### Dogs Available; Stray Dogs by Sheriff

In an effort to reduce the number of stray dogs in Ozona, a drive will be held at once by the Sheriff's department through enforcement of the dog license law of the state and destruction of unlicensed dogs which are allowed to run at large.

A copy of the new 1949 license law has been received by the Sheriff's department. All dog owners are urged to purchase license tags at once. The license tags are for sale at the Sheriff's office. Dogs not registered, and dogs not permitted to run at large through the town, at least one owner will be given a citation to prevent the dog from running the town.

A reasonable length of time will be required, during which dogs will be expected to be registered and a campaign to rid the town of stray dogs will be instituted by the Sheriff's department.

### Ranchers to Elect 1949 ACA Committee In December Voting

Beginning December 9, Crockett county ranchmen will have an opportunity to elect committeemen to administer to the 1949 Agricultural Conservation program in this county, Miss Mary E. White, secretary of the Crockett County A. C. A. announced this week. Every eligible rancher should vote in the election, Miss White urged. Eligible farmers and ranchmen who fail to vote in these elections are not carrying their share of the responsibility for good administration of the farm program, she declared. Eligible farmers are those who have participated in the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program.

Ballots will be mailed to every eligible rancher in the county, including their wives, who are also eligible to vote. The marked ballots must be returned to the Crockett county office not later than 5 p. m. December 17, 1948, Miss White said. "Through these committeemen, farmers have a direct channel to those who administer the programs in the state and in the nation," the secretary pointed out. "It is up to the ranchers of Crockett county to see that committeemen are elected who can best administer the program and who understand local problems. Don't forget to vote."

### Sun to Drill Shallow Wildcat in Western Crockett

Sun Oil Co. Friday filed application for a permit to drill a 2,300-foot, cable tool wildcat in western Crockett county, about 4 1/2 miles west of the Clara Couch field.

The test will be No. 1 Half-Bivins estate, 330 from the south, 3,675.8 feet from the east line of section 53-1-1&GN, on a 2,640-acre lease. It is due to start Nov. 17. Ground elevation is 2,440 feet.

The Barbees have sold their home in Fort Stockton and are moving to Ozona. H. Q. Lyles of Fort Stockton has purchased the residence.

The Ozona business has capacity for 1,500,000 pounds.

Polly Wells of Sonora and Mr. Wells assured him that no damage whatever had been done to the Sonora school.

"Our students are not the kind who would do anything of that sort, even had they not been supervised," Mr. McIntosh said. "The ones who have heard this rumor may be assured that it is altogether unfounded."

### Highway Wrecks Claim Three Lives Here Saturday

### Five Others Seriously Hurt; One Hurt in 3rd Accident Monday

Three persons are dead and six others were seriously injured in a rash of highway accidents near Ozona last Saturday and Monday.

Almost simultaneously single-car accidents, both on highway 290, one 12 miles west of Ozona and the other 12 miles east, in mid-afternoon Saturday claimed three lives and resulted in injury to five others. A third accident Monday afternoon about 25 miles south of Ozona on Highway 163 resulted in serious injury to one man and minor injuries to another, a passenger in the same car.

Mrs. Dee Shaw Saunders, 28, wife of M. Sgt. Harold Saunders, Jr., of Sonora, was instantly killed about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon when the 1941 Mercury coach she was driving went out of control and crashed into a bridge 12 miles west of Ozona.

Cynthia Ann Saunders, the couple's 5-months-old daughter died on the road from Ozona to San Angelo where she was being taken for hospitalization. The child was given first aid here and rushed by private car to San Angelo but died a few miles out of Ozona. She had suffered a head injury.

The car was a complete wreck. It crashed head-on into the bridge the concrete pillar being driven through the motor to the floor boards. The car came to a sudden stop without turning over. Mrs. Saunders being pinned in the front seat of the car. Mr. Saunders who suffered a compound fracture of the left leg and shoulder injuries, was thrown half way through the windshield. The baby, riding in a crib in the back of the car, was thrown forward.

Sgt. Saunders, of Williams Field, Ariz., Mrs. Saunders and the baby, were on their way to Sonora for a visit with Sgt. Saunders parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Saunders, and other relatives. He was flown in a Goodfellow Field plane to the base hospital there, where his condition is reported satisfactory.

Sgt. Saunders is a brother of Allan Saunders, Ozona nurseryman. Funeral services for Mrs. Saunders and Cynthia Ann were held in Sonora.

In the wreck east of Ozona, which occurred at about the same time as that west of town, Robert Shaheen, 28, of Compton, Calif., was fatally injured, and four other occupants of a 1948 Oldsmobile convertible were seriously injured when the car went out of control and overturned several times. The car was proceeding west and is believed to have skidded on the wet pavement.

Shaheen died in a San Angelo hospital late in the afternoon after being taken from here to that city in a Ratliff ambulance.

Mr. and Mrs. John Cora of South Gate, Calif., and their five-year-old son, John Anthony, were seriously injured in the wreck. Mrs. Shaheen was also injured, but less seriously than the others. The Cora boy remained in a critical condition in a San Angelo hospital for several days but is now believed improving.

