## For 16th Congress Seat In Off Spotlight

### Ken Regan, Paul Waging Spirited Campaign

Ken Regan, Paul Moss, district judge, is seeking to unseat Regan. The two are waging a three-way first primary to battle it out in the race.

Regan returned to Ozona last week to begin his campaign for re-election. Moss had been in the woods with large advertisements in papers at the district. Regan, Moss and Paul Perner, announced he had returned to Ozona "not to defend himself but to throw a few punches of his own," immediately beginning a radio advertising and campaigning in the district.

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## No Change in Tax Rate for County and Schools This Year

Crockett county taxpayers will pay county and school taxes at the same rate this year as last.

The 1950 tax rates were fixed by the Commissioners Court at a total of \$2.46 for county and school purposes, the same as that for last year.

The tax levy for school purposes is \$1.50 on the \$100. Of this amount, \$1 is for maintenance and 50 cents for retirement of outstanding building bonds, 25 cents for the old high school and South Elementary construction bonds and 25 cents for the new building bonds, including the north elementary, south elementary addition, football field, gymnasium, teacherages, etc.

The county levy was set at 95 cents again this year. This levy is 15 cents above the constitutional limit, accounted for by the fact that voters in this county several years ago approved a special 15-cent road and bridge levy, in addition to the existing 15-cent levy for that purpose.

The county tax rate is divided into 15 cents for the jury fund, 30 cents for road and bridge fund, 25 cents for the general fund and 25 cents for the permanent fund. The permanent fund levy is made up of 4 cents for courthouse bond retirement, 3 cents for the county park maintenance and 18 cents for the courthouse fund, to pay expenses and maintenance of the courthouse.

## Mrs. Ella Casbeer Appointed To Fill Unexpired Term

### Widow of Veteran Treasurer to Fill Of- fice Until Jan. 1

Mrs. Ella Casbeer, widow of the late J. Tom Casbeer, who was serving in his 44th year as treasurer of Crockett county when he died July 21, will serve out the remaining five months of her late husband's term in office.

Mrs. Casbeer was appointed by the Crockett County Commissioners Court at its August session Monday to serve out the unexpired portion of her husband's term. The new treasurer's bond was approved and she was officially sworn into office Monday. She will serve until January 1, 1951, when a new term begins.

Mr. Casbeer was renominated without opposition in the July primary. He had been re-elected to the position without opposition for the past 20 years.

Mrs. Casbeer has indicated that she will not be a candidate for nomination for the office in the Democratic executive committee's "ballot poll" to be taken during the run-off primary August 26. The candidate receiving a plurality of votes in that special election will be certified by the Democratic committee for a place on the general election ballot.

## Vaughan and World Pools in Crockett County Get Producers

H. L. Hunt No. 4 Shannon estate in the Vaughan (San Andres) field in Crockett county has been completed on the pump in 12 hours, rating 190.46 barrels of 27.5 gravity, pipeline oil daily.

Production was from open hole between 1,385 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 1,400 feet, the total depth. The section was acidized with 1,500 gallons. With elevation 2,636 feet, the pumper is 330 from south, 1,590 feet from west line of the lease in section 2-400-Mrs. Oglesby Blk. A-3 survey.

Pumping 144 barrels of 29 gravity oil plus two per cent water in 24 hours, Stantotex No. 13-3 Shannon estate has been completed in the World field. Production was from open hole between 2,402 feet where 7-inch casing was set, and 2,527 feet, the total depth. With derrick floor elevation 2,635 feet, the pumper is 330 from north, 1,065 feet from east line of the lease in section 42-BB-EL&RR.

Jimmy Cunningham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Cunningham of Ozona, now serving in the United States Navy, has been ordered to service in the Far East, his parents have learned. Young Cunningham has been on shore duty in Hawaii and was to have sailed for Far Eastern duty the middle of this week.

