Eldorado-Ozona Games Meet on Neutral Ground

Grudge Battle Slated Sunday at 3 on Sonora Diamond

It's going to be a grudge battle on neutral ground with the Eldorado and Ozona independent baseball teams meeting on the Sonora diamond Sunday. The two teams have met three times this season, two of them in Eldorado and one in Ozona. The Ozona team has been one game for Ozona—played in Ozona—and one for Eldorado—played in Eldorado. Umpiring has been unsatisfactory to the losing team in each instance and the issue is going to be settled next Sunday afternoon with the teams matched on neutral territory and using neutral umpires.

That's the setting for what promises to be a bang up ball game on the Sonora diamond beginning at 3 o'clock next Sunday afternoon. Manager Byron Stuart expects to have a full squad on hand for the contest and if he does, has no fear of the outcome.

The Ozona squad had an even game with Eldorado Sunday, three or four regulars being unable to make the trip. The mostly high school boys in line-up, the locals were nosed by a one-point margin, 6 to 5. Eldoradoans hanging in the running run in the last half of the ninth. Hits were evenly divided by two teams, eight each. Jack Griffin and Jack Griffin did the hitting chore for Eldorado and Maxwell went all the way for Ozona.

Two Alpine teams will furnish competition for the Ozonians for the next three weeks after next Sunday. Manager Stuart announced on Sunday, July 28, the Ozonians to go to Alpine for a game with the Alpine Gold Sox and on August 4 the Alpine Cowboys, hot prospect team which the locals conquered at Kokernot Field recently, will be in Ozona for a rematch. On the following Sunday, August 11, the Gold Sox will return to Ozona for a return match on Ozona's diamond.

Efforts are being made by the local management to match a game with some team of the Concho Basin league and have gone further and invited Blondy of the Standard-Times to bring an all-star team from the Basin for a contest with the locals.

The Council discusses possibilities of securing improvement

The committee reported at the Sunday night meeting of the Council that information is now being gathered by the group and a conference with officials of the San Angelo Telephone Co. in San Angelo is to be sought in the near future for the purpose of discussing the plan.

Several communities the size of Ozona served by the San Angelo phone in this area have recently been changed over to the dial system. It is understood, and members of the Council are seeking information on the possibilities of an improvement here.

Magazine Article On Atomic Warfare Is Reviewed For Rotary

A review of the Saturday Evening Post article, "You Should Tremble," a report from a committee of War Department investigators of the strategic position of the United States with reference to defense against the atomic bomb, was given by Richard Flowers at the Rotary Club luncheon Tuesday noon.

The magazine article gave a resume of the speculative report of the War Department investigators who summed up their findings in the statement that this nation's only defense against the atomic bomb is a political defense. The terrible implications of possible atomic warfare, the possibility that half of the population of this country might be wiped out in the first minutes of such an attack, and the extreme measures which must be adopted for mere physical defense, were outlined in the report.

Ozona Veteran Is Buyer at Surplus Motor Vehicle Sale

FORT WORTH (Special)—The sale of surplus motor vehicles held Monday by War Assets Administration at Fort Worth Army Air Field was the most successful of the entire series of similar sales recently held, according to Hamilton Morton, WAA regional director. One Ozona veteran was listed among Monday's purchasers as a principal. Samuel A. Fowler, P. O. Box 4, purchased a one and one-half ton truck for \$764.00. He plans to use his truck in connection with farming.

Contact representative for the Veterans Administration, Ciro B. Ramirez, will be in Ozona, Wednesday, July 24, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon at the courthouse in the County Agents office to interview veterans and the dependents in regards to any claims and benefits relative to the Veterans Administration.

Veterans who may have problems are urged to contact Mr. Ramirez for assistance in filing such claims.

It is especially urged that veterans who have allowed their National Service Life Insurance to lapse, to see Mr. Ramirez, because under new legislation, said insurance may be reinstated very easily. This feature is very beneficial now that lump sum payments may be made instead of the monthly payments.

Mr. Ramirez will assist the veterans and dependents in filing claims such as: Hospitalization, Medical Care, Education, On-the-Job Training, Pensions, Insurance Claims and Reinstatements, Burial Allowances and any other claims that come under the jurisdiction of the Veterans Administration.

