Only Few More Flocks To Be Visited In This County

### 92,000 PURCHASED

#### 31/4 Million Head Sheep Bought To Date In United States

With orders from drouth relief officials to bring the sheep and goat buying program to a close "as rapidly as possible," and only a few more flocks to be culled in this county, the government livestock purchasing program in this county was expected to be brought to a close by the end of this week, according to advices from the local headquarters.

Sheep purchases in this county up to last night had reached a total of 92,018, of which number, 79,745 had been killed. Goat purchases totalled 8,499, all of which were killed. Only four or five flocks remain to be visited by sorters and the total purchases in this county are expected to be raised only a few thousand thru the balance of the purchasting program.

Rumors of another cattle purchasing quota were being heard here yesterday, but no official orders had been received.

Reports from the Denver headquarters of the livestock purchasing program received here yesterday show a total of 3,215,188 head of sheep and 184,171 goats purgagement with that team, which chased to date in the United defeated the locals 19 to 0 in the States. In Texas, total sheep purchases are 976,821 head, of which 728,and is scheduled to start at 3 o'- 433 have been slaughtered. Goat purchases in Texas total 155,025, with 113,087 killed.

#### Producers Warned Against Assigning Livestock Benefits

Livestock producers selling cattle or other livestock to the Agricultural Adjustment Adminisrta tion under the emergency cattle sheep purchase program, agreement and emergency live that any reported cases in which stock agreements, with respect to assignment of benefit or ter the purchase of sheep, were warned today that assignment of or contracts to transfer benefit or service payments received from such sales cannot be legally enforced. Such action is in violation of the terms of the agreements.

The Administration issued the warning after complaints had been received that in some instances farmers' creditors, although waiving all claims to bene fit or service payments in return for being named as joint payees for the purchase payments, were asking producers to sign separate agreements or through other devices were attempting to require producers to assign or contract to pay over benefit or service payments.

Two separate payments are of the week made in connection with emergency purchases of drouth cattle. or drouth sheep and goats. One, a "purchase payment," is subject to claims of any lien holders against the livestock, and the other, "benefit payment" in the case of cattle, or a "service payment" in the case of sheep or other livestock, goes direct to producers, and under the terms of the agreement is not subject to any claims of lienholders.

Both cattle agreement and the livestock agreement specifically protect the farmer against the pressure of over-anxious creditors who may insist that the producer assign or contract to pay over benefit or service payments. Under instructions issued to county agents, checks for these payments are delivered only to producers. The producer agrees, under paragraph (3) of the cattle agreements and paragraph (c) of the livestock agreement:

'Not to sell or assign, in whole or in part, this agreement or his right to or claim for the benefit payment under this agreement, and not to execute any power of attorney to collect such payment or to order that such payment be made. Any such sale, assignment, order, or power of attorney shall be null and void."

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

### Care In Treating Colds May Prevent Serious Illness

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 31-"While the common cold is no respector of seasons, increased prevalence is decidedly marked in the winter months, Unfortunately, familiarity with this condition has bred contempt for it. This is plainly indicated by the usual rejoinder, "Oh! I've just got a cold;" the inference, of course, being that while a cold is an annoying matter, after all it is an insignificant affliction. This attitude undoubtedly has been the cause of many needless deaths, to say nothing of prolonged and expensive illnesses' states Dr. John W. Brown, State

Health Officer. "One's resistance to many diseases, including colds, can be raised by increasing one's vitality by observing the fundamental living rules, namely; plenty of fresh air, good wholesome food, neither too much nor too little, sufficient rest, and the avoidance of habitual over-indulgence of devitalizing stimulants, including tea, cof-

fee, tobacco and alcohol. "If, however, in spite of ordinary precautions, a cold is contracted, it will pay to consider it seriously. Every cold should be viewed as the possible beginning of a serious illness. That means promptly seeking a physician's advice and explicity following his directions. If he orders bed, then bed it should be. Incidently, complete rest is one of the finest ways to overcome a cold in short or-

# Eternal Vigilance Required in Fight Against All of Childhood's Epidemics

DIPHTHERIA—that dread epidemic of childhood two decades ago-has almost been conquered, medical author-Ities inform us. Eternal vigilance still is practised against the disease, through immunization campaigns, and the world of medicine hopes that ultimately the dread plague will be as extinct as the yellow fever epidemics of the nine teenth century.

The American Red Cross played I major part in the eradication of both. As long ago as the 1880s a young Rad Cross nurse-Jane Delano-led a corps of women nurses in the battles agains yellow fever in the South. Today she is revered as America's Florence Nightia gale, both because of her early exploits ship as a World War nurse-a cause in

Red Cross nurses by the thousands ve worked in the diphtheria eradican campaigns through assisting doc tors in giving insumizations to school children. They first entered this work twenty years ago and still are carrying

schools. Public health authorities and the aurse know that these should not be permitted, because any or all may leave weaknesses. The nurse is alert against infantile paralysis, which annually presents a problem in some ection of the country. Against all of these the healthy, well-nourished child stands the best chance.

Child health preservation is a major program of the American Red Cross. How important the work of the nurse is in this respect may be judged from the fact that during the last twelve month period Red Cross nurses in spected 629,000 school children and of this number found 361,000 with physical defects of varying degrees which had to be corrected if normal health were to be maintained.

Following the World War the Red Cross undertook the task of showing rural communities and smaller cities the value of the visiting nurse-a lessor already appreciated by many larger cities. Hundreds of mursing services were established and proved their value to the taxpayers, thus becoming sublicly supported institutions.
