Clothing, Money Taken in Burglary Morrison Store

Plate Glass Door Is Smashed by Intruder To Gain Entry

A bold burglar who gained enon Store here Saturday night.

The heavy plate glass in the door was smashed with some heavy instrument, fragments of the glass scattering over half the front part of the store. It is believed that the intruder muffled the blow on the glass and the sound of falling glass was mostly confined to the inside of the building. The inset entry way into the building was dark and the screen doors on the outside served as a screen to permit the burglar to go about his work of breaking in without detection.

An undetermined number of work pants and shirts were taken from the store's stock and all the change in two cash registers was pilfered. J. C. Gay, store manager, said that he had been unable to determine whether or not any other items of stock had been taken. Eight khaki work shirts were left on the floor near the front door of the store, probably that much more than could be packed in the suitcase or whatever other container the burglar used. The intruder left by the front door, through the same hole in the door

by which he gained entry The burglar revealed himself

Officers believe they know the identity of the burglar and are working on several leads.