Hospital Plan To Be Discussed At Commission Meet

Community Council Committee to Meet Commissioners

That the issue of the proposed county hospital for Ozona is still a much alive one became apparent this week with announcement from the Community Council that a committee from that body, named at a recent meeting to further the hospital planning, will seek an audience with the Commissioners Court at its next meeting for the purpose of discussing with that body the hospital plan.

The council, together with members of the court, have had under consideration recently a plan for converting the old Methodist Church building into a combined county office building and 17 to 19 bed hospital. Architect's plans for the reconverted structure have been submitted to the Commissioners and the citizenship for consideration, the plans being so drawn that the present skeleton of the old church building, left standing after the fire which destroyed the property in 1942, will be utilized to best advantage and a new building erected at a minimum cost.

Architects have estimated the construction costs, on the basis of the plans as submitted, at \$67,000. Whether this figure is high or low, whether or not changes in the plans are necessary, the best method of financing the project if it is found acceptable to the people and possible of realization and the best plans of operation of the hospital if and when it is built, are questions which are up for study on the part of the Community Council and county officials.

That Ozona is in desperate need of hospital facilities and has been through all its history, and more especially so now with its rapidly growing population, is recognized by community leaders who are fostering consideration of the new plan. Belief that residents of the county will support a bond issue for the purpose of building a hospital and the badly needed court house annex if a suitable plan can be worked out and construction costs found not exorbitant, is expressed by these leaders and their study is pointed toward assembling all necessary facts for presentation to the people.

Dickey Succeeds Red Woodard as Day Deputy Sheriff

"Effective July 1, J. C. Woodard will not be on the sheriff's force for further service," Sheriff Frank James announced this week.

2 Resignations, 3 Employed, Score In Teacher Hunt

Four Positions Re- main Unfilled, Den- ham Reports

Two resignations and three new contracts signed was the score this week in the summer search for teacher talent to complete the faculty of Ozona Public School system for opening of the 1946-47 term in September, Supt. C. S. Denham reported this week on his return from the latest of his jaunts over the state in an effort to fill staff vacancies.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Christian, previously announced as having accepted positions in the local system, last week asked that their contracts be cancelled in order that they might accept positions elsewhere. Mr. Christian had accepted the post as teacher of math and science in the Latin-American school and Mrs. Christian was assigned the post of language arts teacher in Junior High School.

Three positions have been filled in the past week. Mr. Denham reported, the kindergarten, high school English and language arts in Junior High school.

Mrs. Green Mankin of Ozona, who taught two years in the local system, has accepted the position as kindergarten teacher. Mrs. Mankin is a graduate of Texas State College for Women at Denton.

Miss Mary Alma Wells of Lubbock, who has had twelve years of teaching experience, has been employed as high school English teacher, the superintendent announced. Miss Wells has taught English for the past twelve years in Olton High School. She is a graduate of Howard Payne College where she took her bachelor's degree and was graduated from Texas Tech in Lubbock with the Master of Arts degree, majoring in English. Miss Wells may teach one class in speech in high school in addition to English, Mr. Denham said.

For the post of language arts in Junior High school Miss Mary Pearl McWilliams of Menard has been employed. Miss McWilliams is a graduate of Texas State College for Women at Denton, receiving her B. A. degree in June of this year. She has had no teaching experience but did practice work during her college years in social work with the Children's Bureau of Dallas.

Four teaching posts in the local system are yet unfilled, Supt. Denham announced. These are first grade, public school music, band and mathematics and science in the Latin-American school. One applicant for the band teaching post has accepted on condition that housing will be available and his employment will hinge on completion of the new teacher housing unit, work on which is under way.

Although the sheriff's department is willing to make an effort to apprehend such swindlers, it is sometimes difficult to find them once they are out of town, and the sheriff urges all business houses to require positive identification before cashing checks for strangers.

Fourteen Pupils Complete Life Saving Training

Three Qualify As In- structors In Swim- ming, Life Saving

Fourteen Ozona young people completed the life saving and water safety course offered by the American Red Cross and conducted here last week by Edwin C. Cram of Prescott, Iowa, field representative of the Red Cross in first aid, water safety and accident prevention.

