Crockett Producers Have Received To Date \$364,000

Cattle Buying Stops But Sheep, Goats

Purchased

MORE ARE LISTED

Government drouth relief purchases of sheep, goats and cattle have brought an aggregate of approximately \$364,000 in cash to livestock producers of Crockett County since the opening of the program, according to figures compiled in the office of J. S. Barlow, office manager for the drouth relief purchasing program

in this county. Purchase of sheep and goats from drouth-parched ranges in this county continue, but no additional cattle quota was received for this week. Two additional weekly quotas of 1,000 head a week were received after the close of the general cattle buying program and efforts were made to get an additional quota for this week but unsuccessfully.

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

Curious Specimens Of Floral Life In University Garden

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct 23-Curious and rare specimens of floral life are included among the more ordinary shrubs and plants which grow in the small greenhouse at The University of Texas, Among the rarest blooms in this collection are the old-lady-in-the-boat, the rattlesnake flower, and the sensitive plant of Texas. The greenhouse, located on the main campus, contains flowers and shrubs used to decorate the University grounds, and plants used by the College of Pharmacy in the preparation of certain drugs.

The old-lady-in-the-boat is a colorful tropical plant belonging to the spider lily family. Its long spike-like leaves are green on side and purple on the other. In the center of the plant the leaves fold up to resemble a purple boat Dwight ff. Green of Chicago is chief in which sits an old lady whose white bonnet shows above the sides. The flower abounds in Mexico and South America.

The sensitive plant grows wild in Texas, taking its name from the fact that when the plant is Epidemics Among touched, its leaves fold up and the stem droops. A water gland at the base of the stem holds the plant turgid, and when the plant is affected by touch or heat, the water is driven from the leaves and causes the phenomenon which gives the plant its name.

The rattlesnake flower is star-shaped yellow plant with brown spots; its odor is very offensive to the human nose, but it attracts flies and other insects with its scent of decaying matter.
