Scout Leaders Report Progress In Ranch Dist.

Visiting Scouters Entertained by Rotary in Annual Meeting

Progress of Scouting in the Ranch district during the past year was recounted in reports of district officers and Scout leaders at the annual meeting of the group held here Thursday night of last week.

Visiting Scout leaders were guests of the Ozona Rotary Club at a barbecue supper and program in the high school gymnasium preceding the business session.

Reports to the gathering indicated that Boy Scouts of the Ranch district received 671 awards during the year, an increase of 244 over the previous year's total. Other reports indicated growth in all departments of Scouting in the district, a total of 536 men and boys being registered in the movement. The district has 16 Scout and Cub units. The financial statement showed an over-subscription of the objective. Eighty-six certificates in leadership training were issued to Scout and Cub leaders during the year.

Dr. W. H. Elkins, president, of San Angelo College, was the principal speaker of the evening, addressing the assembly on the subject, "Our job in the Conservation of Human Resources."

The meeting opened with the invocation by the Rev. A. A. Carter, pastor of the Methodist Church. A color ceremony was conducted

by Scouts of Troop 53. Guests were present from Eldorado, Sonora, Junction, Rocksprings, London, Menard and Roosevelt. H. C. Grafa, Concho Valley Council Scout Commissioner, and Jack Hodges, council executive, were present from San Angelo.

in any other branch, he declared. Doctors and nurses, too, in the front line hospitals do their job sometimes under direct enemy fire and many of them have been killed while at work, he declared.

An incident in the Tunisian campaign was cited as an example of the heroism of men of the Medical Corps. In the fluid battle early in the North African campaign, an American field hospital, treating both American wounded and wounded enemy prisoners, found itself suddenly surrounded by advancing German forces. There was no let-up in the hospital's routine

—they continued to treat all patients brought in and the next day the advance had been stemmed and the hospital again was behind American lines.

"The Germans on the whole have shown a fairly liberal policy toward the hospitals," he declared. "Of course, there have been incidents in which hospitals have been bombed and shelled, but for the most part they have been spared."

Major Tandy said in this war the American soldier has been given the greatest possible protection by the various inoculations given each soldier as a matter of routine, including anti - tetanus, typhus and typhoid fever, smallpox and other protective inoculations. Tetanus, or lockjaw is almost unknown among wounded soldiers by reason of the efficacy of the inoculation method, the officer declared.

Stationed at a hospital in Naples, Italy, for several months, Major Tandy witnessed the American campaign which eliminated typhus from that city. The American Typhus Control Commission was sent into the Naples area and with the aid of the new, marvelous insect powder, DDT, de-loused the entire Naples population and brought the typhus epidemic under control. During a 30-day period, these workers de-loused an average of 150,000 persons a day, he said. Thanks to inoculations and strict Army care and discipline, not one American soldier was ever stricken with typhus in the infested area, Major Tandy said.

An amusing sidelight on the Naples typhus control campaign was given by the speaker. The Naples children, he said, liked the de-lousing process, in which clothing, hair and body was given a thorough dusting with the insect-killing powder under pressure. Many of the children would slip back in the line after receiving the dusting and be dusted again. Authorities got wise, however, and to save the precious powder, adopted a marking method. A little silver nitrate was brushed on each youngster's ear as he passed through the dusting process and then, if he came back through, the tell-tale black spot on his ear would give him away.

Major Tandy landed soon after the North African invasion at Oran. While supplies of the medical unit were being unloaded from convoy ships, a storm destroyed all of the equipment and the unit was held up several weeks while

new supplies were brought in. From Oran he was sent to Oudja, further inland, where he was stationed for nearly a year. With the invasion of Italy, Major Tandy moved first to Sicily and then to

Naples. Later, he was transferred to Rome and to Leghorn. He left Italy on December 19 to return by boat to the U. S.

Miss Eudora Hawkins, home service director for the West Texas Utilities Co., will be in Ozona at an early date to exhibit a motion picture film demonstration of the proper methods for preparing and storing fruits and vegetables in the frozen foods locker plants, and also to advise Ozona women in making the best use of the facility.

Another demonstration, on the best method for curing pork, is also planned during this month. A representative of the Merton Salt Co. is expected to be here for a day about the middle of this month to conduct the demonstration.

As an adjunct to the locker plant, Mr. Baker announced this week the addition of a full line of Bird's Eye Frosted Foods to be offered for sale. These frozen foods are to be displayed in the locker vault where they will be available for selection by customers.

Handsome trophies were awarded Ozona as tourney champs, McCamey as runner-up, and Iraan for the consolation championship and Barnhart as consolation runner-up. Sterling silver basketballs were awarded members of the first and second string all-tournament teams.

Tournament play got under way at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon with Rankin defeating Rocksprings 26 to 23. Other first-round results were McCamey 24, Iraan, 16; Eldorado 36, Ft. Stockton, 34; Ozona 28, Big Lake, 20, Sonora, 26, Barnhart, 16. Barnhart beat Big Lake 14-13 in a consolation semi-final thriller. Big Lake had trounced Rocksprings 38 to 31 in the quarter final in that bracket. Iraan took Ft. Stockton 17 to 15 to go into the consolation final.

Ozona's volleyball girls dropped an exhibition contest to the Eldorado girls in a free-scoring match thrown in for the customers' enjoyment Saturday afternoon.

The fourteenth annual tourney, pronounced by many the most successful in the history of the meet despite war-time hindrances, was under the direction of Coach Sikes of the host team, with Supt. C. S. Denham lending a hand with many of the details. Former Coach Ted M. White acted as official scorer, Principal Joe Ripple of the Junior High was time keeper and Lefty Walker worked all games as referee.