Three of the group who qualified as to age and swimming ability were able to complete the training course and qualified for Red Cross instruction in swimming and life saving. These were Robert C. Haynie, Swimming pool manager, and Misses Mary Elizabeth Gray and Barbara White. These three are now qualified to teach classes in swimming and diving and in life saving, class members who complete such a course being eligible to receive Red Cross certificates and emblems. Such courses, free of charge, are planned at the pool this summer if enough pupils are interested.

Seven pupils qualified as junior life savers and one as senior life saver. Three in the junior group completed the training course but were too young to qualify for certificates.

John Fussell received the senior life saving certificate and junior certificates will go to Joe Albert Brown, James Carter, Frankie Chapman, Tommy Laxson, Ray Piner, Judy White and Albert Yancy. Completing the course but too young to qualify were Sellers Laxson, Billy B. Smith and Eddie Louis Smith. Seven others enrolled at the start of the class but dropped out.

County Tax Rate Upped 10 Cents; Schools 45 Cents

School Maintenance Levy Raise Approved By County Voters

A net raise of 55 cents on the \$100 valuation in the combined county and school tax rate for 1946 will be reflected in the tax bills of Crockett county property owners at tax paying time next fall.

A net hike of 45 cents in the taxes for support of the schools and of 10 cents for county purposes was made when the Commissioners Court set levies for the year at its July meeting.

School maintenance tax levy was raised from 50 cents to \$1.00 on the \$100 valuation in accordance with the wishes of the people expressed in a recent election in the county on the question of raising the school maintenance levy from a maximum of 50 cents to \$1.00. However, a cut of 5 cents from the high school bond sinking fund levy, from 20 cents last year to 15 cents, made a net raise of only 45 cents in the school tax.

The total county levy was set at 80 cents on the \$100 against 70 cents last year, the raise being made in the first class, or jury fund, from 5 cents last year to 15 cents this year, for the purpose of rebuilding this depleted fund. The total school levy was raised from 75 cents last year to \$1.20 this year, making a total combined county and school tax levy of \$2.00 against \$1.45 last year.

Predictions made by Governor Coke Stevenson in Austin this week that the state ad valorem tax levy would be reduced to the constitutional minimum of 37 cents from the present 72 cents, however, gives promise of a considerable cushioning of the blow to local taxpayers. If the 37-cent rate is set when the automatic tax board meets in Austin Monday, the state reduction of 35 cents will leave the Crockett county taxpayers with a net raise of only 20 cents from the rate in effect last year. A surplus in state funds is given as the reason for the prospective sharp drop in the state rate.

Crockett county voters in an election held here in the Spring approved the 50-cent raise in school maintenance levy for the purpose of meeting increased costs in the operation of the public school system here and to retire an indebtedness that had been built up gradually because of a shortage of funds resulting from the inadequate tax levy. The new rate is expected to provide a return adequate to meet present operating costs.

Crockett Lambs Top Fort Worth Market At 18 Cents Pound

Lambs from Crockett county topped the Fort Worth market at a new high for the season Monday. Mrs. A. W. Clayton and Early Chandler topped the market for the day with lambs which sold for 18 cents a pound.

Mrs. Clayton had 215 head which averaged 66 pounds and Chandler had 640 head that averaged 67 pounds. They brought nearly \$12 a head. Boyd Clayton of Ozona had 330 head of lambs that weighed 61 pounds and brought 17 cents a pound.

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Personal Hygiene Urged as Precaution Against Polio Spread

AUSTIN. — In addition to the general instructions for community sanitation which are important in preventing poliomyelitis, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent warning to every person in Texas to practice strict personal hygiene to protect his own health and that of those about him. "Of course, cleanliness and personal hygiene are ordinarily taken for granted," Dr. Cox said, "but at this time with the incidence of poliomyelitis having reached a total of 292 cases, I would like to re-emphasize some personal sanitary measures which may help in preventing the spread of this crippling and often fatal disease."

