MAY AMEND TAX DECLARATION

While declarations of estimated 1944 income tax and first quarterly payments are due by April 15, amended declarations and payments may be made on or before the fifteenth day of the last month of any succeeding quarter—June 15, September 15 and December 15, the Bureau of Internal Revenue explains. When an amended declaration is made, any increase or decrease in estimated tax should be spread evenly over the remaining instalments. Penalties are provided for failure to file a required declaration in time, failure to pay any instalment of estimated tax on time, and substantial underestimation of tax.

Shearers Must Get ODT Approval To Leave State

Application Will Be Denied if Shearing in Texas Not Complete

John W. Reed, district manager, Office of Defense Transportation, announced today that he was issuing a directive to all operators of sheep shearing equipment providing that such operators must secure prior approval from the district manager of ODT from whom they received their certificates of War Necessity before leaving the district in which they are located; and that under no circumstances must they leave the State of Texas until such approval is granted by the ODT.

Mr. Reed pointed out that in order for this type of operator to secure approval from the ODT they must produce factual information that they have bonafide contracts with wool growers in other sections of the country; and that when such proof was established that approval would be given; but in no case would approval be given when their services were needed in the district in which they are located.

It was necessary that this directive be issued on account of the shortage of motor vehicles, replacement parts, tires, and gasoline. Mr. Reed is asking the wool growers to cooperate with the ODT by notifying him of any sheep shearers that were planning to leave the state before the shearing is completed in Texas.

This directive was promulgated in a conference between Regional Transportation Specialist L. J. Rhodes and Regional Farm Vehicle Specialist T. R. Haggard of Dallas, and John W. Reed this afternoon.

771 Motor Vehicles Are Registered Here

Operators Now Subject To Arrest Without License Tabs

A total of 771 motor vehicles in Crockett county have been licensed for 1944 and are now wearing the tiny 2 by 2 tabs issued by the state for attachment to the existing 1942 license plates still, required on each vehicle, Al Fields, deputy tax collector, reported this week.

The total is but a few under the registration at this time last year, some 780 vehicles having been registered at that time. Totals this year include 459 passenger cars, 113 commercial vehicles, 181 farm trucks and 18 trailers.

The new license tabs must be in place now on all motor vehicles or operators face arrest. The new license tags were required to be on all cars April 1 if the vehicles were to be operated on public highways.

Frozen Foods Locker Plant for Ozona

It is with a great deal of pride that we are able to announce the prospective installation of a Frozen Foods locker plant for the convenience of the citizens of Ozona and surrounding territory.

We are now securing pledges from prospective users of these lockers who are producers of foods, either meats, fruits or vegetables, in sufficient quantities to win approval of the War Production Board for priority on the necessary equipment. At least 60 per cent of the lockers to be installed must be rented in advance of installation before government authority for such installation is given. We have found a ready demand from Ozona people and feel confident that the necessary number of users will be found.

The locker plant, containing 300 units, plus a cooling room and quick freeze compartment, is to be installed in our store. Customers will have free access to their individual lockers during business hours for storage or withdrawal of food supplies, meats, fruits and vegetables. Each locker represents storage capacity sufficient for approximately 250 pounds of meat.

In addition to the frozen storage, our plant will afford the additional service of cooling out, cutting, wrapping and quick freezing of your home-killed meats. This process of cooling and quick freezing insures retention of maximum flavor and quality for your stored meats and conditions them for storage for an indefinite time without danger of spoilage. The entire service of cooling, cutting, wrapping, quick freezing and transfer to your own locker will be rendered at a charge of only 3 cents per pound.

Individual lockers are offered on a rental basis, upper tier lockers at \$15 per year and lower drawer type lockers at \$18 per year, all with approximately the same storage capacity and all of the same low temperature.

Customers interested in securing one or more lockers are urged to communicate with us immediately to avoid possible disappointment. We hope to be able to install a plant large enough to take care of the possible local demand, but we urge you to speak for your locker in advance of installation and thus make sure of your enjoyment of this modern and money-saving system.

Customers who have pledged locker boxes are urged to send in their checks in the amount due as soon as possible in order that there may be no delay in submitting the necessary requests for government approval. Money thus paid will be placed in escrow in the Ozona National Bank until actual installation of the plant begins.

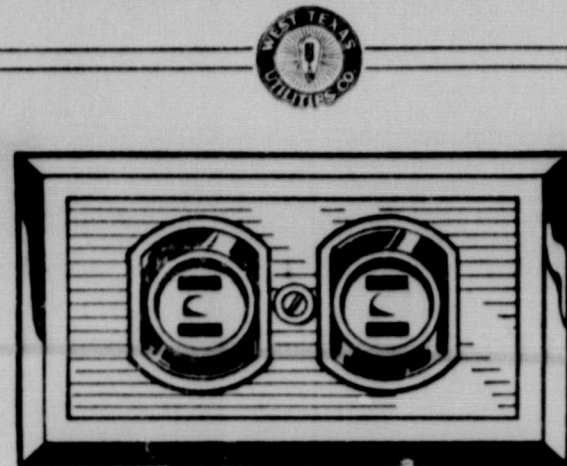

been so recognized by the department.

"It is with a great deal of pleasure that we are able to advise you that your public water supply has received an A or excellent rating," Dr. Cox wrote. "This has been due largely to the improvements which you have effected, and represents a greater increase in the factor of safety of your public supply.

