**Country Boys Claim 'Scratch Dallas' Drive Gaining Momentum**

The country boys' campaign to "scratch Dallas" in the Aug. 26 run-off election is sweeping the state, Chairman Emmett Alexander of Marble Falls said today.

The Marble Falls businessman who announced plans last week for the revolt against Dallas county's control of state government, said he had received hundreds of letters, telegrams and phone calls in support of his plan.

The plan calls on Texans to vote against the four Dallas county candidates in the five statewide races, to elect their four opponents and to thereby strengthen representation of other areas in the government.

"The reaction to our drive to decentralize the power held by Dallas county in state government has been more than satisfactory," Alexander said. "And we expect it to snowball into victory by Saturday."

The local advertisements appearing in newspapers and elsewhere usually prompted by the candidate and his friends and therefore are not convincing even when they do serve to keep his name before the public. However, the Dallas News has to say in its editorial column Sunday, August 27, "Get the Best for Texas' Future Saturday next in the Democratic primary many important Texas posts are at stake. These are serious times. The nation is already at war. Within the next thirty months we may be in a worldwide combat. It is of the utmost importance that our officials be filled by the most competent men we can get. Of the names for whom the certain intentions will be named Saturday, especially true of the Lieutenant Governor, the two positions on the State Supreme Court and on the Court of Criminal Appeals. The News does not believe in making a choice lightly on such low grounds as personal preference or residence. Believing with Cleveland that public office is a public trust, the conviction here is that the men we should be selected on no recommendation other than merit. As a thinking citizen of Texas, entrust the lives and fortunes of him and his to less than the best of the men from whom he chooses." Lieutenant Governor. As experienced, constructive, forceful legislator, he has the skill and ability to preside in the Senate. The choice of both Governors Jester and Shivers for Secretary of State has the preliminary training and the proven capacity for emergency service as Governor.

"Judge W. A. Morrison of Compton is a standout candidate for the vacancy on the Court of Criminal Appeals, our court of last resort in criminal cases. He has had criminal court judicial experience. He stands high in his community and with his fellow barristers."

"For place 3 on the Texas Supreme Court, Meade Griffin of Plainview is far and away the preference of the civil lawyers of Texas on the basis of recognized integrity, wide experience at both bench and bar, and selfless devotion to his country and his state. Mr. Dickson has the support of organized Texas labor which he points out that he did not seek, but which nevertheless injects an unwelcome issue in a judicial race."

I particularly endorse the candidacy of Meade Griffin of Plainview for Place 3 on the Supreme Court. He was appointed on the Court by Governor Jester in April, 1949, and is seeking his first elective term. In the July primary his home county voted 18 to 1 in

favor of Judge Griffin over all the rest of his opponents. Even the Dallas News - home of Judge Griffin's opponent - endorsed Judge Griffin. Dallas lawyers voted 480 for Griffin and 43 for his opponent. Judge Griffin and I were classmates at the University of Texas 35 years ago. He was always safe, sound and conservative. Besides being a capable lawyer from a good West Texas town, he took time out to serve in World War I and II.

McDonald Urges Use of A-Bomb as 'Freedom Bomb'

AUSTIN. — J. E. McDonald, commissioner of agriculture, returned to Austin Wednesday from a visit to Mrs. McDonald's nephew, injured in combat in Korea, and declared that "the use of the atomic bomb as a Freedom Bomb is justified at this time" to prevent another world war.

Mr. and Mrs. McDonald visited Roland Reaux of Port Arthur, her nephew, now in Brooks General Hospital at San Antonio. He was wounded July 10, seven days after reaching the Korean front.

McDonald took time out from his run-off campaign for renomina-

tion to comment on the Korean war after visiting the wounded kinsman.

"We ought to know by now," McDonald said, "that you cannot toy with a rattlesnake, neither can you toy with communism. We have a job to do. Let's do it now and save the lives of American boys.

"Real significance," he said, "should be attached to the fact that the United States, a God-fearing, liberty-loving nation, was privileged to develop the atomic bomb. It is a God-given talent to a Christian people and can be used to end wars, or be allowed to drift into the hands of pagan peoples bent on world domination and slav-

ery. Let the atomic bomb be a Freedom Bomb for constructive use, not destructive use."