The State Health Officer stressed the importance of scrupulous cleanliness of the person. Frequent bathing and immaculately clean clothing are vitally necessary. Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic are recommended. The nasal passages should be kept clean and dental defects corrected immediately.

Sanitation and thorough cleanliness in the home are instinctive with the average housewife, but at this time their importance to health must be re-emphasized. Home sanitation includes those taken-for-granted measures such

as washing the dishes in hot soapy water and rinsing them in hot, clear water; keeping sinks, bathtubs and fixtures scoured clean and rinsed with a mild antiseptic solution; sunning and airing bed clothes, ridding the home of flies, rats and roaches which, since poliomyelitis is believed to be a filth-borne disease, are suspected as being responsible for transmission.

"If good personal hygiene is combined with good community sanitation and hygiene, it is hard for any disease to get a foothold," Dr. Cox said, "With such a dread disease as poliomyelitis prevalent in the state, no precaution should be overlooked and no bars should be left down for its entrance."

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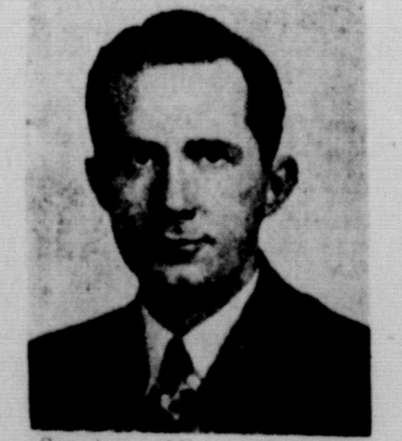

At the present time, the sheriff's office has the best organization of capable personnel that it has had for several years and I would like to keep them operating smoothly for another two-year term.

I believe with three years experience, the above qualifications and records that I am capable of doing a good job in the approaching term and guarantee the same honesty and efficiency in handling the tax collections.

May I say again I will appreciate your vote and support and will consider it an honor to be elected for a third term by a good people in a good town and county.

Sugar Rationing Still in Force, Says District OPA Head

"All phases of sugar rationing program are still in force," Cal C. Straughan, sugar rationing officer for the San Antonio area, said today.

"Reports indicate that there is considerable misunderstanding on the part of consumers and industrial users concerning the status of sugar rationing during the hiatus period of price control, and that some dealers are selling sugar without collecting the ration points. This is a violation, and is subject to all penalties of the Sec-

ond War Powers Act," Straughan explained.

This act, Straughan said, was extended to March 31, 1947, by Congress, and this extension was signed by the president on Saturday of last week. The president issued an executive order on June 30 that specifically directed OPA to continue to perform all functions relating to sugar rationing.

The highway marking system is explained with illustrations and there is a column of miscellaneous facts about the nation's largest state.

Shown also are the state and national parks, some of the old Missions, and other points of historical interest. Twenty-six color pictures, which will be changed in each subsequent edition, depict typical Texas scenes.

Austin Bar Endorses Judge Smedley for Supreme Court Post

AUSTIN. — A strong recommendation and endorsement of the candidacy of Associate Justice Graham B. Smedley for an elective term on the Texas Supreme Court has been registered by members of the Travis County Bar.

The endorsement was regarded as highly significant, inasmuch as

the 127 Travis county lawyers who signed it have had the best opportunity to observe the judicial career of Judge Smedley at close hand.

"Judge Smedley's record as a member of the Commission of Appeals and later as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court attests the fact that he is one of the ablest judges that ever served on the court," the endorsement declared.

The former Fort Worth attorney rose to the Supreme Court after an outstanding legal career which included service as Midland County Attorney, six years as an assistant attorney general, many years of private law practice, and 10 years as presiding judge of

Section B of the Supreme Court Commission of Appeals.

Judge Smedley was promoted to voting membership on the high court last September by the adoption of the constitutional amendment which created a nine-member Supreme Court.

Following his service as Midland County Attorney and a period of private law practice, Judge Smedley was appointed an assistant

attorney general by Attorney General B. F. Looney in 1913. He was given charge of all the State's litigation pertaining to school lands, oil and gas rights, irrigation and kindred subjects.