## Incendiarism Thought Origin Of Grass Fires

### Five Separate Blazes On South Highway Extinguished Sun.

Five grass fires, burning almost simultaneously, along Highway 163 south of Ozona last Sunday, are believed to have been of incendiary origin.

The first fires were discovered by Early Baggett near his ranch home on the highway 12 miles south of Ozona. He extinguished three separate blazes and later learned that a passing motorist had extinguished two other fires farther south along the road, all on the east side of the highway.

When the series of blazes were discovered, an alarm was sent to the local Volunteer Fire Department and one of the tank pumper trucks made a run to the scene. Mr. Baggett and ranch hands had put out the blaze with a power spraying machine before the fire truck arrived. A check was made by firemen on all fired spots to be sure all embers had been extinguished.

Mr. Baggett pursued for several miles a car which he believed carried the arsonist. Having reason to suspect the passing car, Mr. Baggett set out in pursuit in his pick-up but was soon outdistanced by the speeding car, traveling in the direction of Ozona. Mr. Baggett was driving a new pick-up and was unable to continue the race for fear of overheating the new motor.

Another grass fire Sunday on the W. E. Friend, Jr., ranch at the east edge of Ozona was brought under control with only slight damage. Origin of this blaze was unknown.

## W. M. Stoker Awarded M. A. from Baylor U. at Summer Exercises

WACO, Texas. — Winfred Morris Stoker, principal of South Elementary School of Ozona will be among the 380 students to receive degrees from Baylor University in summer commencement exercises Thursday evening, August 17.

President W. R. White announced that the graduates form the largest summer class in Baylor history. An assortment of 15 different degrees are listed. Ninety-three of the group will receive master's degrees.

Speaker for the commencement will be Rev. James N. Morgan, popular Fort Worth pastor and Baptist denominational leader. He will receive the honorary degree of doctor of divinity.

Mr. Stoker is a candidate for the Master of Arts.

## Oldies No Longer Need Report to Draft Boards

AUSTIN. — Some men registered under the World War II draft act, now past 40 and 50 years of age, are trying to advise old local boards of changes of address and status, although these draft boards have been out of existence for years.

As a result, these cards and letters are flooding present local boards and Selective Service headquarters here.

Brigadier general Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, advised today that "these men no longer have to advise of any change of address or status, as the law under which they registered was terminated by Congress in 1947."

The only men who are obliged to keep local draft boards advised are those registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948, which became law on June 24, 1948, the state director pointed out.

## County To Make War On Open Toilets In City

### Action Promised after Survey of City Is Completed

War was declared on open toilets in Ozona by the Crockett County Commissioners Court when that body met in regular August session Monday at the courthouse.

The court gave considerable time to a discussion of the local situation and means for eliminating open toilets in the city, termed one of the worst health menaces in the community. Dr. H. B. Tandy, county health officer met with the court at its request and advised with members on plans for eliminating the toilets.

A committee from the court was named by Judge Houston Smith to make a complete survey of the city to determine how many of such toilets are in use, secure name and owners of property on which they are used, and to study a plan for ridding the city of these unsanitary spots.

After the survey has been made, the matter will be considered again by the court at its September meeting and steps will be taken at that time to force property owners to eliminate the open toilets.

It was estimated that there are still approximately 100 open toilets in the Latin-American sector of Ozona, in spite of the fact that new sewer mains have been laid to make sewer service available to every house in the area. Other open toilets are to be found in the Negro section and a few even in this section of the city, the commissioners were informed.

## One Candidate On File To Date For Treasurer's Post

### Mrs. Bill Adams First To File on Demo Bal- lot for Nomination

One lone candidate, Mrs. Bill Adams, had filed for a place on the quasi-official ballot to be used in the run-off primary election on August 26 to determine the people's choice to guide the county Democratic executive committee in naming the party's nominee for county treasurer in the general election in November.

Mrs. Adams had filed her name as a candidate with Charles Ratliff, acting as secretary of the county committee, following announcement of the committee's plan to poll the public before certifying a nominee. To the close of the day Wednesday, hers was the only name on file.