He declared that as American sons are dying on Korean battlefields, "the thing that will save lives of our boys and stop this threatened World War III is to immediately notify North Korea to cease fire and return to their country, or within a given time, the Freedom Bomb will be freely used on North Korea."

**GOING AROUND**

There are a lot of new miles on my Chevy that were not there last week. And yet we did not get very far away from home. Some company came and we had to show them what it is like West of the Pecos. We took the dirt road at Shepherd and went through the hills and Independence Draw is worth seeing. Stopped for a while to say hello to the Nippones who were thinking a breakfast when we got there. Morning is the right time for a drive. The last eight or ten out of Dryden is getting paved.

Dryden we hit Highway 90 turned east. A lot of people stopping at the bridge over Pecos. You can also see the highbridge from one side. Several cars parked around Roy Bean place at Langtry. Paved road up from Comanche has some lovely places. There is a thing in Texas prettier than any river through the Hudson Ranch. Everywhere we looked the grass was good and the fat. But the Ozona country looked good in comparison to what we saw on this drive.

Today we drove to Angelo to see some people in the hospital. Mr. Will Baggett doing well surgery. Mrs. C. C. Montgomery also well. While in San Angelo, we looked up Mr. T. A. Reid, Sr., at the St. Angelus. He was in good spirits and had a nice visit with him. We drove over to the Naylor to see Mrs. Friend, but they were on a trip somewhere.

I have always wanted to look at the Bloys Meeting at Skillman Grove, so we drove there via the highway. What a country that is! The caretaker at the grove they have had 17 inches of rain since January first. It looks like the green hills of Vermont. Grass waving in the wind. Little tank full of water. I saw the Big Bend in 1924. I have never seen it as green as now.

Before we got to Skillman Grove, they had a two inch rain. It is local, but things picked up an hour or so. The campers in the grove had to get out and one fellow had to get his new car dragged out of water. By the time we arrived, water had run down some. It was very cool. In fact, it was cold. We were prepared to sleep out, but good fortune we didn't have to. Tom Mitchell cabin had an

empty room by accident, and we got it.

We ate our meals in the Mitchell camp. It was well staffed with Mexican cooks, and well equipped with big outdoor stoves, utensils, woodpiles, ice boxes, etc. Dave Medley and Tom Mitchell ran it together. About 200 people ate their meals there.

You can get coffee as early as 4 o'clock in the morning, but breakfast is served at six and later. In that cool air, the hot biscuits cooked on a wood stove, the big slabs of ham, tin cups of hot coffee, halves of cantaloupes, stacks of hot cakes, and a lot of other things, really do taste good. Everything is free. When you leave you can contribute something, if you want to. Barbecue and beans are on the menu for noon and night.

They have four or five services a day, a different preacher each time. The young people have their own tabernacle and preacher. There are separate men and women's prayer meetings about sundown. Folks have a good time visiting, and many look forward all the year around to this occasion. A few old ones have been coming since the meeting started 60 years ago.

The location is just out of this world. We were the only Ozona people to be seen around, except Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Graham. It was reported that Ad Harvick was there but we didn't see him anywhere.

Hershel Hord and his wife from Alpine, people I had known in school days at Sul Ross, were there. Besides the Tom Mitchells and Crawford Mitchells of Marfa, there were the Dave Medleys, the Harpers from Marfa, also Mr. Cartledge. Two families from our congregation in San Marcos stayed in the same camp with us. An old school mate, Johnnie Prude, now superintendent of schools in Ft. Davis, was leading the singing. Bill Marshall, president of the Wayland College at Plainview,

flew in via his private plane to preach for the Baptists. Old Dr. Anderson of Fort Worth represented the Christian denomination. Dr. Joekel of the Austin Seminary was there for the Presbyterians. The Methodists had Walter Kerr of Kerrville.

On the way home we made the Loop Drive, which seems to be about 70 or 80 miles long. You go through the biggest mountains and by the observatory. This was a pure delight. Saw a blacktail buck, horns still in velvet.

In the Sawtooth Mountain country we stopped by an Old Indian camp ground where there are Madrona trees and an alligator juniper. Kit Carson's name is carved into one of the big rocks.

In Limpia canyon out of Fort

Davis, our route home, we bought a half bushel of cooking apples, and got to pick them ourselves. Anything in the world seems to grow well in the fertile soil of that little strip along Limpia Creek. Considerable truck stuff is raised in and around Fort Davis. It was warming up by the time we got to Balmorrhea, so we did not stop. By the roadside we saw a lot of irrigated crops, and big streams of water pumped from wells.

