since 1929, the report showed. In that

#### **Proper Diet Will** Prevent Pellagra Says Health Head

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 11-Now is the time for the prevention of Pellagra, says Dr. John W. Brown State Health Officer. This disease is generally noted in increasing frequency following the winter months. In Texas it is the cause

Pellagra is not a germ disease and it is not contagious. It is caused by deficiency of certain important elements in the dietary. as has been proved by years of research by the authorities of the United States Public Health Service. It is generally believed that restricting the diet too largely to refined cereals, fat meat, and molasses, etc., is contributary to causation of Pellagra. These foods are lacking in the so-called Vitamin G (the Pellagra Preventive Vitamin), and people whose diet is primarily made up of these foods are the easiest victims of Pellagra. It seems to be demonstrated

that the inclusion in the diet of food rich in Vitamin G serves to

prevent the development of Pellagra. Diet is also the chief factor in the cure. Pellagra (rough skin) shows itself by a peculiar redness and breaking out or peeling of the skin, particularly the exposed surface. This is accompanied by weakness, nervousness, indigestion, headaches and a bur-

ned feeling of the mouth Pellagra may be prevented by eating a balanced diet consisting of lean meat, eggs, vegetables, of more than 700 death each year. and fruits. Whenever a person develops the disease, however, treatment should be under the direction of a doctor.





Another unusual plant is Carex physoides, a perennial sedge used extensively for grazing in the Kara Kum Desert of Turkistan. This plant seldom produces viable seed, and is therefore propagated by root cuttings. Roots were collected in June and arrived in this country about the first of October They were planted in a greenhouse in Washington after four months of remaining entirely dry and are now showing signs of


From the dry, rocky mountain slopes near Issyk Kul-the largest fresh-water lake in Turkistan-Westover and Enlow brought back two bunch grasses. One of them, a species of Agropyron, is a relative of the crested wheatgrass which is winning favor rapidly in the Great Plains since its introduction a few years ago. The other, a species of Hordeum, is a wild perennial barley. Both of these introductions show promise for the Palouse country in the Pacific Northwest.

Another species of Agropyron was found growing on the flat desert lands near the Aral Sea, in the vicinity of Chelkar. This grass provides good grazing over a large area. All through Turkistan the explorers encountered many species of Stipa, (feathergrass) all of them much more hardy than the species which are grown in the western part of this country. They found one of the blue-grasses. Pea bulbosa, growing through out Turkey. Many of these localities have practically no rainfall except in the winter.

The settlement of the West with its intensive grazing so changed the environment that many of the best native grasses are practical-

#### Texas' 5-Year Auto Deaths More Than World War Losses

AUSTIN, Dec. 11-The numter of deaths in Texas due to automobile accidents during the past five years more than equals the number of Texans killed during the World War, according to statement issued by the State Department of Health. Last year over twelve hundred persons met death in this manner and from the figures compiled so far for 1934 the number of deaths will be even higher.

Most of the automobile accidents occur on week-ends or holidays. This is a surprising fact since fewer pedestrians are abroad and traffic congestion in towns and cities is less on Sunday than on other days of the week. This paradox may be exed in part from having more nexperienced drivers on the road together with their failure to observe traffic rules.

Some of the most frequent violations of traffic rules are: exteeding the speed limit, driving on the wrong side of the road, failure to give right of way, and runaing without lights. The observance of rules and regulations is not enough to prevent all accidents. The car itself must be in good shape, especially the brakes and steering connections. Common sense must be used in all

situations. The consequences of an automobile accident are so disastrous that no one can afford to stand on their legal rights in a situation of impending danger. Only if you have conceded such rights and have made every possible effort to avoid an accident, can you consider yourself blameless in case of accident.