Rumors were making the rounds of the down town area, however, and a number of names were being suggested as possible candidates in the novel "election." Several are known to be considering the move.

Potential candidates who desire to enter the race for the party nomination have until the close of the business day next Saturday to make up their minds. The Democratic executive committee designated Charles Ratliff of Ratliff Hardware & Furniture Co. as member to receive applications for a place on the ballot and those who seek a chance at the office may file their names with no filing fee attached, any time between now and next Saturday.

The novel "ballot poll" was decided upon by the Democratic committee at a meeting last Saturday, called by Chairman Lowell Littleton. Death July 31 of Tom Casbeer, veteran Crockett county treasurer, who was nominated without opposition in the July primary, left the county democratic committee with the responsibility of selecting a nominee for the general election ballot, under the law.

Committee members, disliking the prospect of shouldering the entire responsibility of choosing a candidate, decided to let the voters themselves do the choosing.

Consequently, the unofficial "election" for a county treasurer will be held simultaneously with the run-off primary on August 26. Separate ballots will be prepared bearing the names of all aspirants who give notice of their candidacy before next Saturday night, August 19. These ballots will be handed all voters, along with the regular official ballot, at the run-off election and the candidate receiving the highest number of votes will be certified by the committee as the party nominee in the November election.

## Nacodoches Operator Proposes Wildcat Test 16 Miles West of Ozona

C. S. Jones of Nacodoches has filed application for permit to drill a Crockett county wildcat 16 miles west of Ozona.

His No. 1-F University, projected to 2,000 feet with cable tools, will be 2,310 feet from south, 330 feet from west line of section 36-30-U. Elevation is 2,128 feet.

James H. Snowden and others No. 1 Hugh Andrews, northeastern Crockett wildcat C NE SE 43-UV-GC&SF, has been plugged and abandoned at 7,750 feet in the Ellenburger. The failure was three miles northeast of the nearest Ellenburger in the Todd Deep pool and between it and the Midway Lane field.

Jack Holt and others No. 4 C. J. Fuller, slated 1,500-foot wildcat, has been plugged and abandoned at 1,275 feet in blue sandy shale. The failure was 990 feet from north, 2,310 feet from west line of the 320-acre lease in section 4-A3-D. Savage survey.

Crockett tests, Texas Pacific No. 1-G University was drilling at 4,824 feet in lime, Humble No. 1-D Cox at 376 feet in redbeds.

**Rubinoff to Play Warsaw Concerto First Time as Violin Solo**

Ozona music lovers will be stirred and thrilled Wednesday, Sept. 13, when they hear Rubinoff and his violin playing for the first time as a violin solo the brilliant and moving Warsaw Concerto. The Rubinoff arrangement of the plaintive "pocket concerto" brings a new warmth and depth of expression to this modern composition. Metropolitan critics who have heard a special pre-concert tour rendition of Rubinoff's treatment of the Warsaw Concerto have unanimously acclaimed it his "most brilliant triumph of artistry."

All the pleas for aid to starving Europe and the pictures of horror and privation experienced in war-torn lands far away combine and converge in dynamic and unforgettable clarity as America's best loved violinist puts a new

soul into the moving composition. They still wanted Warsaw Concerto with the warm humaneness of the violin — and the more I traveled — the more I realized that I must arrange a violin solo — I could not have rested again if I had not accomplished that task."

While the Rubinoff arrangement of the Warsaw Concerto sets the pace and keynotes the concert, the artist, favorite of millions since his widely heard broadcasts moving picture appearances and concert tours, has unlimited scope in the list of popular compositions. Styled as a personal concert in tune with the times, his appearance here in the high school auditorium brings a new level of general popularity to the concert stage.

Lions Club. Admission price will be 75c to students for the Wednesday afternoon concert and \$2.40 to all at the evening concert.

