Jan. 31 Last Day

The last day of January is the deadline for payment of current taxes without penalty and interest. In order that your tax collector's office might serve you better, and with as little inconvenience as possible, it would be appreciated if you would attend this matter as soon as possible to avoid the rush of the last days.

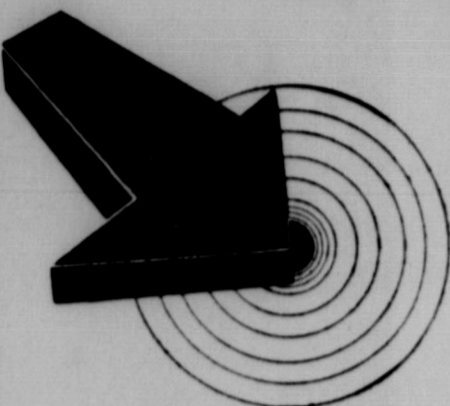

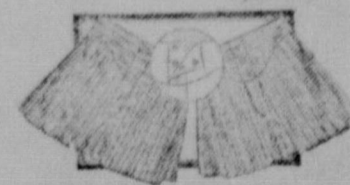

**A Kiss for Carter Glass**



Sen. Carter Glass of Virginia, oldest member of the upper house of congress, shown being kissed by his niece, Miss Nancy Carter Boatwright, on the occasion of his eightieth birthday recently. The elderly statesman insisted on attending the sessions of the senate on his birthday in spite of doctor's orders to the contrary.

This column answers will be open to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

**Q. How did Austin's return to Texas in September 1835 affect the war feeling?**

A. When Austin reached Texas, Sept. 1, the "war party" and "conservatives" were almost at daggers' points, and their many mass meetings were merely intensifying the feeling. At a reception ten days later at Brazoria, Sept. 8, Austin reviewed conditions and recommended a general consultation of delegates with plenary power to adopt such measures as the country might require. This plan modified the feelings of the many who heard him.

**Q. What steps were taken to carry out Austin's suggestion as to a general consultation?**

A. Austin addressed another mass meeting at San Felipe, Sept. 12, again urging a general consultation. His program was adopted there and a committee on "correspondence and vigilance" was appointed composed of Willey Martin, Randall Jones, William Pettus, and Gail Borden, Jr., tentative steps being taken for a consultation at San Felipe, Oct. 15.

**Q. When did General Cos reach San Antonio?**

A. His main army reached there Oct. 7. Enroute he left 30 men, two pieces of artillery, 200 muskets and a quantity of ammunition and supplies at Goliad, all of which were captured on the night of Oct. 9 by a party of Texans under Capt. George Collingsworth.

**Q. When was Austin elected commander-in-chief of the "Volunteer Army of Texas?"**

A. On his arrival at Gonzales, Oct. 11, 1835, he was elected commander-in-chief by a unanimous vote of the various companies assembled there. He was selected because it was believed that this was necessary to preserve the unity of the Texas forces, rather than because of any military qualifications he possessed.

**Q. When and why did Austin resign command of the "Volunteer Army of Texas?"**

A. He resigned and was succeeded by Edward Burleson, Nov. 24, 1835, to go as a commissioner with Dr. Branch T. Archer and William H. Wharton to the United States to enlist aid and sympathy for the Texas revolution, having been selected for that mission by the consultation on Nov. 12, notice of which he received Nov. 18.

**Q. When was the "Battle of Concepcion" fought and what precipitated it?**

A. Austin wished to get his men as close as possible to San Antonio and while camped at Salado Creek about five miles away, he sent a detachment of 92 men under Col. James Bowie and Capt.

James Fannin to select a site closer in for a camp. The expedition camped for the night near Mission Concepcion and on the morning of Oct. 28 found itself surrounded by about 400 Mexicans, whom it engaged in battle, compelling a retreat to San Antonio, with a loss of one Texan and a score or more of Mexicans.

**Q. When did the consultation of 1835 convene at San Felipe, what was its representation and what did it accomplish?**

A. A quorum was obtained Nov. 3 and it was in session until Nov. 14 with a full representation of 81 members from 12 municipalities. Dr. Branch T. Archer was elected chairman. Among the actions taken were: adoption of a declaration of reasons for the meeting; setting up a provisional government with Henry Smith as governor, James T. Robinson, lieu tenant-governor, and a general council of one from each municipality; selection of Sam Houston as Major General of the Armies of Texas and election of commissioners to the United States.

**Q. What action was taken by the consultation of Nov. 14, 1835, as to a Texas Declaration of Independence?**

A. The subject was discussed at length, but it was not deemed

advisable to take immediate action and by a vote of 33 to 15 it was postponed.

