





Fruit tapiocas, mock mince meat, tart fillings and sauces lend themselves to the use of combinations of adds and ends of canned, fresh, or dried fruits.

Peach Tapioca Pudding: of economy home taploca, 4 c, sugar, 4 t, salt, can peaches, 2 T. powdered sugar, and boiling water. Drain the peaches, sprinkle with powdered sugar. Let stand one hour. Soak the tapioca one hour in water to cover. To the peach juice drained off add enough water to make 11/2 cups and heat it to the boiling point. Add the tapioca, sugar and salt and cook in a double boiler.

Moulded Fruit Salad: 1 level T. of gelatin, 1/4 c. cold water, 1/4 c. sugar, few grains salt, 1, c mild vinegar, 2/3 c. syrup from canned fruit, 1 T. lemon juice, 2 c. mixed fruit. Soften the gelatin in the cold water and dissolve it in the boiling water. Add salt and sugar and cool. Add the fruit syrup, lemon juice, and vinegar and chill until it just begins to set. Fold in the fruit and turn into a

wet mold to congeal completely. Note: Grapefruit or pineapple juice with terragon vinegar are very acceptable.