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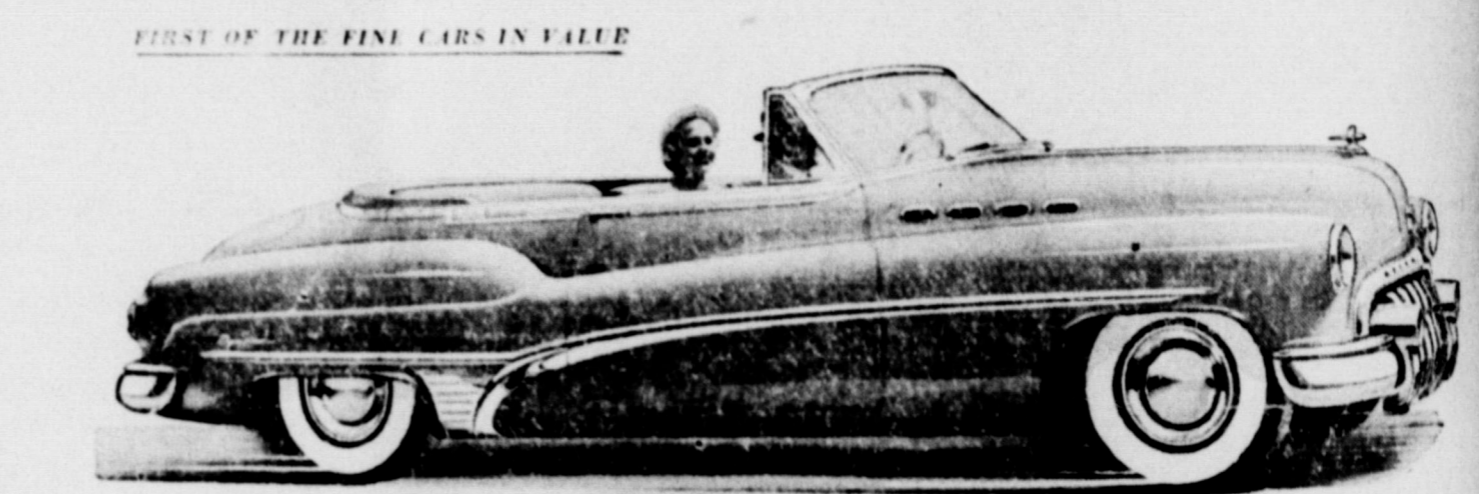

### Cattle Sales Led Texas Farm Income Increase for June

AUSTIN. — June farm cash income in Texas was substantially below seasonal expectations, despite a small gain over the previous month, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of farm cash income dropped from 276 in May to 218 in June (1935-39 — 100). The June 1949 index stood at 341.

Texas farmers received an estimated \$87,067,000 in June, or 35 per cent less than in June 1949. With the exception of livestock, marketing of all farm products was smaller in June than in the same month a year ago.

Cattle sales amounted to \$21,125,000 in June, the largest source of farm income for five consecutive months. Wheat accounted for \$19,356,000 in June, reflecting heavier movements. Wool sales totaled \$12,365,000. All types of farm products, except wheat, oats, wool and milk products, registered decreases in revenue from the previous month.

### Texas Group Launches 'Scratch Dallas' Drive In Run-Off Election

A "scratch Dallas" campaign in the Aug. 26 run-off election has been organized on a statewide basis, Emmette Alexander of Marble Falls announced today.

Alexander, a businessman and civic leader who is sparking the drive, described it as an effort to decentralize the power held by Dallas county in state government and to strengthen representation of other areas in the government.

He noted that four out of five run-offs in the election have candidates from Dallas county.

"As a plain citizen interested in good government, I firmly believe that one big city should not be given that much representation," Alexander said.

The four run-offs which have Dallas candidates are two for the Supreme Court, one for the Court of Criminal Appeals and the lieutenant governor's race. In the lieutenant governor's race are Ben Ramsey of San Augustine county in East Texas and Pierce Brooks of Dallas county. W. A. Morrison of Milam county and Robert L. Lattimore of Dallas county are campaigning for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

In the Supreme Court races are Fagan Dickson of Bexar county in South Texas and Will Wilson of Dallas county, contending for Place 1 and Meade F. Griffin of Hale county in the Panhandle and George W. Harwood of Dallas county, both seeking Place 3.

