

Mrs. Alice Baker of Ozona received official notification by telegram from the War Department in agriculture will be required to Friday that her son, S/Sgt. Boyd B. Baker, had been "missing in action over Germany since November

> Sgt. Baker was a tail gunner on an American heavy bomber and had been stationed in England since last May, when he went overseas as a member of a Flying Fortress crew.

The date mentioned in the War Department telegram corresponds with one of the big daylight raids made by American bombers on the German city of Bremen and it is thought probable that Set. Except for a two months period, recently, when he was on a mission to Iceland, he has been stationed in England flying with the Fortress and Liberator bomber groups hammering the Huns from the Island bases.