**Q. Where was the Old Preston Crossing?**

A. On Red River, northeast of Denison and a little east of the Katy crossing on that river.

**Q. Where was the Old Yellow House Rancho?**

A. The Littlefield rancho in Lamb County was popularly known as Old Yellow House rancho, the name being given it because of the yellow headquarters house.

**Q. When did Austin decide that the time had arrived for Texas to declare its independence?**

A. The fervent reception and support given the Texas commission on its arrival at New Orleans in January 1836, convinced Austin that Texas should at once declare its independence and assert its rights, assured of necessary aid from the people of the United States. He wrote Houston to that effect from New Orleans on January 7.

**Q. Where is the Leona River and where was the Presidio Crossing on that stream?**

A. The Leona River rises on the east side of Green Mountain, twelve miles north of Uvalde and flows south and east 71 miles into the Frio River, through Uvalde, Zavalla and Frio Counties. The old Presidio Crossing was in Frio County.

**Q. What action was taken at the San Felipe "war party" meeting of June 22?**

A. A lengthy address was issued to the people of Coahuila and Texas reciting the wrongs done by the National Government and its military; declaring strongly against the usurpation of the rights of the people; and pledging allegiance to both the Federal and State Constitutions, but declaring that they would fight to the last man to maintain their rights. A committee of vigilance, correspondence and safety was appointed, composed of W. D. C. Hall, J. A. Wharton, W. H. Jock, J. G. McNeil and G. B. McKinstry.

**Q. What was the immediate effect of the capture of the Anahuac fort by the Texans?**

A. There was much criticism on the part of the "conservatives" who regarded the action as premature. Meetings were called throughout Texas to unify the people and

much discussion followed. Conserved to pacify the people by saying that troops were needed to enforce collection of customs and maintain the peace and security of the citizens. "Conservatives" were inclined to accept this statement, while the "war party" reminded them of the massing of forces and munitions in Mexico, evidently to invade Texas.

## GAME ROOM OFFERS ORIGINALITY CHANCE

Recreation-room decoration offers a wide opportunity for color and design display not suitable to other rooms of the home.

White walls or light tints are frequently favored as they form an attractive background for bright trim such as electric blue, spring green, lacquer red, with floors of terra cotta, gray, brown, or dark green.

The variety of design and color possibilities for the decoration of these play rooms is practically unlimited. Some walls are painted in striking manner — one with a white picket fence around the bottom, was covered with garden scenes to a long vista beyond. Another was painted to resemble a ship with railing around the sides and the blue and green waves in the distance, white clouds seemed to float against an azure sky. Flying fish and birds were seen in the distance. Deck furniture was used to sustain the illusion.

## FLOORS CLEANED FIRST TAKE FINISH BETTER

The first thing to be done to wood floors that are to be refin-

ished is to clean them thoroughly with a solution of lye. Then any ridges or rough places should be scraped down and a stain applied.

If the flooring is edge grained the stain should be combined with a filler, and after that the wax may be applied direct. Generally about three coats are necessary, as it is quickly absorbed by the wood. Shellac or floor varnish may be used before the wax, if desired.

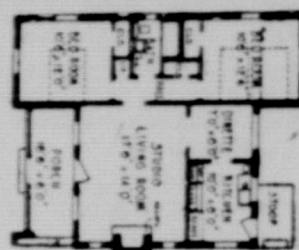
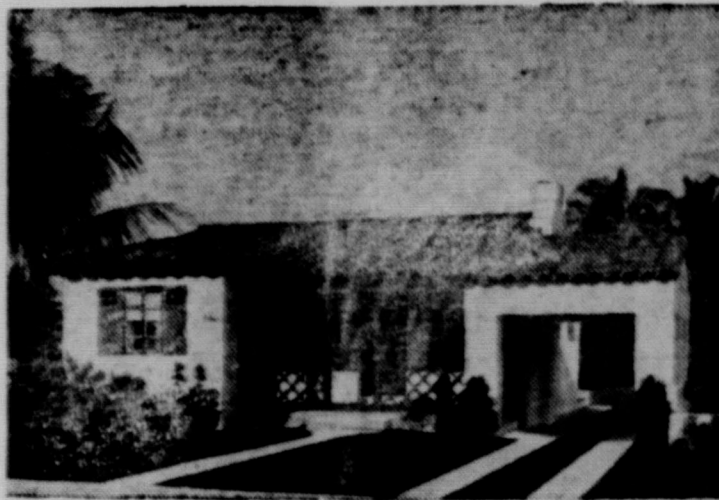
## Consider Future Building