"There are already five justices on the Supreme Court whose homes are within 128 miles of Dallas," Alexander said. "If the two Supreme Court candidates from Dallas are elected, then seven of the nine justices on the state's highest civil court will be Dallas representatives."

The "scratch Dallas" drive will be conducted through advertising, news releases, word-of-mouth and personal letters, Alexander said.

**Price Increases Not Chargeable to Farmer Says Agriculture Head**

AUSTIN. — (Special) — Too often the public holds the farmer solely responsible for high prices, little realizing the enormous spread between what the producer gets for his products and what the consumer pays.

J. E. McDonald, commissioner of agriculture, came to the defense of the farmer with that statement today.

Said McDonald, "Americans are worried about three matters at this time—the Korean war, shortage of goods and advancing prices."

The Korean war is in the hands of capable military leaders and authorities in Washington. The shortage of goods will depend upon the hoarders and the civilian demand for critical war materials. The prices of commodities and manufactured goods will be governed by future developments.

"Last year this nation produced, under no government restrictions, 16,115,000 bales of cotton, the lint of which brought the farmer \$2,658,975,000. This year under government planting restrictions, the estimated cotton crop is 10,308,000 bales. At the present price, this will mean an income of \$1,958,420,000 or \$700,000,000 less than the farmer received for last year's crop."

The commissioner pointed out that this means the farmers of the nation will have that much less to spend for goods, services and wages. . . . yet the retail prices of their commodities are higher. "The spread between the farmer's price and that which the consumer has to pay is terrific, and to blame the farmer for high prices is decidedly unfair to our food producers," McDonald stated.

To emphasize his point, the commissioner called attention to the fact that statistics released Aug. 1 by the U. S. Department of Labor show a drop in commodity prices of 7.9% and U. S. Department of Agriculture figures show farm income 7% less, or only nine-tenths per cent difference—which is virtually no difference at all."

Headquarters for the meeting of representatives from all branches of the petroleum industry will be the Adolphus Hotel.

"Since they will be called on for more than 80 per cent of the additional domestic crude oil required for national military security, Texas oil men will use this meeting as a forum for discussion of ways to provide civilian and military petroleum needs," R. B. Anderson of Vernon, Association President, announced.