"Therefore, in testimony of this satisfactory condition, we are willing to authorize the erection and maintenance, on all public highways leading into the city, or a permanent marker, notifying the citizens of Ozona, as well as the traveling public, that your public water supply has received the approval of the Texas State Department of Health, provided you sign the attached agreement blanks, which we are submitting to you in duplicate, and return them to us at your earliest convenience.

"As soon as we receive the signed agreement blanks mentioned above, we shall send you the specifications for the construction of the highway markers which you can have made locally.

"This public approval is a distinct honor for your water supply system, and has been awarded to only a small number of supplies within the state at the present time. Any public announcement that you may care to make concerning this compliment which is being paid to you will meet with our approval."

The agreement blanks mentioned provide for regular checks on the supply and maintenance of present standards.

ing all the original flavor and tenderness without introducing moisture as in the slow freezing process. From the quick freezing compartment the meat will be transferred to the customer's own locker, this service of cooling, cutting, wrapping and quick freezing being offered at a cost of 3 cents per pound.

The locker plant is to be installed in the present quarters of Baker's Food Store, present plans calling for location of the locker vault on the south side of the front of the store and the quick freeze, cooling and cutting room in the rear or present store room of the concern.

Cities Rewarded for Low Accident Rates

AUSTIN—C. J. Rutland, chairman of the street and traffic section of the Texas Safety Association, today announced the winners for 1943 of the intercity traffic safety contest.

This contest is conducted annually by the Association and winners are selected on the basis of reports furnished to the Department of Public Safety by competing cities. Dallas, with 29 traffic fatalities, was awarded first place for cities of over 100,000 population. Waco, with 2 traffic fatalities was the winner for cities of a population from 50,000 to 100,000 and Lubbock with only one fatality led the cities in the 25,000 to 50,000 population class.

Seven cities in the 10,000 to 25,000 population finished the year with no traffic fatalities. They were Cleburne, Del Rio, Denton, Greenville, Sherman, Terrell and Texarkana.

DON'T BE NICE TO PRISONERS

MADRID—German newspapers appealed to the German people to stop being nice to Allied prisoners and French and Italian workers in the Reich.

"Although we have many times recalled that it is forbidden to speak to war prisoners," said the Hamburger Fremdenblatt, "still the Germans do it. Again we must remind them it is forbidden. Moreover, French and Italian workers must be considered as prisoners."

"This call is particularly addressed to German women and young girls," said the paper.

11 Marine Corps Pilots Down 209 Jap Planes



Included among outstanding fighter plane records of U. S. Marine Corps pilots in the Southwest Pacific—most spectacular of World War II—are the performances of eleven Leatherneck aces who have been credited with shooting down at least 209 enemy planes. Leading Marine Corps aces and the number of Jap aircraft they have downed are, top row, Maj. Gregory "Pappy" Boyington, Okanogan, Wash., 26; Maj. Joseph J. Foss, Sioux Falls, S. D., 26; Lt. Robert Hanson, Newtonville, Mass., 25. Center, Capt. Kenneth A. Walsh, Washington, D. C., 20; Lt. Col. John L. Smith, Lexington, Okla., 19; Maj. Marion E. Carl, Hubbard, Ore., 18½. Bottom, Lt. William J. Thomas, Martinsburg, W. Va., 16; Capt. James Swett, San Mateo, Calif., 14, and Lt. Harold E. Segal, New York City, 12. Other Marine Corps aces include Capt. Donald Aldrich, Chicago, credited with 20 Jap planes, and Maj. Robert Galer of Seattle who has downed 13. Maj. Boyington and Lt. Hanson are listed as "missing in action."

Scouts And Cubs To Participate in Silver Jubilee Plan

Plans are now being considered by local Boy Scout Troops and Cub Packs to participate in the 1944 "Silver Jubilee" program, during which each unit may hope

to qualify as a Silver Jubilee unit by meeting certain requirements. Details of the program have been received by local Scout leaders from Joe O. Galbraith of Del Rio, Scout Executive of the Ranch district.

The Jubilee program is being staged in honor of James R. Fitch, regional Scout Executive for Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, District Chairman Wayne West of Ozona and District Commissioner J. L. Ball of Sonora are already developing plans to insure participation of all Scout and Cub units in the district in the program, which will mark the beginning of the 25th year of Scouting on a regional basis.

In order to qualify for the Silver Jubilee Troop award, the Scout troop must meet six basic requirements. They are as follows: (1.) At least one half of the troop's membership must advance beyond the Tenderfoot rank. (2.) The troop must engage in at least six troop camps or hikes of 24 hours each, or the equivalent in camp-o-rees, long-term camps and like. (3.) Troop must participate in a troop "good turn" and give reasonable assistance in civic service and official war service projects. (4.) The troop must attain a membership of 25 boys, or this being impossible, gain 25 per cent in membership since the first of the year. (5.) Use a sound finance plan through payment of weekly or monthly dues. (6.) The Scoutmaster or Assistant must complete and he must then conduct a Patrol the Scoutmasters Training course, Leaders' training course for the boy officers.

Parallel requirements are offer-

ed to Cub Packs and Senior Scout units and a suitable award will be made to all units which qualify.