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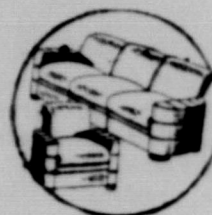
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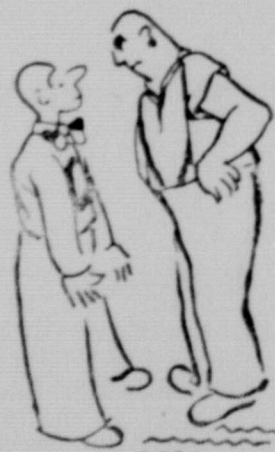
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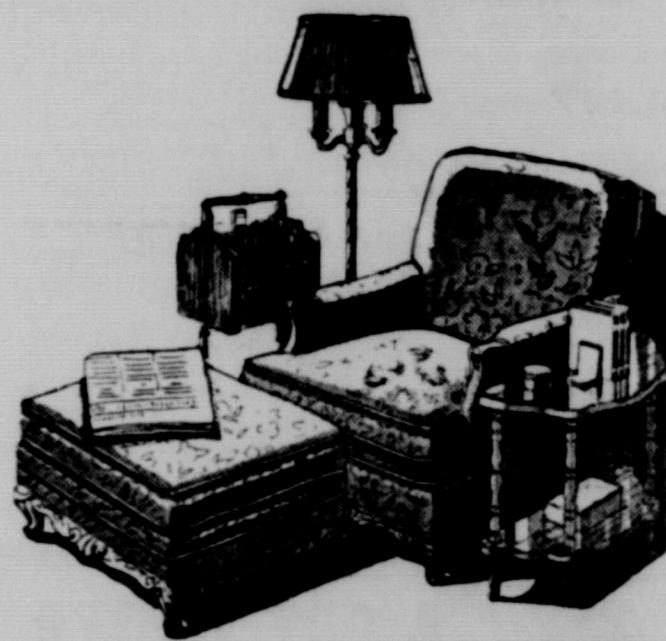

## FLOORS CLEANED FIRST TAKE FINISH BETTER

The first thing to be done to wood floors that are to be refin-

ished is to clean them thoroughly with a solution of lye. Then any ridges or rough places should be scraped down and a stain applied.

If the flooring is edge grained the stain should be combined with a filler, and after that the wax may be applied direct. Generally about three coats are necessary, as it is quickly absorbed by the wood. Shellac or floor varnish may be used before the wax, if desired.

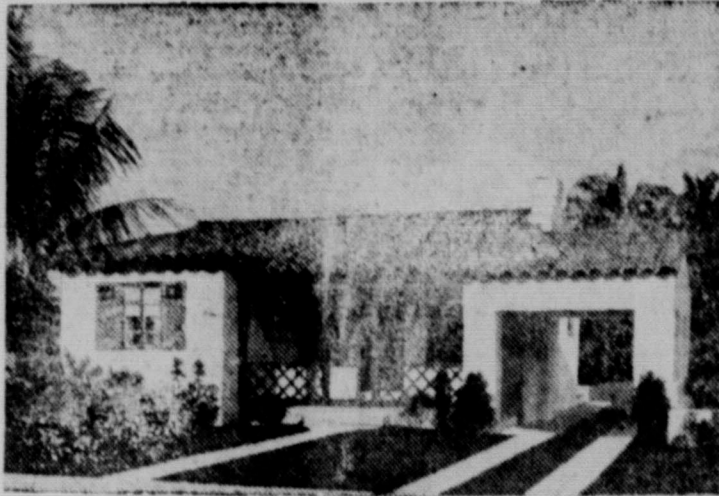
## Consider Future Building

### 36 Million To Texas Farmers, Ranchers On 1937 Soil Program

College Station, Jan 19 — Payments under the terms of the 1937 Agricultural Conservation Program are being made in considerable volume, according to Geo. Slaughter, Wharton, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee.

The conservation program terminated two months later than was the case in 1936 when the final date for compliance was October 31. Farmers had until December 31 to carry out conservation practices in 1937.

First payments went to farmers in Brazos, Morris, and Jasper counties, Slaughter said. The state AAA office on the campus of Texas A. & M. College is auditing 2,000 applications for grants a day, and is equipped to handle as many as 3,000 a day is the volume received from the field justifies.

In spite of the fact that the compliance date fell two months later, the program as a whole is further along than in 1936, according to Slaughter. He pointed out that 167 counties had been approved for final adjustment as compared with 52 on the same date in 1937, and that some 99,000 applications for grant have been typed and returned to the counties. On the same date in 1937, this figure stood at 36,000.

The fact that the expenses of administering the program within the counties must be deducted from the payments going to farmers makes it impossible to make payments to any one county until at least 75 per cent of the applications from that county have been received by the state office.