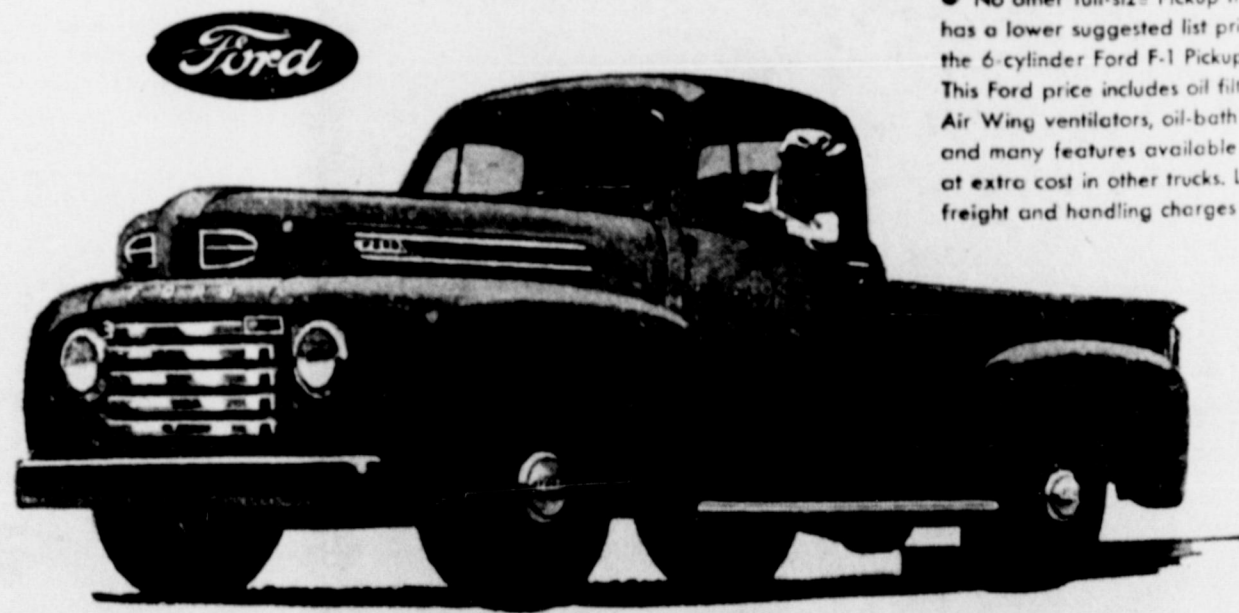

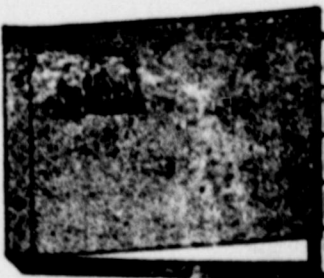

### Draft Boards Can Not Answer to 'When?' Queries of Registrants

AUSTIN. — Two of the most prevalent questions which men are asking state draft boards now are: "When will I have to take my physical exam?" and "When will I be drafted?"

"These are two questions which local boards can not answer," Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said today, in commenting on queries which are coming in to the draft boards. "There are too many intangible factors involved."

General Wakefield listed some of the reasons why local boards can't answer these questions:

1. Local boards do not know whether calls will be for an increased number of men or not.
  2. Local boards can not tell how many of their registrants will be found acceptable for military service and how many will be rejected.
  3. Local boards can not tell whether the world situation will improve or get worse.
  4. Local boards can not tell how many men will enlist for service in the armed forces now and in the future.
- "All these things have a bearing on the numbers which will be called for physical examination and induction," General Wakefield said. "Therefore, the local boards cannot say with any degree of certainty when a man's number will be reached in the Selective Service process."
- The state director urged men not ask these two questions. At the same time he called upon registrants to be alert and advise of changes in address and status.

### FIGHTING THE HOARDER

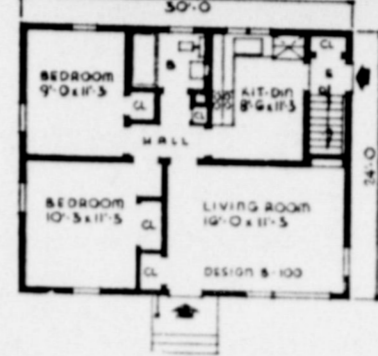
A short time ago, in the little town of Oswego, Oregon, the members of a church passed a resolution which said, in part: "Resolved: That we . . . protest in every possible manner all profiteering, scare buying and hoarding."

"That we renounce all individual gains which must be had at the expense of general security. That we pledge ourselves neither by word or deed to contribute to fear or hatred, being aware that the present emergency challenges our moral as well as physical courage. . . . # IS THIS A RECORD TO BE PROUD OF?

## 1. FAILURE TO SUPPORT OUR ALLIES IN KOREA

Ken Regan twice voted against economic aid to Korea. The first time, the proposal was defeated by one vote — 192 to 191. He voted against it again when it was finally approved by Congress. If dollars had been spent sooner in Korea, the United States probably would not be spending the lives of our young men there today.

## 5. FAILURE TO PROVIDE FACILITIES FOR VETERANS

Ken Regan took office at a time when construction of a Veteran's Hospital in the 16th Congressional District — near Ysleta — seemed to be a certainty. Today, plans for the hospital have all but been abandoned. In addition, the number of beds allotted to the veterans at William Beaumont General Hospital have been drastically reduced.