People who live in this part of Texas don't have to go far for a vacation. We are smack in the middle of one of the best. Texas has a lot of everything. After having looked at the mountains in Colorado and California, then at the ones in the East and in Vermont,

I'll put the Davis Mountains up against any of them, this year, for sheer beauty.

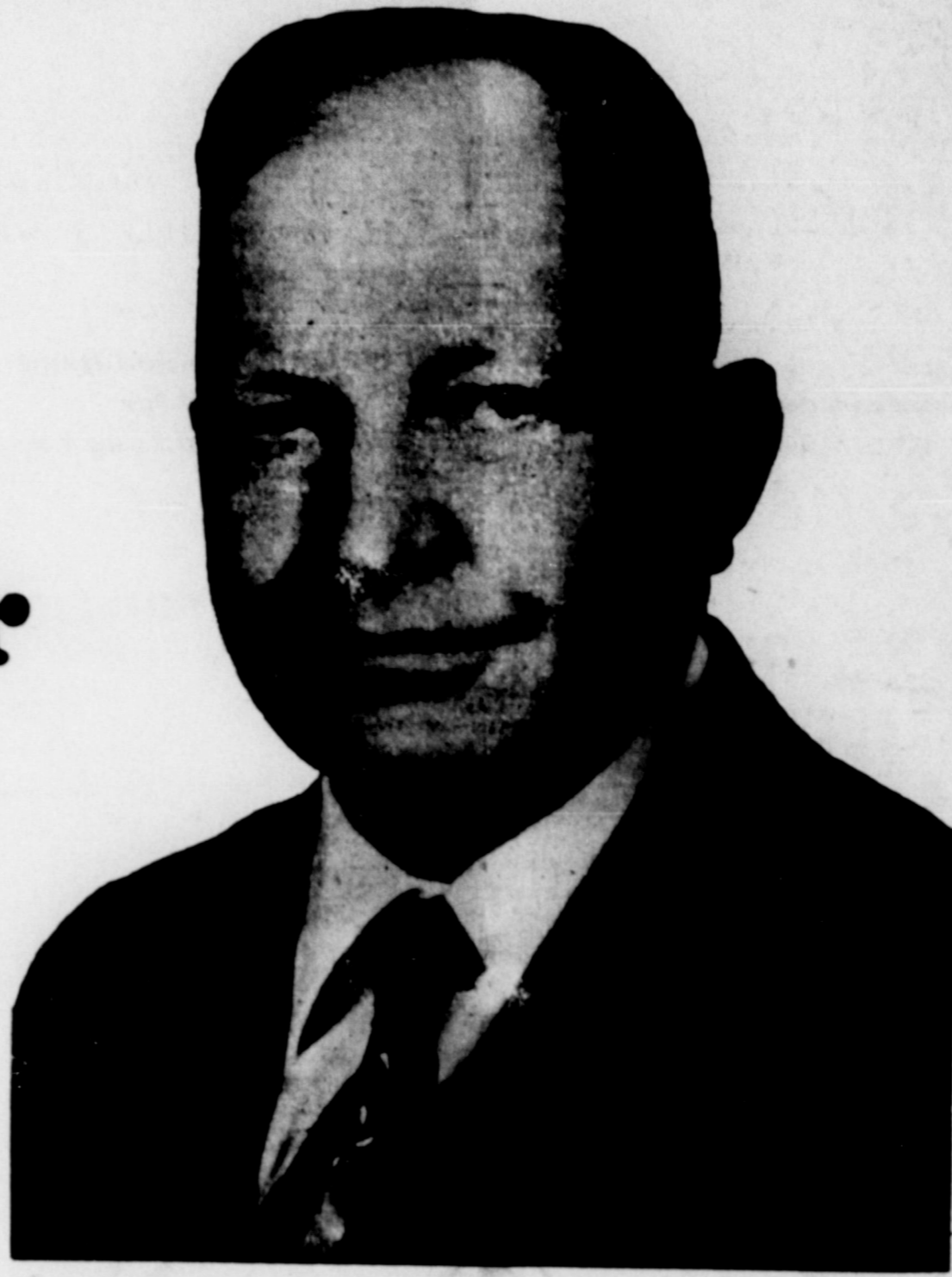