Dr. H. B. Tandy had gone to the scene of the Saunders wreck when the five injured persons were brought from the wreck east of town. Mrs. Roy Thompson and Mrs. Chas. Williams, Jr., registered nurses, administered first aid and cared for the injured until the doctor returned. Dr. Royce W. Pruett, who had been attending a post (Continued on Last Page)

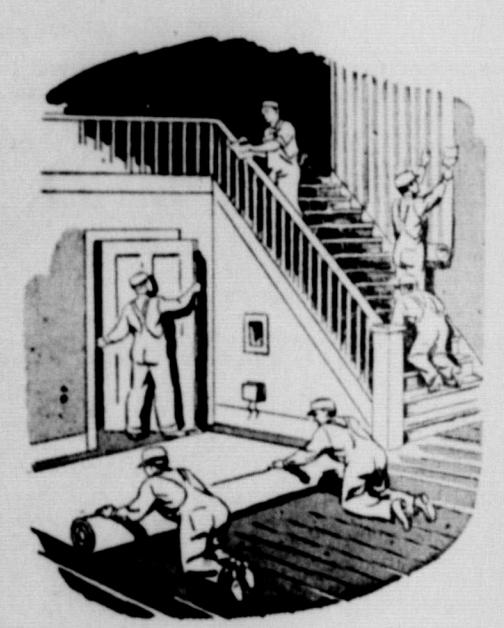

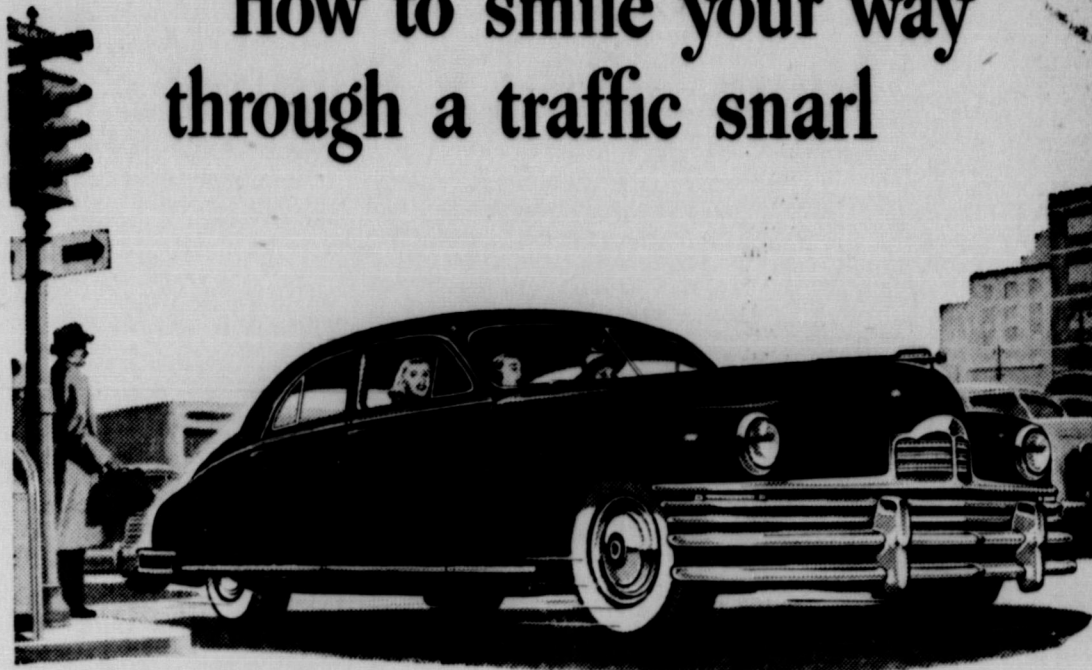

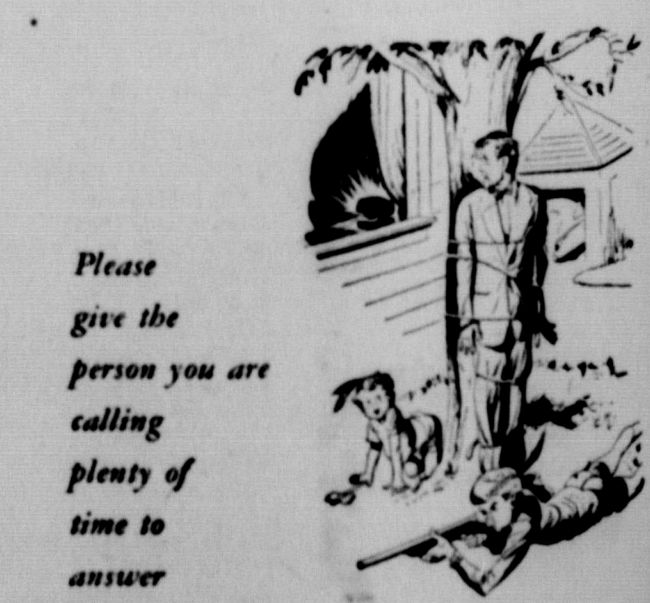
