Sheriff's Posse Starts Move For Oil Field Road

Urge Paving to Ozona; Larger Postoffice Quarters Asked

The Crockett County Sheriff's Posse, numbering approximately 100 Crockett county men on its membership roster, Tuesday night went on record as favoring the opening of a paved road over the shortest distance on a direct route from the Todd and Vaughan fields into Ozona.

A committee was named by Posse President Miller Robison to study the means of bringing about the construction of such a road, whether it will classify as eligible for inclusion in the farmo-market federal aid road building

ilities and approved a letter written by the president to Postmasfice Department calling for early action toward providing enlarged postoffice quarters to take care of the growing community needs. It was pointed out to postal authorities that the community has long since outgrown the present limited quarters and that many appli cations have been on file for months for postoffice boxes that are unavailable because of limited space.

Several proposals for construction of new buildings to house the postoffice have been made to the department but no action has been taken to bring about relief. The Posse, on behalf of the communiimmediate action to provide larg-

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

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


